Just to brighten things up, a new heading.... Hello, it's us, as usual, though, with lots of news and gossip to report. A couple of announcements in the week both proved to be bad news, the Community Radio thing was one, but more about that later, postal charges to increase on 1st October was the other..... 1p on First and Second Class, Eire up to 18p, (and no second class), but Europe down from 22p to 18p. Unfortunately, that means we have had to review our costs, as at the moment, we only break even with "WR", so an increase, no matter how small, would take us into a loss. 

SUPPORTERS of community radio last night launched a programme of attack against the government's decision to shelve their proposed stations.

As well as suing for up to £1m to cover costs of applications and equipment, some of the 270 disappointed applicants plan to take to the airwaves as pirates to disrupt programmes on existing local radio stations.

Several of the 23 stations planned around the country, which were expected to get the first batch of licences from the government last month, have already formed a protest group, Anchor -Action Now for Community Radio - which plans to sue the government.

- They have not been mollified by government assurances that the network might be revived at a later stage and on a greater scale. Giles Shaw, the home office minister in charge of broadcasting, said last week that an enlarged network would be considered in a green paper in the autumn. He hinted that existing community projects might apply to the government for seed-corn cash. .

Four London community stations, however, say they will intercept commercial breaks on London's Capital Radio tomorrow morning. and in Birmingham a group is pioneering a solar-powered "radio jammer" which "warbles" for 15 seconds every minute.

The groups' anger came over clearly at yesterday's annual conference of the Community Radio Associations in Wolverhampton. What was to be a celebratory meeting following the expected go-ahead of the first 23 stations turned into a forum of bitterness coupled with determination to fight to get on the air, whatever the means.

The move to shelve community radio, which would have offered stations to small communities or ethnic minorities, was prompted by Norman Tebbit, the Tory party chairman, at a cabinet committee meeting 10 days ago. It was announced formally by the the home secretary. Douglas Hurd, in parliament last

Tebbit was concerned that some ethnic-run stations, and some that had been funded by the Greater London Council before its abolition, might be undesirable.

The GLC gave about £400.000 to four planned stations. One. Spectrum, representing community groups in north London, was on the Home Office list of recommended licence holders. That list also included stations for blacks, Asians and Greeks.

The Foreign Office had told both Tebbit and Hurd that they were concerned specifically about anti-Indian government propaganda being broadcast by Asian stations. The stations say they would hardly be likely to broadcast undesirable or subversive material because their initial two-year licences could easily be withdrawn.

By next week the group Many of the embryonic plans to distribute up to 200 stations had spent up to £30.000 on groundwork. Local police forces had pledged their support for community radio as a positive help in improving race relations.

RADIO STATION NEWS IRELAND.

First off this week, a letter in from Joe Vincent of Riverside Radio(SW), who tells us that on Sunday 22nd June 1986, Riverside Radio relayed the FM service of Waterford Local Radio, on 6306khz., with the permission of the station manager. The occasion was WLR's eighth birthday. Free T - Shirts were given out as prizes in competitions all week. The station say that anyone sending in a reception report on short wave, will receive a personal reply. Joe goes on to say that Centre Radio in Clonmel are getting quite a lot of advertising at the moment. they have a clear stereo sound over Clonmel and be picked up on FM in Carrick - on - Suir, over twelve miles away. They are currently broadcasting on 88mhz. FM and 125lkhz. FM., and shortly hope to add 101mhz.FM. Station manager, Brian Byrne is anxious to receive reception reports for the 125lkhz. transmissions, and will answer personally, all such letters and reports. Sun visors are available at £1.50. They are in red and white, green, dark green and blue. They read " Stereo Centre Radio... At the centre of everything". Riverside Radio plan to relay this new station on SW, today, Sunday, on 6306khz. (This may well appear as a log later in the report). Finally, Joe goes on to mention two new stations imminent.....Zee 1043 in Naas, Co. Kildare and Signal Radio in Athlone. He also tells us that Crystal City Sound in Waterford can be heard on 97mhz. FM and 103mhz. FM, in addition to 1332khz. AM., and CBC Clonmel can be received on 103mhz.FM and 828khz. AM. We cannot print Centre Radio's address, as we have not got it and they have not included it on the hand-out(space permitting, re-printed later), but Riverside's address is P.O. Box 39, Waterford, EIRE.

Not a great amount of news from Cork this week.....Radio ERI is still off and WBEN continues to capitalise on this, with outside broadcasts from local shopping centres and live coverage, twice an hour from the Lawn Tennis Championships at Wimbledon, with Jim Lockhart.

Travelling further West now and we have a letter in from Paudie Shoer in Nenagh, Co. Tipperary, with a report on events in that area. Paudie tells us that on a visit to Limerick just over a week ago, he found the best station in that city to be City Centre Radio on 101mhz FM in stereo. Apparently they have the majority of listeners also. An unidentified signal was noted on 104mhz. Radio Luimni was heard on 96.4mhz. FM and 1125khz. AM., and finally, Munster Broadcasting Corporation was to be found on 96.2mhz.FM. Rumours of Radio Big 'L' set to return were rife also that CCR plan to have a relay station in Thurles, Co. Tipperary. A station testing on 100.2mhz. FM in Nenagh, has yet to officially come on air. This is the first such station since Radio Ormond some 1½/2 years ago, although it is also reported that this too, could return. In nearby Roscrea, the station there, on and off for years, Roscrea Community Radio, plans to make a big return on 95.5mhz.F, and 890(?)khz.AM., the latter with 1.3 kw. of power!

