

RADIO STATION NEWS....IRELAND. There seems to be a station birthday every week at the moment. This week, it was the turn of Energy 103, who celebrated its first birthday on 28th April. The station first put out 'real' programming,

after a series of continuous music tests, during the afternoon of 28th April 1986. The first full day of programmes was the following day 29th April 1986 and featured initially, Richard Jackson, followed by Tony McKenzie, Gary Hammill, Mike Duggan, John O'Hara and Dave Johnson. The station has still not given away its big prize, which, by Friday 1st May had reached £9,500. The phrase to answer your telephone with, in order to win the money, is "I Love Energy 103". Look out for changes in the line - up on the station in the coming weeks. Tony Allen is due to begin presenting the breakfast show starting Monday 4th May, as Colm Hayes is understood to have left after obtaining a post at the state radio station RTE, although, having said that, Colm was heard hosting the 'European Top Forty' today. He will follow Dave Johnson, who went some time ago and can now be heard reading the news and voicing adverts, under the name of Andrew O'Hanlon. Talking about RTE, has Gareth O'Callaghan left the station too (he has not been heard for some weeks), in order to be in line for a job on the National Network? Gareth's Breakfast Show on Energy was the talk of Dublin and his fictitious characters, "Adrian, the window dresser", "Des Fahy, political correspondent", "Gloria Fenshaw, gossip columnist" and "Max, the taxi driver" will be sadly missed, as they brightened up many people's mornings. Finally, two more presenters to go missing, Derek Jones, he has re - joined Q 102 and has been heard on 'Solid Gold Saturday' and Derek Flood, he has been noted hosting programmes on Radio West. Whilst at the latter station, congratulations go out to station owner, Sean Coyne and his wife who celebrate the birth of their first baby.

Q 102 sounded much louder than usual on its medium wave outlet of 819kHz, on Wednesday, although a few short breaks in transmission were noted during the afternoon. The 'Eye in the Sky', was grounded during the early part of the week, presumably due to foggy conditions over the city. The service resumed mid-week, although 'Micky Joe' was cut off in his prime at about 08:30 on Friday morning when the AM transmitter went off the air for about 10

Over at Sunshine 101 things are building up to the 'Big Cahoona', with the latest promotions mentioning that 'we will have to re - name the Big Name'. Perhaps they are wanting a new name for the station? Mark Byrne has stood in for the holidaying 'Nails' Mahoney on the daily Breakfast Show, despite rumours of 'Big Guy' doing these shows, and again, presenting the 'Extravision Be Bop Gold', today, Sunday.



A new outlet from Treble T R Radio was logged here from Wednesday onwards. This new frequency was 891kHz, and was transmitting in parallel with the normal

945kHz outlet. Signal strength was better than 945kHz, although on this side of the Irish Sea, 891kHz is sandwiched between two powerful BBC stations, Radio Wales, and Radio 2, both of which are causing terrible splatter at this location.

Co. LOUTH. Boyneside Radio now appear to be operating as normal from Donaghy's Mill in Drogheda, following the raids or recently. Heady Eddie was missing from his normal afternoon show in the week, due to a family bereavement. On the day of the funeral, one minute's silence was noted, in respect the death. We feel that this is possibly the reason for this weekend's non - appearance of Radio Rainbow.

Following the recent breaks in transmission on the 1125kHz. outlet of Radio Carousel, all transmissions now seem to be back to normal and have been noted continuously,

during the past week.

The South West Region. A report from this area, tells us that Horizon Radio is broadcasting 24 hours per day, on 98MHz. (studio link) and 104MHz., FM stereo. Presenters include former Big 'L', Limerick, owner, Mike Richardson, Philip Irwin, P.J. O'Neil, Frankie Phoenix and Francis Jones. The station, recently listed as coming from Killorglin, Co. Kerry, has, according to a report on the Radio West Anorak Show, moved studios to somewhere, nearer Tralee, the exact location of which we are not certain. The station has recently been relayed on short wave via the transmitter of Radio 101, on 7361kHz. W.C.R. (West Country Radio) broadcast on 96MHz. (studio link) and 102MHz.FM, from studios in Abbeyfeale, Co. Limerick. The station is on air for thirteen hours per day, from noon until 01:00 and can be heard well in Limerick City. Also now heard well in this area, is WBEN from Cork city, on 98MHz. Apparently, they can be heard with a strong signal throughout Munster.

THE VOICE OF PEACE. Another letter from Tel Aviv, this time, from Mike Davis, currently enjoying the sun (and girls!) on his week off the ship. He tells us that the station shut down on Wednesday 22nd April at 11:50 local time, for an oil change on the generator. A few minor repairs were carried out on the FM transmitter at this time and the station returned to the air at 16:00. It is widely thought that the new AM transmitter is now in Israel, following it's journey

from Canada, via New York. The station could be in port, and off the air for about a week, in order to have this installed.

CAROLINE 558 Before we go into this week's details, a couple of listeners mentioned hearing a Coca Cola advert during Easter week. Don't get excited though, thinking that the station has finally got itself on the books of multi national firms, as apparently, this is not a new commercial, but simply part of an L.P., which happens to features adverts prior to the song which is being selected. More changes in staff were being made at the time we went to print last Sunday / Monday. This time we welcomed the return of John Tyler on the programming side, and Steve Conway, who only left his post as resident newsreader a couple of weeks ago. Peter Philips has now gone on shore leave. As of Monday, the new line - up became... 05:00 Kevin Turner... 09:00 Tony Peters... 13:00 Mick Williams... 17:00 Dave James... 21:00 John Tyler... 01:00 David Foster. 24 hour operation continued throughout the week. There is not really a lot to report this week, except to say that during the latter part of the week, a lot of Christmas cards were being read out, which had apparently just arrived on board. So, if any requests are wanted for a specific date, it seems as though posting the letter even 5 months in advance, you are not certain of getting the letter out to the ship. In most cases however, getting the mail through has not taken this long. John Tyler mentioned on his show on Friday, that it was coming from the old Overdrive studio, at the rear of the ship. He then began reminiscing about his old seven hour shows on that service. We have no details as to when or if, Overdrive will ever return, but it now seems to have been off so long, it is doubtful whether we will ever hear it again.

LASER HOT HITS 576. Not a lot happening here at the moment. A letter in during the week, told us what was said by D.L. Bogart, the last time the station signed off on Easter Monday at 20:00. He apparently mentioned that they would like to continue, but could not do, without any more diesel. Apparently the operation is very short of money for fuel and wages, but the situation is not as bad as some of the press reports are making out. We understand that the ship has been tendered but that due to this lack of resources, there is no intention of improving the aerial system with a heightened front mast at this present moment in time. Several correspondents tell us that they took a trip out to visit our friends, during last week's calm conditions. Morale on the Laser ship was quite high, despite not being on the air, and the three presenters seemed quite happy to remain out there, until things improved and normal service resumed, once again. Having said that, with this weekend's rough weather, they may well have changed their minds!

LAND - BASED STATIONS MERSEYSIDE. Radio Merseywaves, without question, the No.1 MW free radio station in the U.K., continue, non stop. Station owner, Burt Williams, in his, at present, weekly address to the nation, stated last Sunday, that, in view of their forthcoming station 'Night Out', on Monday, 4th May, at Snobs Take Two in Liverpool City centre, the station would remain on the air, seven days per week, until the event. All being well, this will mean that the station has broadcast non - stop, apart from the odd brief break, for almost three weeks. The signal, once again, has been very good at this location, although, on Monday, it was obvious that some technical adjustments/modifications were being/had been, made. The station left the air during Tuesday due to problems with the feed to the transmitter, and also due to a problem on the modulation section of their large medium wave transmitter. With engineer Burt Williams, not being present, the faults were not repaired immediately. On tuning in later in the evening of the same day, however, they were once again back on the air. As was expected, heavy promotion was given to this 'Night - Out' and tickets for the buses to the city centre, and return, were advertised as being available from various shops and cafes in the locality. From latest reports, we understand that the night is destined to be a sell - out. The majority of the popular RMW deejays plan to be there, and the night's line up has been read out on numerous occasions. Needless to say, the station will close early on Monday evening in view of this. A number of good programmes have been heard this week, with various specialist music shows, oldies, disco, charts. In addition, some phone ins have taken place, live ones, at times. National Radio 1, currently doing a live road show in the city, came in for a bit of leg - pulling by the station, although in fairness,

Steve Wright, in his show mentioned that he had been listening to a 'pirate' (without question, Merseywaves) and although he was unable to name the station on the air, thought their programmes were 'a lot of fun'.

No other stations were noted from this area, at the beginning of the week, although as the weekend approached things started to build up, beginning with Central Radio International making a re - appearance on the airwaves on Friday afternoon, 1st May. The frequency was the same as they used previously, 1404kHz. Signal strength here in Blackpool was fair, but due to a low microphone level, the speech was sometimes difficult to hear. Later on during Friday night, we logged Radio Julie on 104.85MHz, with an even better signal than we received them last weekend, despite the fact that station operators had recently appeared before. the courts (see cuttings). Their signal always seems stronger at night, than during the day, but whether this is due to atmospheric conditions, we are not sure. Radio Julie were heard through the night into Saturday and again on Sunday, and announced that were going 24 hours per day over the May Day weekend, including Monday. The two 'Sunday only' medium wave stations were duly heard here, as normal again. Radio Merseyland, on 1422kHz. and Liverpool Pirate Radio (LPR), on 1404kHz. The former featured a telephone number for requests and those who rang in, would have their names entered into a draw and the chance to win £5.00. On LPR, Phil Davies announced that this may be their final broadcast, due to lack of support. To keep them on the air, they would like to receive some feed back at their address of 30 Elkstone Road, Norris Green, Liverpool L11 2TD. This station features a lot of golden oldies. Finally heard here, today, was Slag - Off International on 105.3MHz. They commenced transmissions during the late afternoon.

According to Tim Jackson, in his report for last weekend, Concept Radio have resumed transmissions on 104.3MHz., following being blocked out by a transmitter on the same channel, relaying Radio Merseywaves. Tim also reports that Slag - Off International have been noted from time to time, on 105.2MHz.

YORKSHIRE. Reports from Leeds tell us that last Sunday evening, Radio Veronica from Bradford were noted, on 105.5MHz., also, Ocean Sound from Rotherham on 106.3MHz. Back in Leeds, Music City Radio have not been heard by our reporters there, for about two weeks, so it looks as though even this successful community station has felt the wrath of the DTI. A surprise re appearance of ABC FM was reported last night, on 94.6MHz. This is the first time the station has been heard since the early part of the year, although, unfortunately, the audio was particularly distorted and a few spurious emissions were noted along the band. WLNG have been heard on both Tuesday and Thursday, on 104.9MHz. However on both broadcasts, after about 30minutes, the audio gradually reduced until it was inaudible, even though the carrier was still present.