Jeff Richards in Naas, Co. Kildare tells us that Centre Radio in Kilmeague has vanished without trace. Several rumours as to the reason, abound. He goes on to say that ZEE 104

hopes to be on the air at an early date from Naas itself.

Going further North still now, in Dundalk, Conor MacGuill writes and tells us that he has picked up yet another FM station there. This time, it is CLR 104, broadcasting to the Dundalk area, albeit, rather weakly. Several presenters have been noted, but are thought to be the same person! Still broadcasting in the same area is Kilcurry Community Radio(KCR) on 97.9mhz.FM. and of course, the big station, Radio Carousel on 1125khz., AM and 100.7mhz. FM.

Radio West was logged on 102.5mhz.FM, last Tuesday, in Dungannon. We have now been informed by the station, that this is the FM relay for Athlone, changed from 100.9mhz. Further reports tell us that the actual frequency is possibly now 101.5mhz. MW in Athlone, of course, is 702khz.(not 701 as we mistakenly typed last week). Other Radio West frequencies are the main AM on 765 khz. (This transmitter for Mullingar and 99.2mhz. for Tullamore. Current line 10.00 Niall McGowan. 14.00 Willie Hart. 18.00 Dave Smith(till mid-night, except on Monday, Wednesday and Friday, when Phil Hilton hosts the Country Show from 18.00 till 21.00). Mid-night. Prerecorded taped music till 07.00. The free radio show today, was very interesting. In-studio guest was the famous Bob Gallico plugging his latest venture, 'The Time Of My Life' syndicated programme and generally reminiscing about his early days in radio, in South Georgia, USA, in the fifties.

WLCB in Wicklow town is still having problems with their new medium wave outlet. The station has been noted off and on more or less all week.

The same story goes in Dublin, particularly last weekend when electrical storms silenced the majority of FM stations. Even so, a number of medium wave stations have been off North and Donnybrook were no exception, but these have now closed down for another year. 981khz. is very active again with the return of Irish Christian Broadcasting Service, day(Saturday), the station was back on channel and was asking promoting recent large jackpot wins. normal day-time news service. No news is aired at nighttime though. Other stations noted locally in Dublin over the last few days include..... Charisma on 98.1 mhz., K 104, Wonderland Radio on 91.6mhz., Radio Galaxy on 1512khz. Battle to stop oirates

THE war of the wavelengths is still raging.

BBC Essex has announced its news team which will be covering the county when the new station goes on the air in November.

But a lot must be resolved before the opening broadcast.

At the moment BBC Essex and Radio Caroline, the pirate Thames Estuary station, are clashing on the same airwave. Who will give way?

Richard Lucas, manager of BBC Essex,

told a press conference the matter was beyond his responsibility.

He added: "At the present moment we are clashing with Caroline and it is up to the Government and authorities concerned to decide the outcome of this situation."

Mr Lucas said if no official action was taken by either Whitehall or the BBC then he would have to take steps to change his wavelength.

He added: "We are not a jamming agency. We are here to present a programme which will be heard throughout the county reflecting the lives of its thousands of population and producing a high standard of programme that both entertains and informs."

Trade Secretary, Southend West MP Paul Channon, says he is doing all he can to help the BBC Essex.

A spokesman for the Department said the minister had ordered all possible action to be taken.

She added: "BBC Essex has quite legally been allocated the frequency which has been jumped by Radio Caroline.

"It is quite unthinkable that a BBC. station should be pirated out of its properly allocated wavelength.

"We hope the situation will be solved before BBC Essex goes on the air."

The BBC has pulled off a coup in signing Timbo - Tim Lloyd - one of the former top personalities of Essex Radio who won a top DJ's award before leaving the commercial radio station.

Another Essex Radio personality, news reporter Imelda Reynolds, will also be joining the team.

The new radio station intends to set up reporting teams in Chelmsford, Colchester, Harlow and Southend.

Richard Lucas, announcing his new team, commented: "It's a programme team to be proud of. The new staff bring a range of talents which will get this station off to a flying start.

"In their hands our programmes will be friendly, informative and good fun. In addition, our news will be up to the best standards of the BBC."







The Summer holidays are here, so, don't forget, if you are a student, tell us, as soon as possible, about any change of address for your report. Following consultation with the Post Office, we can now confirm the new arrangements for Weekly Report, mentioned briefly last week. For those who did not see them, they are as follows......After 1st October, Weekly Report and Cuttings will only be sent together. Prices will be 30p(posted second class) or 35p(posted first class). With immediate effect, "WR" only, subscribers will be asked to renew at these prices, once their subscription runs out. They will then receive both "WR" and Cuttings from then on(even if it is before 1st October). Those with "WR" and "CC" subs. will have their subscriptions adjusted, once one or the other runs out, so both will run out on the same week. These people too, will then be asked to renew at these prices(which is 'no change' for them, just that a yearly subscription to "CC" has been done away with). People with both subs. running will receive a note, advising them of any adjustments made, and telling them which issue their combined subscription will run to. Subscribers in Eire will not be able to have 'Second Class Rate' when the new arrangements by the Post Office come into effect after 1st October. Subscribers in other EEC countries will be able to have the combined "WR"/"CC" delivered weekly, following a reduction in postal rates after 1st October.