THE MIDLANDS. PCRL have once again been logged all week, on 103.8MHz. Second City Radio have been on again, for the weekend, commencing 19:00 Friday, until the early hours of Monday, on 93.05Mhz. The signal was very strong and of very good quality.

BELFAST. The only station to be heard in this area during the week, was B - 96 who were logged on Tuesday night on their usual frequency of 95.95MHz.

GLASGOW. Neon Radio were heard on a couple of nights this past week, on either 99.0 or 97.9MHz. The station are still operating on low power, but a bigger transmitter will shortly be introduced. A late report told us that they were heard last night on yet another frequency of 98.4MHz. Radio Mercury were back on the air last Sunday, on a new frequency of 96.1MHz. However, after only forty minutes problems with the power supply meant that they were only broadcasting to a few cows and sheep! They hope to be on the air again, this afternoon, on full power, and indeed, have been reported as such, with transmissions beginning at 14:15, on 96.1MHz. The regular 'Anorak' feature was heard being broadcast around 14:30BST.

BRISTOL. "103.5FM" were reported as being on air on Good Friday morning and Easter Sunday evening, in this area.

READING. After a long spell of nothing, a pirate has surfaced once again, here. Radio RS has been heard locally, several times, on 104.2MHz. (announcing 103.9MHz.), playing disco music and relaying people who call in on the CB, Channel 2. No mailing address has been heard and the station is thought to be a one man operation.

LONDON. Additions to last weekend's log.... 88.4

UNID.(Greek).... 89.6, Network 21.... 89.8, Quest FM.... 89.9, RJR..... 90.2, RFM.... 91.7, Sky FM.... 103.3, Elite FM.... 104.3, South West Sound..... 105.8, Southside Radio.

Sid, in his report on last weekend's action tells us.... "Twenty four logs, twenty of which, were confirmed..... Stereo is making a come - back, with nine stations now regularly, or occasionally, in stereo. LWR, after an over long period of five months, rejoined the ranks of stations transmitting music for people with two ears, on Saturday 18th April. This was preceded by Network 21, the previous night, and RFM a week or two before. Network 21 and RFM have not previously been noted in stereo and are presumed to be newcomers. CDR returned this week, in stereo, for the first time since early March. The black community stations, RJR, JBC and Time FM, continue in stereo, as do the weekend dnace stations, Solar 93 and Kiss FM.

TKO (last heard in stereo for just a week in mid March), seem to have turned up the bass cotrol knob, this last week or two. This gives them a very meaty sound, especially

on the reggae shows.

Always worth a listen is Night - Hawk, the overnight man (01:00 until 05:00, Tuesday to Saturday), on CDR. He seems to enjoy his work so much, that he never seems to believe his show is about to end. This Saturday, he even appropriated another two hours, to finish at 07:00. Whether this was due to his replacement not turning up, is not clear.

The no - showing up of deejays seems to be an increasing phenomena. The number of appeals over the air, especially early in the morning, for the following deejay to make an appearance, seems to be occurring with much

greater frequency.

The sexiest voice on radio, definitely belongs to LWR's Camilla (Saturday 19:00 until 21:00), who's Liverpool tones and natural coquetishness combine with a talent for picking the right black music. If she can stop preceeding every sentence with the word 'right', she should go far.

Studio I this week, seem to be going through an identity crisis. During the evening, the sound quality deteriorated to sound like an AM station, and then, in the early hours,

they were relaying LBC.

A week or two ago, it was reported in "WR" that Studio I had been transmitting on 93MHz. This was unlikely, as Solar 93 were already broadcasting there and Studio I were on their normal 92.7 MHz. It is likely that the deejay mentioned that a track he had played had come from 'Studio I', which is a long standing reggae production house/label.

Studio i, however, did appear on 93MHz. for one night only, on Friday 13th March, when Confidence International Radio (as they called themselves that night), appropriated 92.7 before Studio I had a chance to appear. In their turn, Studio I moved up the band and pinched 93MHz. from Solar 93, for the evening. When Studio I finished transmittinms for the evening, Solar 93 promptly switched on their own transmitter and held it with a stereo carrier wave, until programmes began the next morning. By Sunday, Solar had their frequency back and Studio I and Radio Confidence were battling it out for 92.7.

RFM were back this Sunday, but lost out to Rock to Rock's much stronger signal on the same frequency, which blocked out RFM from South London and much of the West

End.

High pressure on Friday and Saturday brought good FM conditions, along with the difficulty of resolving some stations at a distance. However, with a paper and pencil, and a UK frequency guide, I managed to pinpoint 22 BBC Radios 2/3/4 transmitters from the Isle of Wight to Birmingham, 24 BBC/ILR local stations, from Brighton to Luton/Northampton, plus 8 French or Belgian and 20 odd private stations. That comes to an incredible 74 contacts. It is a pity that so many of them carried similar types of programming".

Reported heard this weekend 88.6, CDR 89.9, RJR.... 90.2, Rock to Rock.... 90.4, TKO.... 92.8, Studio. I..... 93.0, Solar 93..... 94.0, Kiss FM..... 97.8, Traffic Radio..... 103.7, Time FM..... 104.7, JBC..... 105.0, LGR.

Also heard were a couple of unidentified Greek stations on 88.6 and 105.4MHz., and a reggae station on 91.8Mhz., possibly Sky FM. Conspicuous by their absence were LWR who were no doubt on the end of more DTI activity. RFM are reported to have now changed their frequency to 89.6MHz, due to being squeezed out by all the other stations operating around 90.2MHz.

ESSEX. Radio Hot Wire were on the air once again on 105.8MHz in this area, and tell us that they recovered the

aerial but not the car battery, which were stolen a couple of weeks ago. Other operators in the are advised to watch out for a red Austin Maestro, sporting three aerials, as this is the 'home' of your local raiding party. Canvey Radio were heard operating from 10:30 this morning on 93.0MHz, and hope to continue programming until 21:00.

The best time to ring in the logs is from 13:30 until 14:30, the latter being about the deadline for the week's report.

The unidentified on 6225kHz. was a Dutch station with a very strong signal, giving out an address of P.O. Box 24, 7260 Ruurlo, The Netherlands. No station name was noted

whilst listening.

The two loggings on 6233 and 6235kHz. are believed to both have been the same station, Sud West Radio. 6233 was heard signing on with the start of Johnny and The Hurricane's "Reveille Rock".

North Dublin Community Radio (NDCR), is believed to be being relayed by the former operator of Radio Ireland. Energy 103 were also heard being relayed later in the morning, around 6312kHz.

A very strong carrier was noted on 7361kHz. at around .09:35gmt., blocking out reception of Radio 101. As the carrier faded, the other station came up, although we, ourselves

did not manage to identify same.

RADIO STATION NEWS....IRELAND.

Due to an ESB (Electricity Supply Board) strike which started on Tuesday morning, 5th May, many stations in the Irish Republic were off the air on occasions during the middle of the week. Those missing for several hours, during the first day of the strike were BLB on 657kHz, Energy 103 on 738kHz, Big M Community Radio on both 954 and 1413kHz and all FM frequencies, LLCR on 1035kHz, Radio Carousel on 1125kHz, KLB Community Radio on 1224kHz, Boyneside Radio 244 on 1233kHz, Community Radio Fingal on 1575kHz, WLCB on 1602kHz, and ZEE 103 on 103.25MHz. The stations were expected to be only off the air on occasions, as a rota system for power cuts, was in force. Some of the bigger stations were fortunate in having the facility of a generator, which meaned that the power cuts only lasted minutes, until the motor could be switched in. Problems occurred here, though, as some stations have numerous sites (studio/AM/various FM's), meaning that several generators would be needed to ensure a full service. Expensive items like these are unlikely to be 'in stock' in any quantity, in even the biggest station. The absence of stations on some frequencies, gave us the rare chance of tuning in to another station sharing that frequency, from a different area. A typical example occurred on 1233kHz., where Boyneside 244 was missing, and Mid-West Radio from Co. Mayo, was clearly audible. Ironically, in this particular case, Mid West also went off shortly afterwards! By Friday, this strike had been settled and no further power cuts were noted. All stations seemed to return to normal operation.

During the early part of the week, an anti - cyclone stationed itself over the South West approaches of the British Isles, giving high barometric pressure over the country, hence good FM conditions. All the usual Irish stations were heard, here in Blackpool, many in stereo. In addition, noted were Treble T R Radio on the new frequency of 99.1MHz. Heard was Bob Gallico's syndicated show "The Time of My Life", at around 18:30. Later the same evening however, this signal seemed to disappear and an equally strong one appeared on 99.5MHz., their original frequency. Radio Diamond (not Diamond Radio, we are told!) were noted on 106.1MHz., Phoenix Radio on 107.0MHz., Capitol/Nitesky on 95.8MHz., Pulsar 98 on 98.75MHz., Boyneside Radio on 98.2MHz., Radio West on 99.2MHz. and Big M Community Radio on 105.0MHz.

Co. DUBLIN. The most interesting news item this week, was about Energy 103, and was first heard via the 'Media Network' programme on Radio Nederland. During this show, Jonathan Marks told about an advert in the American trade magazine 'Radio and Records', in which this station was advertised as being up for sale for a price approaching \$600,000(U.S.). He continued by saying that also in the advert, potential buyers are told that this contemporary hit radio station has no debts, a good cash flow, and a telephone number in England was given. Jonathan then rang this number for more information, and a familiar voice answered 'hello'. Nothing more is known about this proposed sale, although

having said that, any businessman will sell out if the 'price is right'.

The expected arrival of Tony Allan on the breakfast show this week, did not materialise, and Pat Courtney was standing in on the programmes instead. Tony did however host the afternoon show, all week, in his inimitable style. A new presenter was noted after midnight, and his name was Liam Coburn. We understand he is ex Radio ERI and also went under the name of Paul David on the late Radio Annabel. Tony McKenzie has not been heard this week, at all. A new newsreader called Lisa was heard, and on Tuesday, a girl presented 'Power Hour' between 11:00 and 12:00 when Alan Burns took over once more. All in all, the station has taken some close listening to, this week, with all these changes etc. We have hardly had time to listen to the others, but, maybe that is the idea! The station left the air on MW, between 13:00 and 16:10, and again at 18:05 that day, due to a power cut, although the FM stayed on the air on 103.0MHz. Power cuts also disrupted listening on MW on Wednesday and Thursday, but the station seemed to have a generator at the studio complex, for when power was cut there on Thursday morning at 07:00, they returned several minutes later, and continued with the news at 07:08. It is not known if the power cuts were to blame, but early in the week, some news bulletins were missing, despite the news jingle being fired, and programming sounded unusually odd. Having said this, things returned to normal eventually. A new slogan, 'Energy Power 103' has been gradually introduced, and all the presenters, were heard repeating it regularly. The month of May has been designated 'Birthday Month', and every Thursday until it's end, plenty of prizes are being given away. The cash prize for answering the telephone with 'Hello, I love Energy 103', had reached £10,700 by Friday afternoon.

Q102 and Sunshine Radio were the only two stations to lose very little programming on either band during the strike. Both stations were back on the air within a minute or so of a power cut hitting the studio or transmitters.

Ray eyes a chopper

THE Minister for Communications, Ray Burke, says he'll banish the pirates from the airwaves by the Autumn.

A brave man indeed, depriving the Taoiseach's son of work. Ciaran Haughey's own company owns the helicopter that's the "eye in the sky" for traffic news on pirate station, Q102.

Radio Dublin now seem to have two transmitters very close to each other, on the FM band, on 104.95MHz and 105.2MHz.(both audible here during the aforementioned periods of good FM reception). The 105.2MHz transmitter is the stronger of the two, and is reported to be reaching into the Midlands of Ireland. This latter transmitter sounded very 'tinny' here, earlier in the week, but by Friday it was sounding fine, and had moved to 105.45MHz. Several reporters from Ireland said a loud 'hum' accompanied programmes on it, but we were not able to notice that, here. Unusually good conditions, last Monday, brought in this station on all three wavebands, the two FM frequencies stated, 1188kHz. medium wave and 6910kHz. short wave.

At one stage during the week, due to the good FM conditions, it was impossible to receive BBC Radio Merseyside on 95.8MHz., here, instead, Capitol/Nitesky put in an excellent signal. Likewise, a colleague rang and said he was unable to hear Piccadilly on 103.0MHz. (he works on the station), instead, only Energy 103 was audible.

Co. KILKENNY. Kilkenny Community Radio were noted on the new frequency of 1395kHz, from Tuesday. The signal is now audible most of the daylight hours on the West coast of the U.K., although due to Kilkenny being a long way inland, it is not too strong by the time it reaches us here. On listening around the lunchtime period, a colossal number of commercials were aired, so this long established station must be doing very well for itself. The reason for the move from 1386kHz., is possibly due to the large number of other stations which have begun to use this channel since KCR first commenced transmissions on it several years ago.

Co. LOUTH. Zee 103 from Omeath, Co. Louth, now have a slightly revised daily line - up..... 07:00 Graham Marks.....

10:00 Owen Barry..... 13:00 Kenny Tosh.... 16:00 Andrew Gold. A new U.K. chart show is being broadcast onSunday afternoons, sponsored by Golden Discs of Belfast. News can be heard during the day, on the hour, read by Georgina Clinton. Owen Barry has now left Big 'M' to work full time on this station. Several new Bill Mitchell voice - overs have been noted.

Things at Boyneside Radio in Drogheda, now seem to be almost back to normal following the raid of 15th April. In an interview on the 'Kieran Murray Free Radio Show' on Radio Rainbow this morning, 10th May, Heady Eddie said the station now has new equipment at the main studio in Donaghy's Mill, and the stereo separation is reported to be better than on the previous link transmitter which was confiscated. At present, only one FM transmitter is in use from Drogheda, on 98.2MHz. This was for security reasons, in case another raid took place. The other two transmitters on 99.1MHz and 100.1MHz are hoped to be back in service in the next week or so. The Dublin relay on 105.5MHz should also be back on in two weeks. This has been off the air in order to move transmission sites, and not because of the raid in April. Apparently some intereference to a local video recorder is the reason for having to move the site to somewhere more remote. Questions about the legality of the seizure of film from a journalist at the scene of the Boyneside Radio raid, are to be asked in the Dail by a Labour T.D. for Drogheda. The outcome is awaited with interest.

An unidentified transmission, relaying Boyneside Radio, was logged here, in the week, on 1152kHz. The second harmonic of this has been reported previously, by others, but this is the first time, we have actually heard the fundamental. It is believed to originate from the transmitters of Glenside Radio, from County Wicklow.

Co. WESTMEATH. With much perseverence and more than a basic receiver and aerial, we were able to null out our local ILR station (situated 'down the road') and receive the transmissions of Radio Midway on 999kHz. It was not an easy task, and the results were only fair, but we were able to identify same and confirm the same station address, Midway Radio, Lynn Road, Mullingar, Co. Westmeath. The station was formerly on 1494kHz. and this was easily audible here, however the management must think that 999 is better in the Mullingar area, and in fairness, a number of reports have indeed been received saying just this.

Radio West haved stated that their Dublin FM relay is now once again to be heard, this time, on 97.3MHz.

Co. GALWAY. Again, due to good FM conditions (and power cuts), Brian in Dungannon, Co. Tyrone, reports that he was able to receive County Radio from Tuam, Co. Galway, on Thursday, on 98.55MHz. Normally, Brian would get KLAS 98 from Dublin on 98.5MHz. They were without power at the time. A caller on the Radio West Anorak Show, ringing from Galway, mentioned that County Radio were doing quite well. It was also mentioned on the show, that WLS Music Radio had moved their FM transmitter, on 103.0MHz., first to 96.6MHz., then, at the request of RTE, to 97.2MHz., where they hope to remain. The only other station in Galway, is KFM, and they operate on 99.0MHz.FM, although a second channel was mentioned, again on the show,.

Co. TIPPERARY. Another caller on the Radio West show said he had been working in Nenagh, Co. Tipperary and reported the existence of an excellent new station in that town, called "Blast Off 101". We await more details on this one.

Co. KERRY. One of our colleagues, and good friend, Ian, tells us that he received a nice reply from South West Radio in Killarney, who say that they are covering the South West of Ireland on 105.0MHz.FM in stereo. They have operated from The Castle Heights Hotel for six months and according to station manager, Dermot Moriarty, are doing very well, with a very big listening audience. A welcome is extended

to anyone who is visiting Killarney, to call in at the station.

Still in the same area, does anyone know the new address of Horizon Radio, formerly of Killorglin, now located in an hotel near Tralee?



THE VOICE OF PEACE. No reports this week, but we can tell everyone that former presenter (VOP and Caroline), Tim Shepherd, has returned for a further stint, and tells us that he hopes to be able to lend a hand with the installation of the new 10 kw medium wave transmitter, which is understood to be now ready to be taken on board. The station will go into port for about a week for this purpose.

CAROLINE 558. Rough seas over the May Day holiday weekend, took their toll on the unsuspecting newcomers to the Ross Revenge. Although we didn't actually hear it ourselves, Mick Williams apparently had to finish his breakfast show early at 08:15gmt, rather rapidly after becoming ill. Kevin Turner took over the show, and continued through the morning, commenting that the ship was playing at submarines, and complaining about having to hang on to the console to stop himself falling about in the studio. At one point he mentioned that there was a sweet smell drifting into the studio, and thought that someone might be taking a shower. He said that it was a brave man who would shower in those rough conditions, and continued by mentioning that he had often fallen on his back-side whilst attempting to wash one foot, whilst standing only on the other. Mick Williams was heard in his usual slot the following afternoon, at 13:00, complete with all his required medicaments, of 'sea-legs', and a brown paper bag!

A new promotion for a Greenpeace Concert has been aired this week. The concert is to take place at Surrey University, in Guildford. For more details, including ticket availablity telephone Guildford 579437.

Following a telephone call on Thursday night, we quickly tuned to 963kHz, to find that continuous soft rock music was being played. We heard no announcements whilst we listened, and when tuning in a bit later, the signal had disappeared. Perhaps one of the D.J.'s was getting bored, or the engineer was doing some tests on the transmitter? It is looking increasingly doubtful as to whether Overdrive will ever return, as it has been off the air so long now. From conversations with some of the jocks on land, as well as the 'Overdrive' service 'not paying for itself', it looks as though the saving of both fuel and generator time, is the reason for not even relaying the 558 service when no staff are available for 'Overdrive'. Another report tells us that Tom Anderson took some records off the ship on his recent visit, in order that during the Summer months, some taped programmes could be sent out for the Overdrive service.

Finally, changes in the Sunday line - up on the station, suggested a change of staff, although, as yet, we have heard no new voices.

LASER HOT HITS Absolutely no concrete news about the operation this week. However, the extremely rough weather cannot have helped any chance there was of getting the station back on the air with a better signal. It goes without saying that, the longer the station remains silent, the more difficult it will be when, and if, they return, to establish some sort of reasonable audience. Despite what 'usually well informed sources' say, the future does look grim, to say the least. We sincerely hope everything turns out well and that we hear them again, in the not too distant future.

LAND - BASED STATIONS. This section seems to get

bigger and bigger, which is not surprising really, as more and more stations appear on the air. According to Media Monitor (see cuttings), the authorities are 'losing the fight', with well in excess of 20 stations being logged over the Easter weekend, and indeed, most weekends, in the London area. On Merseyside, as many as ten stations have been noted recently, in Birmingham, three or four and in Yorkshire/Derbyshire/Humberside, well, there seems to be a 'station explosion' at this time. Glasgow, Essex, Sussex and other areas are also well covered by pirate stations. Having said this, the authorities do have purges and one of these occurred last Sunday in the London area, where many of the stations received losses. Usually, following a London raid, a Liverpool raid occurs, suggesting a crack team of DTI trackers, travelling around the country.

MERSEYSIDE. Bank Holiday Monday, brought the stations we normally hear every Sunday. On medium wave, in addition to Radio Merseywaves, on 1242kHz, we also heard Liverpool Pirate Radio, on 1404kHz, and Radio Merseyland on 1422kHz. Over on the FM band, Radio Julie continued with their promised extended weekend broadcast, and were also heard on Monday, on their usual frequency of 104.85MHz., with an excellent signal here in Blackpool (using, quite good antenna equipment, we must hasten to add). Radio Merseywaves closed down at 21:00 on Monday, due to all the deejays appearing at the 'Night Out' in Liverpool City centre. This was the station's first break for almost three weeks. They had planned to continue but some technical problems occurred and along with the after effects of Monday night, nothing more was heard on 1242kHz. until Friday morning. After the extensive plugging on air, the night out was, according to reports, a complete sell out and the place, despite it's size, was packed. Not only were buses provided to and from the venue, but in conjunction with a local taxi firm, further transport was laid on for the benefit of the young people who had to travel even further from where the buses dropped them off. We trust that sufficient money was raised from the function to pay forthcoming fines for illegal broadcasting, expected. The station is completely funded out of the deejay's pockets, as no advertising is taken, although, having said that, certain favoured organisations do get mentioned, along with charity events and deejay's gigs, free of charge.

On Friday, Radio Merseywaves returned at an early hour, and when we tuned in at breakfast time, Dave Collins was already well into his show. He, in turn, was followed by relative newcomer, T.P. Toppick, at 10:00 and so the station continued for another weekend.