Friday's (offshore)line-up included Tony McKenzie(Tony James of Caroline), Gareth O'Callaghan(Tony Gareth of Caroline), followed by Alan(David Andrews of Caroline)! Not content with that surprise, the station sprang yet another! Sybil Fennell back on news during Saturday day-time, sounding just as good as ever. At this rate, the competitors are going to have to watch out!

Monday saw it return, once again, with an excewllent signal, and as far as we know, it has been on the air, more or less all the time since. We shall re-print their logo, which is now out of date, and hopefully, station owner, the likeable Leo Doyle, might drop us a line, filling us in with one or two bits of news about recent events. FM frequency 101.8mhz locally.



COMMUNITY RADIO WEXFORD was logged in North Devon recently on 1008khz. Still off-channel, announcing "the heart of the South West". Another ID was also heard "Southern Sound" on the same channel. Is it the same station, we wonder. ABC RADIO was also noted by the same reporter on 1026khz., with a very strong signal in that area. The audio was noted

as being of excellent quality.

WBEN. Down country now and in Cork, well, about twenty miles away for this report on the station. Following the successful live link-ups from Wimbledon, with Jim Lockhart, the latest venture was to have all-day live link-ups with Eamon Kelly in New York, for the Independence Day celebrations. Last Saturday, and the Saturday before, the station broadcast live from the City Park Shopping Centre in Paul Street, Cork. between 13.00 and 17.00, with Nick Richards, Pete O'Neil, Neil Francis and Siobhan Walls. T - Shirts galore were apparently given out and Nick Richards was heard to say that it was nice to see so many people around the city, wearing WBEN T-shirts. A competition to find out what WBEN stood for was held. The latest on this was 'We Broadcast Every Night'.

The on the hour sponsored time-check by Burgerland, has been changed to Homemaker, a D.I.Y. shop in the city, who are also heard on commercials at other times during the day. The amount of commercials has increased no end, it seems, and Pete O'Neil and Neil Francis seem to feature on most. The music policy seems to be very successful and everyone

is reported to be listening.

Very little other news from Cork, although, a couple of reports say that Radio ERI have been testing with nonstop music during the week. These reports are unconfirmed and we await further news on this. Further news from Radio West tells us that a Mr Richardson(Mike?) from Limerick rang in and told them that Radio ERI had actually returned

on AM and FM as from 13.00 last Thursday 10th July.

MUNSTER BROADCASTING CORPORATION(MBC). From Limerick now, we can report that the above station is only on 96.2mhz FM, to the Limerick area, and no longer on 98 and 99mhz.FM to Tipperary and Nenagh. Apparently they were causing some interference with the latter. Also in Limerick, CITY CENTRE RADIO can be heard on 99.0 and 101.0mhz FM and RADIO LUIMNI on 96.4, 106.0mhz. FM and 1125khz.AM. There is still lots of action around 104mhz.FM, nightly. It is thought that it could be the impending return of Big 'L'. No further word on Roscrea Community Radio as yet.

CAVAN COMMUNITY RADIO. Back up North now, where this station can be heard 24 hours per day, following recent tests after midnight. The mid-night to 08.00 is only pre-recorded music though. Recent maintenence has resulted

in a better signal on 819khz.

The station started a radio bingo game at the beginning of the month, called "Liney Five". Special cards are being sold for £1(Sterling) in County Fermanagh. It is being run in conjunction with Donagh Football and Social Club in Fermanagh. Similar 'Bingo' games have been noted on other stations, in particular Radio Carousel, who have a game called 'Ringo'.

On Wednesday 2nd July, the CCR Cabaret Roadshow was in Donagh, where the station disc-jockeys provided the

entertainment.

ERNESIDE COMMUNITY RADIO. The station's weekly 'Night-Out' on Saturdays is attacting huge crowds we understand, proving the success of it's advertising. New disc-jockeys are currently being advertised for. The station was noted off the air for a spell on Tuesday last. As a result, here in Blackpool, we were able to clearly here Arklow Community Radio on 1251khz., also, Centre Radio in Clonmel.

BREFFNI COMMUNITY RADIO. Following recent tests with their FM transmitter, electric storms played havoc and put the station off the air completely. The 1170khz. service returned quickly after the storms, but the main FM was apparently damaged. The latter fed the Longford medium wave transmitter on 1035khz. No further news about this one, but we understand that it is still not back on the air.

LONGFORD COMMUNITY RADIO. The station was off the air, on 1071khz.AM, recently, but returned and was clearly

audible here in Blackpool, during the week.

SIGNAL STEREO 102. A new station from Athlone, first tested on Thursday 26th June and continued until Wednesday 9th July. Official programmes commenced on this date, with about 100 watts. The station broadcasts from new custombuilt studios at Burgess Chambers, Athlone. Current lineup reads....08.00 Paul Winters 12.00 Mark Anthony 16.00 Morris Benson 19.00 Pete Casey 21.00 Jason Ross.

RADIO WEST. The Athlone transmissions on 702khz., are posing a few queries. Reports say that different programmes to 765khz. can be heard. This can be confirmed by us. Transmissions on 101.7mhz. in the week, featured a Paul Richards? Strange things are happening with 'lifts' on FM, bringing in other stations, plus problems with the medium wave transmitter may well be the reason for this mystery.

Our thanks this week to Bob, Sybil, Scott, Richard,

Jason, Sean, Kevin, Frank, Paudie, Phil and David.

THE VOICE OF PEACE. Two letters from Israel this week, and although they report that the station is off the air, both letters were actually delayed in the post and the news is more than two weeks old. The station is now on the air, as normal, on 1530khz.AM, and 100.0mhz. FM, so if you are holidaying anywhere around there, take your 'tranny' with you and give it a try, then, of course, tell us.

As far as we know, Richard Staines and Ray Sarsfield have now both left the ship, and although we have not had any more contact, other than this letter, we believe that Ray may take up a job, away from radio, in Italy. Richard

will no doubt, appear back in Waterford.

Meanwhile, Rob Charles, on his first shore leave, takes time out to let us know what happened with the generators....On Tuesday morning, 10th June, at about 06.30 local time, the main generator broke down and after numerous attempts at trying to get it started, and numerous engineers going out to the ship, it was decided that the ship would have to up-anchor and sail into Ashdod port in order that the thing could be taken off and repaired on land. The ship duly arrived in port on Monday 16th June, and the presenters took the opportunity of having some unofficial shore leave. Five of them were able to 'do the town' leaving one in charge of the vessel. By Monday 23rd June, the main generator had been duly repaired and replaced and the ship was able to sail once again to it's position, three miles off Tel Aviv and resume broadcasting.

Dave James, now back in England, has been replaced by Mike Darby, Richard Staines by Mark Warner. Three more are awaiting flights to travel out there.

THE "NON-BROADCASTING" SHIPS. No news from these this week.

RADIO CAROLINE. The past seven days have been rather hectic, for both changes in line-up and the station being off and on the air. The week started with a Monday line-up reading....05.00 John Bennett. 09.00 Peter Philips. John Dwyar. 17.00 Tony Peters. 21.00 Tony(Mr) Christian. Both channels were off the air from 21.00 till 22.20 app. on Monday. The station closed at mid-night as the previous week. At closedown on Wednesday night, an announcement was made to the effect that aerial maintenence was to be carried out on the followng day(Thursday) and that both Caroline and Monique would go off the air at 09.00. However, at 09.00 on Thursday, Tony Christian made an appearance in place of Peter Philips and he continued throughout the rest of the week at this time. The planned close for maintenence did not take place until mid-afternoon and the stations remained off the air, until about 22.20, when unmodulated carriers were heard. No further programming was noted until Friday morning. John Bennett announced during Friday morning's Breakfast Show that the station would probably go off the air between 10.00 and 16.00 for aerial maintenence. However, the station appeared to stay on air, all day and at 21.00, a new female voice was heard, calling herself Jamie King. She carried on until 01.00 on Saturday morning, when Ian Akers took over to complete the weekend 24 hour schedule. At 13.00 on Saturday, Kevin Turner made a 'live' re-appearance, reading the news and followed this with a programme until 17.00. Pat Danton has not been heard reading news since Friday, although, the new Lotto numbers(on tape) are his voice. John Bennett was also last heard on Friday and although Peter Philips has not been heard hosting any programmes recently, he has read the news during the weekend. A new commercial has been aired during the week, for an Arts event called 'THe Elephant Fair' to be held at St. Germans in Cornwall on 25th to 27th July. A different advert has also been heard for the Top Forty Roadshow. It would be interesting

to know if the promotion for commercials aired just before the news during the last few weeks, has been the reason for the recent increase in advertising turn-over. Over on 963, 'Overdrive' was hosted till Tuesday by Mark Matthews, still on reduced hours, of 21.00 till mid-night. On Sunday night at 22.00, another in the series of Spin Radio Concerts was aired. On Monday 'Overdrive' was reduced further due to both channels being off air. On Wednesday, an announcemenmt by Ian Akers(who is still spinning Viewpoint tapes) that Caroline Overdrive would now be starting at 21.30 Monday to Friday. On the same night, Tom Anderson made a return to the airwaves and he replaced Mark Matthews for the rest of the week.

LAND-BASED STATIONS. LIVERPOOL. The action has been thin here again this week with nothing much at all, heard at this location. All stations seem to be lying low, following a purge by the DTI, since the announcement of the shelving of the CR Bill. Radio Merseywaves has appeared again, today, like last Sunday, but with a very poor signal, when compared with signals previously put out. Nevertheless, the station seems to have a regular line-up, which they keep reading out, for Sunday, Monday and next Friday. Station boss, Burt Williams, is reputed to be on the air later today. Burt is well known for going into explicit details about goingson,

so his show is a must for later today.

A number of low power FM stations are thought to appear from time to time in the area. Word in from one FM station, Radio Veronica, tells us that they too have had their share of problems, with 'well-dressed' men lurking about in the vicinity of the transmitter and asking questions. It is not known if they were DTI or from Performing Rights, or even from local ILR station, Radio City. Locations become difficult at times like these, as occupants ask the stations to move out. The station tells us that they have some stickers(hopefully re-produced later in the report) and for an SAE, they will gladly send you a couple. They also have all sizes of T-shirts available, in blue, at £3.75 inc P & P., from RV, 81 Lark Lane, Liverpool 17. (Don't put station names on any UK land-based station's mail, initials are always better). The station operates on 104.7 mhz., but often a rival station, Radio Julie operates on 104.8 mhz., which makes reception difficult, except in the immediate vicinity.