An unusual station to be heard on a Friday, was Liverpool Pirate Radio, who were noted with programming until 14:15, when Phil Davis closed the station down. Phil announced the station as broadcasting on Friday and Sundays. The frequency, as usual, was 1404kHz. The station was noted on Sunday as promised, but Phil Davis said they were operating from a different location just for this week. A new address was given although we could not make out the name of the street, which was in Liverpool 14. Radio Julie were also heard here again starting on Friday, with a strong signal on 104.85MHz. and as well as it being received in Blackpool, it was also heard on the Saddleworth side of Manchester, which gives it a very large coverage area for an FM station. They were in stereo as usual, although at our distance there was too much hiss for pleasant listening, so we had to switch to mono. At the time of printing, on Sunday afternoon, the station was still on the air with a good signal. Radio Merseyland began their normal Sunday transmissions at around 10:00 today, with Mark Evans. The station has now moved back to its previous frequency of 1395kHz, although this is now not as clear a channel as several weeks ago, due to the appearance of Kilkenny Community Radio on it, last week. A hum was noted on the signal here in Blackpool, but nearer Liverpool the signal seemed fine. Mark was having a bit of trouble early in the broadcast with some youths trying to pull down his aerial. They didn't succeed, as Radio Merseyland was still being heard during the afternoon. An unusual catch up here was CDFM, who were noted on 105.2MHz this afternoon (Sunday). The station signed off about 16:10 quite suddenly, saying it was only a test transmission, testing the aerial with 3½ watts (!).

On listening mid - afternoon, we noticed that Radio Merseyland and Liverpool Pirate Radio had disappeared despite having read out schedules for the full day's broadcasting. Both these station operate from the Liverpool side of the River Mersey and it began to look as if the DTI had switched their attention from London, to this area. We quickly tuned

to the two remaining stations, Julie and Merseywaves, who both seemed to be aware of the DTI activity in the area. In fact, they had already crossed the river and had raided a telephone box, which was being used by Radio Merseywaves for a phone - in. At about 16:45, the music stopped on Merseywaves and a few seconds later, a voice was heard to say, 'we are going off the air now', whereupon, the transmitter cut off almost before he had got his words out. Julie continued until 16:51, when their audio cut off and the transmitter went off seconds later. At this moment in time, no pirate stations are audible from Merseyside. However, further reports from 'the battlefront' tell us that the DTI have been sucessfully repelled and transmissions are set to resume at 19:00 on Merseywaves, in fact, as we go to print, a carrier has just appeared on 1242kHz.(19:30). The only loss was a microphone, when the telephone box was raided, although a number of people around the box were taken to the Police station and had their names and addresses taken.

YORKSHIRE AND HUMBERSIDE. First off, Phil has shed a bit more light on the mess on the FM band in Leeds, which we mentioned last week. On Saturday 2nd May, at around lunchtime, a station was found playing black' music on 105.8MHz, although announcing 103.7MHz. The station closed down before it could be identified. Later that same day at 17:30 an extremely distorted signal was noted on 106MHz., and this was due to a very distorted main signal by ABC FM on 94.6MHz. By 19:00 ABC had turned down the audio, giving a more readable signal, although spurious signals were still being emitted. Yet another station was logged later, om 106.75MHz, which in audio and signal level, sounded like the earlier umidentified station on 105.8MHz. So whilst we now know what went on, we still have not managed to identify the mystery signals. In South Yorkshire, a new station was heard last Sunday 3rd May, calling itself Z - FM, and broadcasting on 105.45MHz, although announcing 105.3MHz., and 'broadcasting to Sheffield and surrounding districts'. Nothing more s known about the station at present. Radio Nemesis were also on the air on the same day, on 106MHz, and were noted during the afternoon. Radio Radar, who seem to be the only station in West Yorkshire to have regular schedule, appeared as normal last Sunday between 10:00 and 17:00, on 104.7MHz, in stereo, and are now carrying quite a few commercials for local shops and businesses. They were a presenter short last week, and are currently on the look out for any budding D.J.'s. The station plays mainly mainstream pop, with an apparent bias towards disco music. In Bradford, Radio Veronica also made their usual Sunday night broadcast on 3rd May, on 105.6MHz in stereo, announcing 150 watts, although a couple of breaks in transmission were noted. We were able to monitor the station here in Blackpool, and a tape of the Rotherham station, Ocean Sound was played. Further reports tell us that they also appeared on Wednesday evening, although we failed to spot them. Apparently, they suddenly cut off, on this occasion. On Monday 4th May (May Day Bank Holiday), Music Weekend Radio on 104.9MHZ, and Ocean Sound on 106.3Mllz, were both on the air in the South Yorkshire area, and were heard after 20:00 in the evening. The latter could well do with moving down the band somewhat, as they are perilously close to mobile operators in the area. Ocean were noted locally, again, last might with their own Top Forty Show, from 17:00 untill 19:00. WLNG transmitted their usual Tuesday night programmes on 5th May, and this time were reported as to having cured the audio problems which had plagued their past few broadcasts.

DERBYSHIRE. Radio Freedom were back on the air on the Sunday and Monday of the May Day weekend. Both AM, 1242kHz, amd FM 105MHz were being used, on the 08:00 - 24:00 broadcasting hours. The AM power was reported to be 3kW and reports of it's reception came in from a very wide area, but only low power was used on FM. This station went off the air several weeks ago, due to IBA complaints, and hence more DTI activity, at the time of the launch of the Radio Trent relay in Derby.

THE MIDLANDS. Radio PCRL have been noted all week, as usual, on 103.8MHz. A number of reports said that the format seemed slightly different, and was more universally aimed, rather than completely specialist. taken, over CB. An increase in power is still on the cards, we are told. LONDON. Whilst we were compiling last week's report, it appeared that the DTI were out in force attempting to silence all the stations on the air. A report from Sid sums up the happenings over the Bank Holiday, as well as the week leading up to it. He starts by telling us that he received 24 stations during the weekend, with four of them being new stations to him..... "The 'Night of the Long Knives' had nothing on this week, as the 'Week of the Cruel Crusade of the Long Cable Cutters' proceeded cutting an un - holy swathe through the ranks of upright antennas and transmitters. Never in the field of human conflict, have so many owed so much.... Anyway, after a period when at least 18 seperate busts took place, with some stations going down at least twice, the early hours of Bank Holiday Monday morning found the FM band the quietest in months, if not years. Only Time - FM, and JBC remained along with a low powered Indian station, and they must have been wondering how much longer they would last.

It was a somewhat eerie feeling, somehow akin to August 15th 1967, tuning across the band and finding silence where once music and friendly voices had been.

This series of busts seems to have begun on Tuesday. By lunchtime, the three Greek community stations, and LWR had disappeared. The Greeks had returned by Friday, but LWR was still missing on Bank Holiday Monday night, tending to suggest that they had lost more than an aerial. Probably the remote links and possibly even a studio.

Busts and Bank Holidays, always seem to bring up new senders, and this weekend saw no difference. Of the six new contacts this week, two unidentified stations, and the confusingly named C - FM (Capital's alternative weekend FM service uses the same call sign), were black music based. The 'C' of C - FM stands for Calibre.

Not Alice's Restaurant came on the air at mid-day on Bank Holiday Monday, but had disappeared by 21:00 Busted??? They came up on what is due to be R - FM's new frequency, and may in fact be our old friends with a tribute to the now defunct Alice's outfit, with a wide range of album rock.

The remaining two are of uncertain identity, but (possibly) London Rock on 92.2MHz came up with a harder eighties style new wave rock format on Bank Holiday Monday evening. Not exactly polished in presentation, but the use of two presenters is unusual for a pirate station.

(Possibly) Radio Badger came up on 92.1MHz on Sunday night, and possibly even Monday night, but were blotted out by (possibly) London Rock. They had a Top Forty format.

Studio 1 continued their identity confusion campaign this week. Last week they masqueraded as LBC overnight. This week they relayed BBC Radio 2 in the early hours of Sunday morning. This didn't seem to deter the DTI when they came along later on Sunday, and took their transmitter away for the second time in a week.

Missing this week, were Network 21, R-FM (but could have appeared as Not Alices Restaurant), Elite-FM, and Radio Gemini. Radio Vicky has not been of for some weeks now, either".

RADIO STATION NEWS....IRELAND. DUBLIN.

The birthday/anniversary season continues and this week falls on Monday (tomorrow), when it is four years since the great Irish radio station raids of 1983. Briefly, the raids started at about 10:00 on this day, when the authorities arrived at the studios of Radio Nova at 19 Herbert Street, Dublin. Eventually, the station was silenced, but not before breakfast show deejay, Declan Meehan had presented a moteworthy 45 minute 'pre - raid show'. The station lost all equipment, but still managed to return the following day, to report on the subsequent raid on Sunshine Radio. The station then closed down in a massive blaze of glory, the day after this, only to return a further time, the following day, this time for good, at least until the station closed down last year. A documentary cassette of all these exciting happenings is still available from us, narrated by John Lewis, priced at £5.00 and entitled 'The Great Irish Radio Experiment - The End?'

Radio Carousel also celebrate at this time, today in actual fact, when they celebrate nine years on the air. Our best wishes to them, of course.

Back to reality now, though, and on with the report. The news we printed last week about Energy 103 being up for sale, was confirmed as correct during the week by a member of the station. The cutting of the original advert from a U.S. magazine is reprinted below.

'Lisa', George Long and Tina Gates. More emphasis is being put on the music content of the programmes, we are told. A new name, John Power, was noted last Sunday evening. John used to work for Q 102. The jackpot for the big telephone competition has now reached £11,200. The phrase 'I Love Energy 103' must be repeated.


Whilst Sunshine 101 and Energy 103 are busy plugging their giveaways, rival Q 102 goes and does it again! During the Greg Gaughran show on Wednesday last, the three records were played in a certain order and the tenth caller, Geraldine Tyrell from Kilcock in neighbouring County Kildare, won £4,000. It was only a few weeks since the station gave away £6,200 in the same competition. According to Radio West, the station plans to change around and add to it's FM outlets. We understand that **Treble T.R. Radio** have plans to increase their listening area by introducing further transmitters further afield. At present, they operate two medium waves, 945 and 891kHz., at least two FM's.

Weekly Report correspondent in Dublin, Vincent Kennedy, is concerned about interference caused to BBC and RTE transmissions in the band 88.0 to 94.7MHz. He suggests that in order to minimise harrassment and raids, due to alleged interference to legal broadcasters, the independent stations should stay well clear of this sub band. Another area to avoid is around 96 - 97MHz., which RTE often use for their outside brodcast unit links. The avoidance of these frequencies, especially when a lot of power is being used, is essential in order for the independent stations to keep a low profile in this time of proposed legislation. We apologise to Vincent for being unable to re print his letter in full, due to lack of space, but feel we have expressed his comments and advice in brief, adequately. We should like to thank him for this correspondence and would welcome any further comments and advice.