NORTH WALES. Radio Annabelle's operator tells us that one of their presenters, 'Captain Wakko', who did the 12.00 to 13.00 spot on Sundays is leaving to work over in Ireland, on WKLR for a spell. Current Sunday line-up....10.00 John Martin. 11.00 Ray Clark. 12.00 Les Martin's free radio show. 13.00 Spirit Sisters(alternative music with Jane, Kerry and Mickey). 14.00 Steve Davis. 16.00 Les Martin.

The station is also heard on Thursday evenings from

19.00 till midnight. Current frequency is 94.2mhz.

Both Radio Veronica and Radio Julie were logged in North Wales on car radios last weekend, we understand.

BLACKPOOL. Radio Sunshine was logged this morning on about 97.8mhz. It was logged in Southport.NORTH DERBYSHIRE. Word of a new station imminent there, reaches us....Radio KTR 101...stay tuned!

READING. A letter in this week, asks us if there is any action

in this area at the present time?

THE SOUTH COAST. Mid-week activity on FM in the Eastbourne area included ABC Radio and Atlantis FM. DTI

activity forced early close-downs.

THE LONDON AREA. The same story in this area, with DTI activity intense. Last weekend it was reported by several people that many of the pirates were raided. Alice's Restaurant and KISS FM were both raided last Sunday morning. Some stations had their aerials taken. By Tuesday, Starpoint had returned on 88.6mhz., also LWR. Latest report today tells us that there is nothing audible on the Eastern side of the Capital, although People's Choice' is possibly on somewhere locally, on 103.5mhz., as a relay can be heard on shortwave, 6232khz.





RADIO STATION NEWS....IRELAND. Listening during the week at this location has varied from day to day, with excellent results on MW on some days, but a noisy band on others. FM also has varied from good 'lifts' to poor. Medium wave listening was ruined on Saturday morning, once again, by a faulty RTE transmitter. The offender is situated amongst a housing complex, of all places, in the North Dublin suberb of Beaumont. The fault is a common one with this transmitter and often occurs. The medium wave band over a massive area is wiped out with distortion from spurious signals from this 10kw object. (We are about 130 miles from Dublin ourselves). Calls to RTE, complaining of the fault, eventually brought satisfaction, but not before holding conversations with socalled technicians who were not even sure where the transmitter was situated! Following the correction of this major transmitter fault, modulation was noticeably very much lower and remains that way, even a day and a half later. Particularly badly hit was Manx Radio on 1368khz. This powerful 20kw transmitter, at present a bit low on modulation, as parts are awaited from the States, was wiped out completely, again, over a very wide area. Calls to this station to complain to RTE, were fruitless, as "no technicians are on hand till Monday" was one reply, and "are you sure you are tuned to us" was the other. We understand the interference in Dublin was horrendous. BBC Radio I was inaudible during the time. A Dubliner who called RTE to complain, was met with the answer "try calling the Radio Interfence Service". He did not, but had he, well, who knows they may have raided the offender!

On now to general Dublin news....a half-page spread in last week's Sunday World featured Q 102. A 'granny' complete with ear-trumpet seen alongside a girating teenager and the words....'Your granny might not like it, but you do'....Dublin's No.1...15 -24 year old radio station...source: Behaviour and Attitudes, May 1986. We would have normally re-produced this advert, but due to it's size and the mass of black colour on it, we felt it may have overtaxed the printer. Another station calling itself 'Dublin's No. 1' is Sunshine Radio. They have been heard recently advertising as 'coming soon...the all new Sunshine Radio'. The station was logged all day every day recently, right up until last Wednesday, the day the 'all new Sunshine Radio' was due to start. By late afternoon nothing had happened. Then, Kiwi, Pat Courteney took over and it all started. He played "(Bang Zoom) Let's Go Go" by The Real Roxanne and then proceeded to play the record over and over again for two and a half hours, we are told. We lost our presence of mind after tolerating two hours and did ir-repairable damage to the radio set we were listening on, hence were fortunate to hear no more, but we are told

it continued and the aim was to publicise the new 'all American'(Didn't Nova do this?) format. A new American programme director has take over and this stunt was apparently his idea. A similar thing happened in the States, last Christmas, when a discjockey on one station played "Grand-Ma Was Run Over By A Reindeer", 27 times in a row. Needless to say, he was fired! Well, we switched off and have not listened since. We just wonder how many more did the same. No doubt, people will re-tune eventually, we will, just to see what the new format is like! We will monitor the station and report on it's new format next week. Meanwhile, 'considered outsider'(by the competition), ENERGY 103 continue to consolidate their position. Reports from Dublin say that this station is heard more in shops and stores in the city than any other. Their current small trader package deal, has been extended for a further period due to it's resounding success. Additional News readers are being sought and adverts for same have been heard recently. Frequencies for the 'big three' are Sunshine, 531khz.AM., 100.5, 101.0 and 101.5mhz. FM.....Q 102, 819khz.AM, 102.1 and 103.5mhz.FM....Energy 103, 738khz.AM and 103.0mhz.FM.

Liberties Local Community Radio were logged at this location today with the best AM signal yet, on 1035khz. Modulation was particularly high. FM 'Stereo 104' and 107 was heard mentioned. Reports of these two have come in, on 104.4 and 107.2mhz., locally with the latter and as far away as Dungannon with the former.