Co. LOUTH. We were delighted, but not too surprised, to hear test transmissions this morning, for the forthcoming 'Solid Gold Radio Sovereign'. The transmissions commenced around 09:00, on 1521kHz., with an excellent signal here

in Blackpool. Short wave (Europe - wide) and FM (locally) were mentioned in the tests, which consisted of occasional records (oldies, of course), the excellent Sovereign jingles and regular announcements. A mailing address for reception reports was read out, it was..... Radio Sovereign, c/o Now Radio Communications, P.O. Box 45, Kettering, Northants. NN16 ONW. The station plans to broadcast on all the above frequencies, from 06:00 until 18:00, daily. Radio Rainbow took over the frequency for their regular Sunday morning free radio show, with Kieran Murray.

Reports from further North still, in Omeath, tell us that Zee 103, on 103.25MHz.FM, stereo, 24 hours daily, have a new Summer schedule which commenced on 4th

Co. WESTMEATH. Radio West were noted with an extremely good signal today, on 702kHz. According to station owner, Sean Coyne, the transmitter was running at 10 kw. Calls were received from some quite distant places. Currently, the weekday line - up reads.... 07:00 Don Allen, 10:00 Derek Flood, 14:00 Willie Hart. The evenings consist of various specialist shows.

Co. DONEGAL. Not a great deal to report from this quarter, although, today, colleague, Brian in Dungannon tells us that he has received Westside Radio on 1125kHz. He believes it to come from the Donegal direction, although a station called Melvyn Community Radio has occupied this channel, along with Radio Carousel, for some time. Whether the latter has gone off, or changed names, or what, we, at this stage, do not know. We await further information.

THE VOICE OF PEACE. No reports from the Mediterranean

this week. CAROLINE. We left last week uncertain as to the changes in staff. We now find that several staff left the ship last weekend, but no one new was sent out. Those D.J.'s who left were Dave James and Mick Williams. The cook, along with transmitter engineer, Peter Chicago are also understood to now be enjoying shore leave. This has meant a doubling up of shows for two of the jocks, John Tyler and Tony Peters. Kevin Turner is also probably doubling up as the cook, and giving the rest on board a taste of his delicacies! The heating system on the ship broke down during the week, which was rather unfortunate as the weather was very cold at the time. Plenty of moans and groans from those left on board were heard. Mike the engineer managed to fix it, although Kevin Turner mentioned on Saturday morning that the weather was now warm, and they would probably have to switch it back off. Saturday, being 'Cup Day', was also 'Sports Afternoon' on the ship, and plenty of 'stick' was

LASER 'HOT HITS'. Not a lot to report here, like last week, except to mention that the vessel now has definitely got new backers and a new injection of money is hoped to put the station back on the air, although certainly not for at least 3 weeks. Apparently, the previous owners backed out owing a lot of money for fuel and provisions. Let us hope that the station will get back on the air before the Summer starts, as this is the time when weather conditions will permit

a continuous signal to attract advertisers.

LAND-BASED STATIONS. MERSEYSIDE. The DTI activity in the area last Sunday appeared to only culminate in one station actually being raided, Liverpool Pirate Radio, during which the station is understood to have lost all its equipment. Radio Merseyland went off the air having heard about the LPR raid, and both Merseywaves and Julie went off later when the DTI appeared in their area. None of the letter three were raided and Merseywaves duly returned to the air shortly afterwards (see last week's report) and continued transmissions, un interupted, until close - down at about 00:40 on Tuesday morning. The station was next noted making an early start to this weekend, during Thursday night/Friday morning. However, early on Friday morning, during the Dave Collins breakfast show, the DTI surprisingly turned up and raided the station at 08:11. The station obviously had little security at this time, probably thinking that no DTI man in his right mind would turn out before mid-morning. They did though, and in the process, two staff, including Dave were caught, and all the studio gear was taken. They apparently were leaving without the transmitter, when one of the officials dropped a pen on the settee. On reaching to get it, he noticed that the cushions were a bit hard, and found a false bottom in it, which when removed, revealed the transmitter. Radio Merseywaves apparently returned to the air later that evening, but were not heard here. Nothing was noted on Saturday, until in the evening, the station re - appeared once again, on 1242kHz., although a whistle on the signal (heterodyne) made listening at a distance, and at night a bit uncomfortable. No doubt Burt will have rectified the situation by next week however. The station is still on air at the time of writing, although Burt was not available to do his show this week again. Radio Julie also re - appeared at this time (Saturday night), their first appearance since vanishing on Sunday afternoon. They were of course, on their usual frequency of 104.85MHz. They were heard as late (or as early!) as 07:00 on Sunday morning, but vanished shortly after this and we haven't heard them since. We are not sure at this time what has happened to them. Radio Merseyland also duly appeared on Sunday morning, on 1395kHz., with just a fair signal.

A new station calling itself 'Radio 976' was heard here from Saturday morning, 16th May, on 976kHz. (off channel). One of the presenters was from the old days of Radio Jackie North, Rick Dane. The other was announcing himself as Steven Bishop, and is presumably the one who use to run MFR in the area, several years ago. The signal level is fair here in Blackpool, but the audio level is a bit low, and muffled. All the same it is nice to see a new station on the air, and we wish them all the best.

Tim Jackson, in his report on Merseyside activity, mentions that last Sunday but one (3rd May), Widnes FM were raided and lost all their studio gear. Also, he was able to tell us the mailing address of Liverpool Pirate Radio, which we could not quite copy, last week, it was.... LPR, 9a Altfinch Close, Fincham, Liverpool L14 8YG. He also mentions Slag - Off International, on 105.2MHz. and Concept Radio, on 104.3MHz., as being heard by him last Sunday. Further reports of other low powered operations are mentioned too, but apart from one, Ross FM, no identifications were made or reported. In a 'phone - in' on Merseywaves last Sunday afternoon, just before the DTI appeared, a caller claimed he was the operator of Scott FM. This station has been mentioned before, although we have been unable to hear

it, at this distance (50 miles).

All in all, a bad patch for our friends in the North West,

although, knowing them, they will soon get over it and things will return to normal. At this stage, we are not convinced all this DTI activity is all over, as, at the time of printing, both Merseyland and Radio 976 have both gone off. Whether they signed off normally, is not known

at this stage.

MANCHESTER. Due to problems with getting a good signal out, on FM, Sunshine Radio made some test transmissions on 1332kHz medium wave during Saturday 16th May. Due to Boyneside Radio operating om the same channel, we were unable to hear these tests ourselves. I.C.R. were on the air from the Mosside area of the city on Saturday. They play black/reggae music on 103Mhz., athough the transmitter does tend to drift.

YORKSHIRE AND HUMBERSIDE. In Leeds, Music City Radio were reported to have returned to the air on Friday night, 15th May, following a break of several weeks. Programming was also heard beginning during Saturday afternoon. The signal was as good as previously on 90.3Mhz, although stereo was not noted. ABC - FM were back on the air on Tuesday night, 12th May, on 94.6MHz. The problems with spurious signals which they had on their last broadcast have now been cleared up, and the transmitter is now 'clean'. Radio Radar were on the air in stereo, with their usual 10:00 - 17:00 broadcast last Sunday. Some 'Radio Radar' T-shirts are being printed for the station, and will be advertised over the air, when they are available. The station was received in Bradford in stereo and our reporter there tells us that he rather enjoyed the oldies programme they put out. The station have been reported as being on the air again today, since 10:00 this morning. Leaving Leeds, we go across to Bradford, where Radio Veronica have only been heard on the odd occasion (last Sunday, 20:15 until 01:30), due to work being carried out to make the transmitter more 'portable'. The power has now been reduced to around 90 watts, but a more efficient aerial means that the signal output should not be reduced by too much. The station operators Steve and Christine, have been complaining about L.F. Hunters, who look as though they are DTI officials, causing the station to have to switch off prematurely. Once again, Radio Z - FM were heard in the Sheffield area last Sunday evening, presumably on 105.45MHz., although no frequency was mentioned in the report at fuend. Across in Scunthorpe, WLNG continue to broadcast on 104.9MHz, amd were heard by our reporters on Tuesday evening. In South Yorkshire, Occean Sound have been heard on various evenings in the week, and weekends, on 106.3MHz. Your host for all these shows is D.J. 'Robert'. A bit out of this area, in Derbyshire, N FM were on the air on Wednesday night. The frequency was 105.3MHz.

CLASCOW. Neon Radio made a two hour broadcast this afternoon, on 99.5MHz. They have also been on the air on various nights during the week. Radio Mercury were supposed to be on the air, today, on 96.1MHz., featuring some interviews from the Paisley Beer Festival. owever, at the time of printing, no reports of this being so, are at and.

vening, on 105.25MHz. "Continuous Music Radio" were also heard ne same evening, on 94.25MHz. Radio PCRL have once again been the air all week, on 103.8MHz. Second City Radio, who normally aroadcast all weekend, were only noted today, on 93.0MHz.

LONDON AREA. Correspondent, Sid kindly sends us this report about last weekend's operations.... "A slightly quieter weekend with 18

contacts, 16 of which were confirmed and 8 in stereo.

Not heard or missing this week, Southside, South West Sound, Elite - FM, Radio Gemini, Greek Community Radio, unidentified Greek station (presumably busted again), and Studio 1, not yet returned from losing their previous transmitter.

For a change this week, there is news about rock stations, but orrections to last week's logs first. Radio Badger is now thought to e London Town. London Rock gave no call sign last week and were ack again this week, again with no ID's. They had a mixture of Top orty and New Wave Rock. The real London Rock, however, made hesitant start on Saturday evening with what they claim to be, their first transmission. It sounded like it! they sounded inexperienced, with bitty presentation and lots of dead air. Give time, this should improve, long with their signal (which was equally dreadful), to give us another rock station. They can be contacted through the R - FM mailing address. FM returned after a week's break, on a new frequency of 94.3 MHz., with a very strong stereo signal. Presentation was as polished as ever. Programming is Sunday mid - day until Sunday mid - night. They did say that they had nothing to do with 'Not Alice's Restaurant', which came up on the same frequency (but in mono), the previous week. With three rock stations intermittantly on the air, rock music fans can look forward to a brighter listening future, especially when R - FM go to their long - awaited six days a week operation. Network 21 returned this week with a strong stereo signal, to give their first full weekend schedule since they lost a transmitter in mid - March, although they have been on the air on odd days since. They are now publishing a Metwork 21 Newsletter and promise those who write into Network 21, 136 Regents Street, London W.l., a free record in return. Programming was, as usual, diverse and very listenable. Quest - FM seem to be having emgineering problems. This weekend has seen their signal drifting up and down the FM band and the strength of their signal going from very strong and clean, to weak and distorted., This has meant at times, that both RJR and RTR have been blotted out in much of South London. Finally, it was learned, with some dismay, from the (TX) Info - Line (10) 1 400 8282) that a presenter, DJ - C had recently been convicted. He was fined a massive £850 and remanded in custody, presumably for sentencing. It is true that we do not know the full circumstances behind the conviction, but it does seem incredible that in 1987, a man can go to jail for wanting to play records on the rdaio, to entertain people. It is a timely reminder that the cat and mouse game between the private stations and the DTI is deadly serious. With money only at stake for the station operators and personal liberty at stake for station presenters.