Other stations heard here, and locally in Dublin over the last ten days.... Southside Radio, on 106.lmhz., K.104, on 104.5mhz., Hospital Radio on 97.3mhz., Radio Galaxy each weekend on 1530khz., Caroline Dublin, on 98.5mhz., Ballymun Community Radio on 98.5mhz., Charisma, on 98.1mhz. and Radio Ringsend for the festival week, on 1530khz., and 98.45mhz. A religious station, playing all American religious tapes, has been noted locally with poor modulation on 1458khz., each evening. Tallaght Community Radio(formerly Wonderland Radio) has been logged in Blackpool on 1359khz., and can be heard locally also, on 91.9mhz.

A number of breaks in transmission have been noted on FM on Q and Sunshine and others. North and South of Dublin, Community Radio Fingal on 1575khz., and WLCB in Wicklow, on 1584khz., have been missing from time to time.

Moving North now, from Dundalk, John writes with a most comprehensive log of AM and FM stations received there. Thank you for this, very welcome, believe us. He tells us that KCR can still be heard on 97.85mhz., from Kilcurry, one and a half miles North of Dundalk. A homemade sticker has been sent for re-production(space permitting). No news about CLR 104, in the same town, although a blank carrier on 103.85mhz. is thought to possibly be them. Three of the four Boyneside Radio FM transmissions have been logged here recently, 100.1(Drogheda, with a much improved signal), 98.1(Kells) and 99.1mhz.(Drogheda link). On trying the fourth, 101.2mhz.(to the North), we were only able to receive Community Radio Wexford on this channel, and talking about them, their off-channel medium wave transmitter was off air on Friday and North Dublin Community Radio could be clearly heard on 1008khz., without the dreadful off-channel howl usually expected to be heard. Why ever does the station not sort this transmitter out? The interference can be heard over a very wide area.

From Cork City, Siobhan confirms that Radio ERI are well and truly back on air. Paul Graham in Leicester says it is loud and clear there at many times during the day, despite ILR occupying the same channel. It is understood that the station is still using it's Continental Electronics transmitter on 1305khz. FM frequency is not sure, as yet. Reports have it that South Coast Radio in the same city has been sold to someone else, who plans to move the studios in the next few weeks. WBEN continue on 98.2mhz., and 1386khz., despite some problems with an outside broadcast recently(see cuttings). No reports of receiving WBEN in the U.K. are at hand, although, we feel it will only be a matter of time, as Keith York their engineer, seeks to get optimum performance from the modest transmitter on 1386khz.

In Mullingar, Radio West were without Phil Hilton for today's free radio programme. Phil was away on holiday and his place was taken by the very well known voice, Bob Gallico. Bob handled the show in his usual professional manner. He played excerpts from Radio Nova's "Sixty second theatre" and his own "The Time of My Life" show, in addition to dealing with the week's news and gossip, ably supported by 'Captain

"Dave Murphy, the manager of Midway Radio in Mullingar writes with news of this fairly new station....Response from the public for this just over two months old station, has far exceeded expectations, no doubt, due to the sound quality emitting therefrom, the easy-listening format and close listener/broadcaster relationship. The quality of the signal on domestic receivers is reported to be quite excellent, due to the sophisticated audio processing equipment is use. Morale amongst the presenters is high and every encouragement is given to each presenter to develop his/her own particular style on the air. The current music format is Irish and American Country, Irish Traditional, National and International Folk, Hits of the 60's, Ballads, Jazz and miscellaneous light entertainment. No heavy metal, new wave or disco music is played. The audience consists of mainly over 25 year olds, a mature, selective and critical one. To date, the station has been singularly successful in attracting this type of listener. During the first nine weeks of broadcasting, no fewer than 52 different advertisers have been heard on the station, some from as far as 20/25 miles away. They believe that the station has the listenership that counts. At present, the station has eight presenters, two of them involved in the news team, and three advertising representatives, and operate from a pre-fab unit, which has been modified to include reception area, news and interview room, advertising and jingle production room, record and tape library and main studio.

Only five presenters remain there, they are Chris (The Boy) Pearson, Dave Shearer, Mark Warner, Mike Darby and Rob Charles. Replacements are on the way, next Sunday actually, and expected to join are yet another ex ABC Radio(Waterford) presenter, Stuart Clark and Tim Scrimshaw. Both transmitters





They go on to tell us that anyone writing to a station with the above address, can put the full radio station name on the envelope as every letter with the term 'Radio' is put in their box. (Sounds a bit like Box 539 in Blackpool!)

Finally, with the decent weather, a number of boat trips are currently running sightseers out to view the Ross Revenge. We have details of reliable trips which can be yours

for an SAE.

RADIO STATION NEWS....IRELAND. "The ghost of Nova returns" A call taken in our absence last Sunday evening at 20.30, and described as 'an emergency' indicated that 'Radio Nova' would return on 819khz., at 23.00 that evening. A second call at 00.30 later that night, asked if we had it recorded. We explained that we had been out and enquired who was making the call. No names were given and the caller hung up. A quick check revealed Q 102 operating normally on 819khz. The following day at just after 13.00, we received yet another call, this time from Q 102, asking if we knew what was going on, as Radio Nova jingles were being played on 819khz., instead of normal Q 102 programmes, which could be heard on FM only, at that time. Along with the Nova jingles, promos for our company were heard, and then after about 10/15 minutes, a short message indicating that 'Radio Nova' would return at 23.00 that evening (Monday). Normal Q programmes then followed. Nothing un-toward was noted at 23.00, although some deviation of the meter was noted at this location, indicating that the 'phantom' may have been making an attempt to break into the link again. It was a generally known fact that Q 102 were having some problems with their UHF link to the medium wave transmitter and were at that time using a VHF link. At some later stage the following day, further interference was experienced and Q's transmitter engineer hurriedly headed for the transmitter site. A person with a rucksack and a bicycle was spotted holding a home-made dipole in the close vicinity of the site, and whilst he was unable to be apprehended, he was pursued and dropped equipment consistent with apparatus needed to carry out such interference. No further problems have been encountered and we understand that the UHF link is now back in action. On the Radio West programme today, the 'Phantom' had the gall to phone the station and say he would be back later with 'Nova's ghost'. He went on to say that Q had not restored the UHF link and were still operating the VHF one, which he intended to interupt again. Whilst many people were very fond of Radio Nova and never wanted it to die, this type of action can not be condoned.

Q 102 continue to advertise fairly heavily and following their recent survey are dwelling on the good results therefrom, which is hardly surprising. An advertisement in last week's Sunday World, in addition to featuring the station logo, had the following to say....."When you listen to Q 102, do you ever wonder who is talking to you?.....Does Greg Gaughran really drive a Porsche?...What time does Mike EYE-IN-THE-SKY Hogan get up in the morning?...Is Scottie Williams really on loan from the Starship Enterprise?....Al Dunne at

lunchtime,...Henry in the afternoon,...Your boy, Jase, at night and John Kenny too....Dave Kelly, Aidan Leonard and John Power at the weekend....Find out the answers and meet the Q-team every week in the Sunday World". So it looks like we are about to be treated to something every week.

According to reports heard on the air, ENERGY 103 are also featured in a current magazine, but as yet, we have not seen this one. Latest voice heard on promos/adverts.... Tony Allan! Several competitions are currently running and chances of big prizes are being offered. An £800 Holiday is going to be given away next Friday, by Gareth O'Callaghan, during his afternoon show. Apparently the station has received thousands of entries for this one. The very popular John O'Hara returned to his early evening spot last Monday, following holidays, and stand-in presenter, Alan Burns(Radio Caroline's David Andrews), has moved to the later 01.00 to 06.00 spot. A new news-reader has been heard this weekend. Her name is Cathy Kelly and despite a few problems with the equipment, is a first class reader. The August Bank Holiday will see an "All Time Top 100 featured. Listening on a regular basis, it is plainly obvious that the station has a full advertising log, which is not surprising, as advertisers would be very keen to take up an opening offers the station has and at the same time get their message over to a maximum number of listeners. This station must be one of the few which sounds as good with weekend presenters as it does during the week. Derek Jones, Barry Falvey and Brian Lambert have been listened to most of late.

At this point, time to offer our congratulations to ex-presenter/newsreader Kathy Quinn, and her husband, Ian(member of the popular Dublin group, Regent Street), on the birth of their first child. Kathy, of Mexican origin, was notable for her distictive accent on the air(not to mention her distinctive get up, when out giving away £10.00 to lucky Nova listeners!).

Having listened non-stop to Sunshine Radio now for one whole week, we can safely say that the new format is working. However, we cannot help but think that the station has lost a massive number of listeners due to this change. Gone is the comprehensive news, gone are the D.J.'s I.D.'s, gone are the specialist programmes. Why? What prompted this? Q 102's recent survey? Energy 103's sudden surge forward? It is without doubt that the 'Community Radio Portmarnock' image is finished and the station has really stepped into the big league. Our guess is that the lost listeners will tune to North Dublin Community Radio and the gained listeners will come from Q and Energy. So, now we have three real super-pirates, all surging ahead, neck and neck at present. As regards power on medium wave, Sunshine are ahead, without question, followed by Energy, then Q. As for listeners, Sunshine say they are number 1, but so too, do Q, who go on to substantiate their claims with figures. Energy say nothing, they just get on with the job in hand.

The news format on Sunshine is quite bewildering. By twiddling the dial, one can receive three bulletins in twelve minutes! Q are first at 2/3 minutes to the hour, Energy are conventional, on the hour, Sunshine are at ten minutes past the hour!!! Only time will tell, the outcome lies in the future.

It is now the done thing for stations to 'do something

Going outside Dublin now, Brian Buckley in Dungannon logged a new station, on 107.35(the highest channel in Ireland yet), on Friday, with programmes and adverts. An 0405 telephone code was logged. On checking the Dublin directory, the area was Enfield/Innfield, on the Dublin to Mullingar road and on the County Meath/Kildare border. No further details are at hand.

Jeff Richards writes and tells us that in Naas, Co, Kildare, Zee 104 is imminent, although, not as yet on the air. The only station in the area is KCR(Kildare Community Radio) in Naas, despite threats of three or four stations about to set up.