The need for caution in setting up studios to counter the activities of the KGB like DTI units has been doubly emphasised. It is a salutary thought to remember that the stakes for the presenters are now so high, that this is now, no longer a game to be played by the enthusiastic amateur, but has moved into the realms of the dedicated underground professional.

Our thanks, as always for that report. Sid goes on to list stations logged last week, not mentioned by our reporters at that time..... CDR on 89.6MHz., Quest FM on around 90MHz., UNID. A little bit out of the area, but we will include it here, Isis FM were heard broadcasting around Oxford/Aylesbury, last Sunday night. The frequency was 105MHz., with a power of 25 watts. They hope to

be on again later today, we understand.

CDR on 88.6MHz., RTR on 90.2MHz., TKO(carrier only) on 90.5MHz., Sky on 91.8MHz., LWR on 92.1MHz., Solar on 93.0MHz., KISS - FM on 94.0MHz., RFM on 94.3MHz., Traffic FM on 97.8MHz., Time FM on 103.7MHz., JBC on 104.7MHz, LGR on 104.9MHz. Also heard during the week was Studio One on 92.8MHz. An unidentified station playing soul music was also logged on Saturday on 90.8MHz.

Terry in Middlesex reports that he has been listening to a Radio Badger on 91.9MHz., which he tells us he listens to most weekends, also a Flashback Radio with test transmissions, and featuring many Bill Mitchell voice overs. He gave us no frequency on the, latter, although we presume this to be the Bank Holiday station which usually broadcasts to West London on around 90.2MHz.

THE SOUTH COAST. ABC Radio 97.8MHz. The station has returned to the airwaves on Monday evenings, after a few weeks off the air for staff holidays. RADIO STATION NEWS....IRELAND.

First off this week, we must give the proposed magazine from Radio West a mention. This magazine is to be published during the Summer months, and all articles to be included in it should reach Sean Coyne, at Radio West in the next 2 or 3 weeks. Sean is hoping that all Irish private stations will have a section each, so it should certainly be a thorough publicaton. Any other interesting articles about Irish radio will also be welcomed at Radio West, West House, Patrick Street, Mullingar, Co. Westmeath, Eire. The station has introduced a relay for Galway, on 100.1MHz., although as yet, only a blank carrier has been noted.

Co. DUBLIN. Once again, the station in the news is Energy 103, where expansion seems to be the name of the game. The news service appears to be the first target, and bulletins on the hour (also on the half hour at peak times), all day, are set to return. Popular Nova news man (more recently at Q 102), Bob Gallico, has joined the station and his first bulletin is expected to be heard at 07:00 tomorrow (Monday). He teams up with current 'news girl', Lisa and breakfast jock Pat, to present a 'Zoo - type' breakfast show. Tina Gates takes over after lunch and George Long will also be heard at other times. Further recruitment on this side is possible we understand. Tony Allan, presenter of the 'Drive time' show for the past two and a half weeks, 'moved on' mid week last and Tony McKenzie replaced him, but not before he left scores of excellent promos in his wake including many for competitions and for the station generally. One such jingle suggests that Energy is the training ground for RTE, another tells a 'would - be' deejay how to stand a chance of getting on the station.... by sticking tape over his mouth! The Energy private line has been introduced and calls with suggestions and the like will be accepted at all times on (01) 606703. The jackpot prize for their big competition is now up to £11,900. 'I Love Energy 103' is the key phrase here. Every Thursday during May, random dates are read out, and lucky callers with birthdays on this date get a prize (it is Energy's birthday during May). Some good prizes have been won, and we understand that next Thursday, the last one, several big prizes are waiting to be claimed. They include a crate of champagne, a CD player and a camping holiday. Well in excess of 100 prizes will have been given away by the time next Thursday is over.

At Q 102, the 'Eye in the Sky' had a different voice on it this week, with Dave Kelly standing in for Mickey Joe (Mike Hogan), who is set to return to his 'high' position, on Tuesday. Despite his early start, Dave also presented

his normal 10:00 till 14:00 show, each day.

Sunshine Radio have introduced yet another FM transmitter, this time on 101.8MHz. This is in addition to 100.5, 101.0. 101.5MHz., 531 and 846kHz. A full page advert in today's Sunday World seems to be seeking additional presenters for the station. This, along with mentions of another name, plus the six transmitters, can only suggest that a second service is very imminent. Perhaps this is what 'the big cahoona' is all about.

Co. TIPPERARY. Centre Radio in Clonmel have now got a relay on 104MHz., in Cahir, with a power of 80 watts. The station can also be heard on 1251kHz. and locally on

FM, possibly 88.1 and/or 101.0MHz.

Co. SLIGO. Chris reports that Westside Radio are the only station on the air in this town. They broadcast on FM, 97.5MHz, and although have apparently recently reduced their broadcasting time by several hours down to 11:00 - 17:00.

Co. KILDARE. A request for new presenters for the Naas station, Zee 104 was made in a live call to Radio West this morning, by station owner Nigel Gordon. The number to ring was (045) 75296.



Co. DONEGAL. The station heard by Brian last Sunday, identifying as Westside Radio (a different one from the Sligo station of the same name), later announced that it was operating from Mountcharles, which is a few miles west of Donegal Town. They are operating on 1125kHz

Also in this area, Brian logged a relay of RTE Radio 2 on 1566kHz. This is understood to be a test in preparation for yet another station, actually in Donegal Town itself. As yet we have no more details about the name, although in a telephone call to the Radio West Anorak show this morning, Andy Ellis of ABC Radio, mentioned the name as KTOK and stated that he had actually received it after dark. Also in this county, Radio Nova has not been heard on either AM or FM, for at least a week, although a blank carrier was noted on the FM channel. NWCR were also off the air, on 1008kHz., today.

Co. LOUTH. The tests from Radio Sovereign which we mentioned last week, came to an end at 17:00 on Sunday evening, 17th May. No more transmissions were heard until Wednesday, when the same test tape was aired throughout the day on 1521kHz. According to Now Radio, the broadcast team is currently being sorted out, and will be announced in a couple of weeks. The tests were heard again, today, briefly, along with the regular Radio Rainbow Free Radio Show at mid - day.



THE VOICE OF PEACE. A letter reaches us from Mike Davis, with a brief run down of news from the past couple weeks. The ship went into Ashdod Port on Sunday, 10th May 1987, and the new 10kW AM transmitter arrived the following day, along with Tim Shepherd. The overhauled Perkins generator was also returned to the ship. The transmitter was hoisted aboard, along with its P.S.U.. Both units being very compact, but quite heavy, as all the D.J.'s and male office staff found out, when they assisted in moving it about the ship. Over the next few days Noam, and Tim Shepherd, assisted by Tony Stevens (engineer), as well as others, assembled the transmitter from 10 crates of parts. A spring clean of the ship was also undertaken, with Abie also helping with brush and dust pan in hand. The AM aerial was also repaired, and the ships 2nd engineer Radha, spent many hours at the top of the mast attaching it. After many problems, it was finally hoisted aloft, and is still there. The aerial has now been attached to the transmitter, but the station is now awaiting an inspection from a Ministry of

Communications official for insurance purposes, before transmissions on AM can resume. FM broadcasts resumed on Thursday 14th May 1987, with reduced power of 6kW (24kW ERP), due to a fault. When a new part is received, full power will resume. The new AM transmitter is a Nautel 10kW unit, and is of solid state, modular construction. It is understood to be tuned to 1539kHz. (The station broadcast on 1530kHz when last on AM, and could be received occasionally in the U.K.)

On the programme side, Dave Asher has now left, and Neil Armstrong is about to return to the U.K. Tim Shepherd has returned as an engineer, as well hosting the breakfast

shows. Other staff remain as before.

LASER 'HOT HITS'. A report from a subscriber in the week, who took a trip to see the radioships last Sunday, mentioned that strange things were going on around the Communicator. It now appears from radar checks, that the m.v. Communicator is no longer in the Knock Deep Channel. At this point in time we have no further details, but hope to have some real news about the vessel next week.

CAROLINE. Being short staffed once more this week, the station reverted to a 20 hour schedule, with the following line-up. 05:00 Kevin Turner... 09:00 Tony Peters... 13:00 John Tyler... 17:00 Tony Peters... 19:00 John Tyler... 21:00 David Foster... 01:00 Closedown. Steve Conway continues to read the news throughout the day, with the intro music now being played in the background, throughout the duration of the bulletins. A severe northerly wind during the week, incurred its wrath on the Ross Revenge and its crew. However they managed to battle through all the records being thrown about, microphones moving, half way through a link, and studio chairs about to fall over. A new promo for the Caroline Rock Show has been heard, for its venue in Bury St. Edmunds. A second was heard today, for a venue in Chatham, on Friday night next.

As expected, a staff change began to take place this morning (24th May), with John Tyler being heard on the mid - morning show, followed by the return of Peter Philips at 13:00. At the time of printing, 17:00, a new voice was heard, introducing himself, after the first record, as Andy Robin. Andy has previously worked offshore, on the Voice of Peace. It is not known at this stage whether 24 hour operation will return, or in fact, if any other presenters

are on board, or who indeed, has come off the ship.

LAND - BASED STATIONS. MERSEYSIDE. From stories we have received here during the week, it appears as though the DTI were let into the Radio Merseywaves studio on 15th May, without a warrant. However, as far as we know under the Telecom Act which was passed around a year ago, the DTI do have the authority to forcibly enter premises, without a warrant, which are suspected of having an unlicensed transmitter within them. A warrant is normally obtained however 'to keep everyone happy'. Radio Julie were in Birkenhead Magistrates Court on Tuesday, and this time were fined a total of £200, including costs. The court case was apparently well attended with supporters, and many members of the other stations on Merseyside were also present. The station have been back on the air this weekend, although we did not hear them until Saturday night, when they were putting in a good signal at this location. Their frequency as usual was 104.85MHz.

Last Sunday we were left wondering if there was still going to be some DTI activity in the area. In fact, whilst we were printing at 16:15, Radio Merseyland were actually being raided, and we understand that the station lost all its equipment. Radio 976, who also went off around this time, were back on the air on Monday morning, on 976kHz, and so were not involved in this activity. They were not logged any other day during the week, until Friday, when they reappeared on a different frequency of 936kHz, under the name of Radio Atlantis. An FM frequency is also promised, and in increase in the MW power for next week. This station were also heard with several adverts for shops in the area. Still only two presenters, Rick Dane and Steven Bishop have been heard on the station, which was giving an address for reception reports of 150 Rake Lane, Wallasey, Merseyside. Radio Merseywaves, who returned to the air soon after last weeks raid, were not heard either late on Sunday night, or all day Monday. They were having a few technical problems on Sunday afternoon, so this is thought to be the reason for their absence for the rest of the weekend. Two FM stations were logged here late on Sunday, 17th May. Slag Off International were heard on 105.3MHz, with programming at around 20:15. They are thought to have been heard earlier by Wayne Turner when they returned, slightly off their normal

at 18:00, but went off suddenly apparently due to the electricity supply cutting off. CDFM were also monitored with a brief transmission before 21:00 that evening, on 105.2MHz, right next to Slag Off. CDFM were the stronger of the two signals here in Blackpool.

YORKSHIRE & HUMBERSIDE. One station which we failed to mention last week, was Radio Nemesis, who were operating on Saturday afternoon on 106MHz. These were apparently test transmissions. Sunday night seems to be the best time for listeners in Leeds, with several stations being heard on May 18th. With Radio Radar finishing their regular shows on 104.7MHz, at 17:00 you could have tuned around to four other stations. For those into black music, both Music City Radio on 90.3MHz, and ABC - FM on 94.6MHz were on the air. As from Friday evening, 22nd May, MCR are once again broadcasting in stereo, also with excellent audio. ABC are still having problems with their audio. Ocean Sound can be heard with a more pop type format around the south of the city, on 106.3MHz, with apparently a very entertaining show. They are now broadcasting in stereo. A split channel operation was noted today, with apparently the 106.3MHz transmitter being called Ocean Sound East, and on 105.2MHz an Ocean Sound West. The latter frequency being supplied by Z-FM. Radio Veronica on 105.5MHz, provide a more speech orientated programme, and are usually on later in the evening. WLNG were noted as normal on Tuesday night, 19th May. However they seemed to be having a few technical problems. Z - FM were promising to be on the air on Wednesday night, but we have no reports as yet of them being heard. They were on the air this afternoon however. The address of ZFM was announced as the same as Ocean Sound, c/o 4 Milton Court, Swinton, S64 8RE.

Much further South, a North Midlands Radio was heard in that area on 105.5MHz, during Sunday morning (today).

THE MIDLANDS. Wrekin Radio were the only station reported on air today and they were on 105.2MHz. UK Radio were on air last Sunday evening anbd are expected to be back once

again, tonight. Their frequency is 105.25MHz.

GLASGOW. Radio Mercury did appear last week, although problems with the tape machine meant that only part of the show went out. They are on the air again today, on 96.1 MHz. and, in fact, are repeating last week's unheard show. Some new jingles have been noted. Neon Radio have been heard almost every night this past week, and also today, for one hour over lunchtime, from 13:00 to 14:00, on around 99.5MHz. They are also understood to be broadcasting a syndicated IBA programme on Saturday nights, which the local station, Radio Clyde, does not take.

LONDON. In his report on the past week, Sid tells us that he identified all 19 of the stations he heard (6 in stero), including two new ones, MRS and London Town, who were

both in mono.

Missing or not heard this weekend of 17th May, were Southside, South West Sound, Radio Gemini, Phase 1, and RJR. Have we heard the last of Elite FM? Like Peoples Choice Radio before it, they were broadcasting from the North Surrey area, where London Town now appear to be coming from. London Rock failed to make its second official appearance this Saturday (16th May), leaving R-FM as the only rock station onair this week.

Lunchtime on Sunday saw R-FM coming loud and clear in South London on 94.3MHz., although in Central London it sounded like another station was trying to break through. Broadcasting hours were given as 10:0023:00, which is different from their previous schedule. Transmissions had disappeared by 21:00 when they were next checked. R-FM are looking to expand in the near future, and are now looking for new presenters. Those interested should send a thirty minute tape to R-FM, 291 Cricklewood Lane, London NW2 2JL. Maybe, somewhere buried deep in the London suburbs, there is a budding Wolfman Jack waiting to be discovered

The only only non-black music stations on the air this weekend, were Network 21, still offering free records, and London Town on 92.65MHz. London Town appeared Sunday afternoon with back-to-back all hits/oldies format. DJ links were kept to a minimum. Station announcements, solicited advertisers for the station, which would be broadcasting, Central, South, and West London on Saturdays and Sundays. It sounded very professionally put together, with a strong signal in South London and North Surrey. Reception suffered in Central London by being sandwiched between a much improved Studio 1 and the Guildford BBC Radio 4 main relay.

LWR's non-appearance at the end of the week was explained

ifrequency of 92.05MHz., early on Saturday morning. He referred to technical difficulties, which had been bugging them through the week and had finally caused them to go off air two days earlier. While their engineers had been sorting out the transmitters, others had move the location of the studio from the 32nd to the 31st floor! Sound quality at this point was not up to the usual standard, with lots of clicks, and a hum in the background. Transmissions continued on like this, with stereo being promised for later Saturday night, until Sunday morning when programmes stopped again. By the evening, transmissions had recommenced and this time the engineers ahd sorted everything out, and they were back to a good quality mono signal on their normal frequency.

TKO had drifted down the band from their nroaml position to 90.4MHz, which brought them perilously close to the Guildford Radio 3 TX on 90.3MHz. This could be the reason

why they had disappeared by Sunday lunchtime.

Mighty Quest - FM, on 89.85MHz, have sorted out their signal probelms this weekend, although it is understood they


had a couple of days off during the week.

Studio 1 had also returned by Friday evening 15th May on 92.85MHz, with a strong clear signal, and no overnight relays of other stations. A new station MRS on 94.3MHz, was identified in the early hours of Saturday morning, and may well have been testing on Friday evening, as snatches of music were heard intermittently, on the same frequency. Programming was continuous live mixing of soul music, with an obvious club DJ, providing links and ID's.

It looks as though the Greek stations were hit again this week, as none were on-air Friday evening, but had all

me-appeared by Saturday evening.

Stations heard starting on Friday night, over the Bank Holiday Weekend include CDR on 88.7MHz, Rock To Rock on 90.4MHz, TKO on 90.6MHz, Phase 1 FM on 90.9MHz, Sky FM on 91.8MHz, LWR on 92.05MHz, Solar 93 on 93.1MHz, KISS - FM on 93.9MHz, R - FM on 94.3MHz, Traffic FM on 97.8MIIz, Time - FM on 103.7MHz, and JBC on 103.7 MHz. Listeners to R - FM in East London / Essex, thad a few problems this afternoon, with a foreign language station obliterating all other signals between 94.1 and 94.5MHz. The origin of this signal is not known. Around 92.0MIIz there was also a station relaying Radio Caroline, directly off air. Again, the source of this was not known. ESSEX. The DTI struck in this area last weekend, with a massive raid on Canvey Radio, on Sunday 17th May, at 15:30. We understand that the raid consisted of 6 DTI men. along with 4 police cars. The raid was obviously well planned, as the station had many look outs, and the DTI apparently turned up in hired vans, and not the expected cars. We understand that they went after the studio site, and not the main FM transmitter, which was remote and accessed wia a link. All the studio gear was taken including a CD player, and a spectrum analyser. Only the records on the tturntable were taken however. One man was charged with operating the station. Due to the raid, Radio Hot Wire on 105.8MIIz closed down shortly after beginning their own transmissions. This was for security reasons, as suspicious vehicles had been seen in their area the previous week,



probably checking out the stations exact location.

The only station in this area which was reported today, was a Canvey Community Radio, which was heard on 93.0 MHz.

We are not sure if this is the same station that was raided last week, as the frequency is much different.

The operator of Free Medway Town Radio (F.M.T.R.), was in front of Sheerness Magistrates Court during the week, and suffered a rather nasty shock when the sentence was announced. Guilty was the verdict, on all three charges (three seperate transmissions, on three dates), with a fine of £200 on each charge. Along with the costs this came to a total of £620. To top it all, every item taken by the DTI at the time of the raid, was ordered to be confiscated, which included cartridge machines, mixers, and three transmitters. All in all, a bad day, with the fine being the highest we know of against a shortwave free radio operator.

We were a bit confused as to what was happening around 6217kHz, with ourselves hearing Riverside Radio, and others hearing B.R.I. We later thought we heard B.R.I. on 6232kHz.,


but signals at that time were poor.

RADIO STATION NEWS......IRELAND. Co. DUBLIN. The main Dublin news revolves not around a station, but around a news reader this week. We do feel that no one is indispensible, but in this case it appears that whichever news service is employing Bob Gallico, that becomes the one to tune to. Bob's reliability, voice and general professionalism is doubtless the reason. As was mentioned last week, Bob Gallico did indeed appear on Energy 103, beginning last Monday morning. He read his first news at 07:00, along with Lisa Moore. The two newsreaders, and D.J. Pat Courtney then went on to present a 'Morning Zoo' type show and have done so each week day since. A full news service has returned to the station, with Sybil Fennell also being heard, along with Bob, on the main news at 13:00, with Tina Gates and George Long being heard at other times. On the other hand, poor Q - 102, must not have been expecting the loss of a newsreader, as the morning news bulletins have been a bit sparse this week, to say the least. Martin Block was heard during the first few days, with Brian Jennings filling in on Thursday and Friday. On numerous occasions, no news was featured at all, up to the hour, as is the norm, although Anne Cassin was heard after lunch and throughout the afternoons, all week. An advert was being run up until Thursday, for a replacement newsreader. All the usual qualifications were needed, and auditions were to be held all week, no doubt to have the successful person on air by tomorrow morning. We now await to see who will have been accepted for that post. Mike Hogan duly re - appeared on Tuesday last, 'high in the sky' with his traffic service "Eye in the Sky". Although the traffic situation is well covered, much more emphasis is placed on entertainment in the 'links' with the 'copter. Even callers to the phone in feature "I Hate That.... " are linked up, with some very entertaining ones noted at times. The service takes a long weekend off, due to the Irish Bank Holiday, and returns on Tuesday at 08:30. A bit of a mystery here, on Friday morning, Energy's Lisa Moore, was heard to say, after a traffic report, 'traffic news from Fiat's 'Eye in the Sky'. Have the stations done a deal or was it just taken and mistakenly credited to them? The answer next week!

Sunshine Radio's "Big Cahoona" also offers someone a D.J. job on their station, in return for a 30 second telephone audition, according to one promo we heard. We have to admit that we don't fully understand exactly what it all means, but maybe that is the idea, to keep people interested and listening. If anyone reading this does, please drop us a line and we can fully explain what this "Big Cahoona" business is all about. In the meantime, of course, stay tuned in! Boy George has been heard on one promo for this, and Samatha Fox on another.