In Athlone, Jason Ross writes and tells us that Signal 102 Stereo FM has now increased power to 250 watts. The programming format is "Non-stop hot hits" revolving around constant music sweeps of 3/4/5 records, with various I.D. logos, like "We play the hottest hits", "We play more music", "All hit/All music radio", "The hot rockin' 102", "Setting the Pace"(you'll have Jason Maine joining!) and "Rockin' the Midlands". Reaction to the new station is described as favourable. This is the first time a country station has tried the Nova/Energy/Q/WBEN format. Advertising is coming in steadily as a result, and adverts for Ginkels, Lord Bellamys, Murtaghs and Reflex in Athlone town are all regularly heard.

Word from Ballinasloe in County Galway, (the next town Westwards from Athlone) tells us that Candy Radio is apparently more than a rumour. The station looks likely to come from Society Street in the town.

Radio West's free radio programme today at 11.00 featured once again today, Bob Gallico, in place of the holidaying Phil Hilton. It was most certainly one of the most interesting shows yet, with Bob's humour and Captain West's fumbling all adding to the already interesting content. Phone calls during the show came from the 'hardfaced' Nova phantom(not relayed over the air), Gerry Byrne from Big 'M' Community Radio, who told us all about things in the Castleblayney area and the likeable Heady Eddie of Boyneside Radio fame. Eddie came prepared, with lots of 50p coins which he fed into his local call box at a rapid rate. He told us about his 'phantom' of some years back, who used to interscept the Dublin relay of Boyneside Radio, each evening and broadcast some excellent programmes to the Dublin area. He, too, was never caught.

Down country, in Cork, the action continues with RADIO ERI desperately trying to regain their past glory. According to the newspapers(see cuttings) a lot of problems are being encountered with interference, although in an expensively produced colour, glossy hand-out from the station, they say that their transmitters are the Rolls Royce of transmitters and do not cause any interference. Having said that, the number of mistakes within this brochure is amazing. The brochure goes on to mention ex-Nova's George Talbot, as being one of the team, their new advertising campaign, "FLY ERI", ERI being 'born in the USA'(based on USA stations, whereas previously being based on UK ILR stations), ERI being sold to a Cork-based consortium, lots of other interesting things like planning permission and aerial construction. It is just possible that the station has had a large quantity of these brochures printed and if someone was to send in an SAE(A4 size) they would receive one in return. Don't send them English stamps! An IRC would be needed from the UK. The station address....Radio ERI, 26/27 South Mall, Cork, Eire.

WBEN continues and latest news from there tells us that ex-WLS Music Radio(Galway), presenter, Pam Wilson, has joined the station and presented her first programme last Sunday morning from 06.00 till 10.00. Nightly phoneins from 23.00 till mid-night and from 01.00 till 02.00 are proving very popular. Their latest stickers are re-produced below. Station address is 4 Cook Street, Cork, Eire.


South Coast Radio in the same city is recruiting new staff and a small advert can be seen in cuttings. Only four members of the original staff have been kept on since the



The station closed at midnight on Monday, but continued until 02.00 during the rest of the week. A new presenter, Dave James(ex Voice of Peace), has been heard hosting the 01.00 till 02.00 slot, extending through until 05.00 at the weekend. Traffic news has been re-introduced during the John Lewis Breakfast Show and Kevin Turner replaced Peter Philips reading the news during the morning. Kevin has also read the Monique International News at 08.30. Jamie King continued to read the afternoon bulletins as last week. Problems with broken headphones during the week appeared to be eventually solved on Saturday by the use of Araldite and following this, Kevin Turner was heard to say he had got himself stuck to the excess glue on the headphones. Different commercials have been heard for both the 'Seaside '86' Concert in Belgium and the 'Camp Beaumont Adventure Holiday'. Finally, Tim mentions an unidentified station last Sunday night on 105.8/9mhz., with continuous music.

THE MIDLANDS. PCRL continue on about 103.6ish mhz.FM., although were missing for a couple of days in the week, and did not return till late on Friday. Most reports in from the Midlands area mention the station so, quite good power is being used, it would appear.

SCUNTHORPE. WLNG 104, P.O. Box 32, Scunthorpe, South Humberside appear fairly regularly, and have done now for about a year or so. Local bands are featured quite a lot and a number of advertisers have been heard. A newsletter is reputed to exist and we look forward to receiving one some time in the future.

THE SOUTH COAST. The DTI seem determined to eliminate this pocket of high activity(see cuttings this week). Despite this, Radio Sovereign can be heard each Sunday from 08.00 till 18.00 on 105.0mhz. Radio Atlantis are on the air every other Sunday from 19.00 till 21.00 on the same channel. ABC Radio was raided three weeks ago, although all the equipment has been recovered and no-one was caught, so that is good news there. Last Sunday, the DTI were actually waiting for them to arrive at the location at 18.20 in time for 19.00 start. An alternative site was found, and a loop tape was put out at 21.00, informing listeners of what had happened. The station hope to be back on air today, from 19.00, on 105.3mhz. A medium wave test was planned for last Friday at 22.00, on 16llkhz., with 10 watts from an excellent location. No reports are as yet at hand.

THE LONDON AREA. In Surrey, last weekend, People's Choice was monitored on 103.6mhz.(this station is sometimes relayed on SW, it is today, in fact), TKO on 90.9mhz., London Weekend Radio on 92.1mhz. and KISS FM on 95.3mhz. In depth station details and logs can be found in (TX) The Rebel Radio Guide, available from us for £1.25. The most recent edition of Media Monitor also carries a quite extensive recent (July) log of pirate stations in the capital.