Just turning to the reception side of the above three Dublin 'Super - pirates', for a moment, listeners in the North West of England seem to be suffering from lower power signals, hence interference from other stations on the same or adjacent channel. Energy's 738kHz. channel is without question, the best for high power, with nothing within many hundreds of miles on there, and little of any significance either side. However, power has gradually gone down and down and listening on a simple receiver, even on the West coast of the U.K. is very poor indeed. After dark is totally out of the question. Q 102, on the other hand, have a good signal on 819kHz., but even so, Cavan Community Radio can be heard playing merrily away underneath, during quieter passages of music, or speech. As a result the signal 'wobbles' on a modest receiver. We always thought that Q should have gone on 846kllz., back at the start, although Sunshine have since taken this channel, which is very good, except that two local North West England BBC stations sit either side, which can cause some splatter on less selective sets. Finally, Sunshine's initial channel, 531kHz., still remains a favourite, although they use very much lower power there now, than previously, which is a shame. All the above, really applies to listeners on the North West coast, once one travels a little way inland, even these signals drop off considerably. Still, there is always the 'after dark' skip for them to listen out for.

A feature in the "RTE Guide" on the subject of 24 hour operation of Radio 2, included details of new recruits, ex - pirates, Colm Hayes and Gerry Stevens. A photo of Colm Hayes was included, to go along with the fact that he was about to present his first show at 18:02 this evening.

Finally on Dublin, colleagues, Ian and Ken had a run to the coast,

Finally on Dublin, colleagues, Ian and Ken had a run to the coast, last weekend, to Portpatrick, near Stranraer, and found a suitable high place and checked the Dublin FM scene. All the usual Dublin stations were logged, plus stations in Counties Westmeath and Louth. Additionally, Radio North from Co. Donegal was logged on 96.1 and 97.7MHz. Zee 103, we are told, was by far the strongest signal received.

Co. WICKLOW. Following reports of poor audio on WLCB's signal, we spent one afternoon in the week, listening, or trying to listen to this Wicklow station on 1602kHz. Despite a quite good signal, audio was, indeed, extremely low with music difficult to identify at times. However, on the ad. breaks, the audio became so loud, the speaker in our receiver rattled. Some quite simple adjustments would be the only thing needed here, in order to ensure a pleasant sound. One report mentioned that the station has possibly been taken over, and this may result in these problems being sorted out. Low power FM transmissions on around 101.9MHz. cover Wicklow town, we understand.

Co. WATERFORD. ABC Radio, with AM transmissions on 1026kHz., and various FM relays, plan yet further improvements in Waterford City itself. The FM signal in the city, is difficult to receive in parts, particularly in such places as factories, where many people listen. The audio quality of their signal is second to none, as can be noted on this week's tape offer. The AM transmitter, still to be found at their original location in Tramore, on the coast, may also be moved, in order to improve the AM signal in their prime listening area, Waterford city. Waterford Local Radio, the other main station, following an injection of some £20,000 from a local business consortium, seek to gain all the agency adverts currently heard on ABC. The stations don't really compete with each other, as WLR tends to concentrate on local issue programming, as opposed to ABC's formatted music programming. WLR can be heard on 1197kHz.AM and FM locally. Crystal Radio, who recently seemed to have altered their name slightly from Crystal City Sound, now have a new address of 22 Michael Street, Waterford. The station broadcasts on 1512kHz., and around 102MHz. However the AM signal suffers heavily at night, even locally, from the powerful Belgian on the same channel.

Co. LOUTH. All quiet in this county, it seems, with no return of the Boyneside Radio FM relays, heard before the raid of a few weeks ago. Radio Sovereign has not emerged on 1521kHz., as yet, although, we feel sure that the station is currently being organised and will emerge very shortly. Conspicuous by it's absence however, this morning, was the Radio Sovereign test tape, heard for several days, in the past couple of weeks. A blank carrier was noted on 1521kHz., from about 07:30 until continuous music ensued at around 11:00, followed by the Radio Rainbow free radio show at mid - day. The transmitter was then switched

off after this show.

Co. WESTMEATH. Radio West appears to have taken over the vacant 100.1MHz. spot on the band, after problems with the original 99.8MHz. channel, and this signal has duly been received here in Blackpool, from the site in Mullingar. Today's free radio show was dogged by problems at the start, 10:30, when the feed to the 702kHz. transmitter packed up and we were left with dead air. The link was restored by station owner, Sean Coyne, who dashed to the transmitter site and returned to the studios, all inside thirty minutes, when the show resumed. The station's Galway FM transmitter was reported on this show, to be now on the air, on 99.4MHz., with just 10 watts, covering the city. Higher power was promised, should no problems at this site, be encountered. The medium wave will follow, on Tuesday, hopefully, on 711kHz. The station can now be heard coast to coast on FM, and shortly on AM. They reckon that the station is reaching about 70% of the Irish population.

THE VOICE OF PEACE. No reports from the Mediterranean this week, but, we wonder if the new medium wave transmitter is now active, on 1539kHz.

CAROLINE. As we went to print last Sünday, new voices were beginning to be heard following a shift change earlier in the day. Following the return of Peter Philips, a new voice to the station was Andy Robin, who sounded as though he had settled in quite quickly. After the Bank Holiday schedule, he is now to be heard on the mid - morning show. A second new presenter was heard later on Sunday evening. This time it was yet another Australian female voice. So far we haven't had much chance to hear her shows, although she seems to be calling herself Jackie Lee. The new line up is thus... 05:00 Peter Philips... 09:00 Andy Robin... 13:00 Tony Peters... 17:00 John Tyler... 21:00 Jackie Lee... 01:00 Closedown. Staff who left the ship last weekend, were David Foster and Kevin Turner, along with Dutch colleagues, Dick Verheul, Jan Weldkamp and Erwin van der Blick. The latter, in turn, were replaced by Ad Roberts, Wim de Valk and Luke P.

Steve Conway is still working hard, compiling and reading all the days news bulletins. However, over the weekend period, the station went 24 hours, and Steve in addition to news, was also hosting the 01:00 - 05:00 slot. As a result, although he read Saturday morning news, he was obviously in his bunk during the daytime, and John Tyler was heard to read the 13:00 bulletin in his place. A brand new advert for Lotto 6/49 has been heard throughout the week. We understand that in exchange for promoting Lotto 6/49, some new parts have now been obtained for both the diplexer and the 558kHz transmitter. These parts are about to be installed, which will mean that the diplexer will be able to carry much more power. This, along with new transmitter parts, and the return of Peter Chicago last weekend, means that within the next few weeks, the power output on 558kHz will be increased to approaching 10kW, which has been promised for a long time now. This should greatly improve

the coverage area, especially during the evenings. The power on 963kHz is expected to remain the same, at 25kW, in order not to over - run the generators.

It keeps looking less likely that 'Overdrive' will ever return. We have now heard that in a few weeks, Viewpoint 963 will be extending its hours yet again. It appears as though this will now last until 23:00 on Sunday, giving almost no time at all for any alternative music shows.

Mystery as pirate radio quits coast

THE pop pirate radio station Laser 558 has quit the North Sea airwaves - but whether by force or voluntarily remains a mystery.

The whereabouts of the onetime cattle ship Communicator which had been moored off Walton was this week understood to be off Dunkirk.

It is believed she was towed there by a Belgium trawler on Tuesday last week.

But while it is known the American outfit which ran the station was deep in debt and was finding it dissicult to get supplies, the reason for the move is not known.

Radio Association said: "We don't know whether she was snatched by creditors or not.

At the moment: "She has not been taken into any harbour and is anchored outside the limit off Dunkirk," the spokesman said.

Another source said the ship had left her moorings voluntarily for two reasons and denied that creditors were responsible.

Firstly a proposed act of Parliament is likely to extend the legal limit from three to 12 miles for coastal broadcasting.

And secondly he suggested in view of the amount of work

A spokesman for the Free to be carried out on the vessel including the construction of a new broadcasting mast it was decided it would be safer to move her nearer to France while the work was carried

> After a vear's enforced silence the 489-ton vessel which broadcast for nearly two years returned to the airwaves last year following a complete refit.

She had been bought by Frinton businessman, Ray Anderson, who heads a locally based communications company at a bargain price of £35,000 and later sold to the company which now runs her.

LASER 'HOT HITS'. Well, the rumours are certainly flying around, about the station, some of which are a bit far fetched, to say the least. According to several 'eye witness' reports, the m.v. Communicator is currently lying at anchor approximately 18 miles North West of Dunkirk. One report tells us that a couple more 'dents' have appeared on it since it was last seen in the Knock Deep! The ship is manned by a skeleton crew, but only one disc jockey, Paul Jackson is still on board. The other jocks have either returned to the U.S. or are staying in the U.K. We understand that some problems arose with the 'new' owners, when it was discovered how much was owed for fuel etc. obtained since Laser's re - launch, last December. This has apparently now been sorted out, and money can be spent by its new owners in getting the ship back to broadcasting standard., with new masts, adequate insulators etc. A spokesman for the new owners informs us that weather permitting, they hope to be back on the air about three weeks after they officially take 'command' of the vessel. The cutting re - printed above comes from the Harwich and Manningtree Standard of Friday 29th May 1987. It just about summarises all other newspaper reports.

LAND - BASED STATIONS. MERSEYSIDE. Radio Merseywaves were noted on Monday as usual and back on the air this weekend, beginning on Friday morning. Station owner, Burt Williams has now got the transmitter operating exactly on channel, 1242kHz, once again, eliminating the annoying off - Channel whistle. The signal level and audio quality audible here in Blackpool seem to be the best ever, although some problems were noted on Sunday afternoon and the station left the air from time to time.

Radio Julie were first noted here, at just before 20:00 on Friday night. They were not heard earlier in the day, and we assume that broadcasts must have commenced around 18:00. The station continues to put out a very good signal in our direction, although stereo reception is a bit hissy. However, considering we are about 40/50 miles away and on a flat area, this isn't surprising.

Radio Atlantis, on 936kHz, were back on the air this weekend, again with only two presenters, Steven Bishop and Rick Dane. According to one non - Anorak, who stumbled across them, 'the music's good, with very little chat, adverts or news'. Having said that, at close - down, at 17:00 on Saturday, Rick Dane gave out the station address for correspondence and asked for advertisers to contact them at the same address. Radio Atlantis did not reappear until 15:00 on Sunday afternoon, when Steven Bishop announced that they would be on the air until 21:00. Radio Merseywaves, earlier in the week, were heard to say that no advertising would be accepted at all, on their station, as everything is funded out of the deejay's pockets. Charity and community notices will be read out free of charge.

No other stations have been heard from this area during the past week, although in Tim Jackson's Merseyside Report, he mentions that Chester Community Radio were on the air on Bank Holiday Sunday, between 19:00 and midnight. They had to move to 104.2MHz, due to ILR Marcher Sound moving frequency to 103.4MHz last week.

MANCHESTER. A rather interesting station was reported to us on Friday morning with a strong signal in that area. The station was broadcasting a Campaign for a Conservative Britain, on 104.7 Milz. This is obviously intended as a station just for the election period, and

the report also mentioned that it appeared as if a continuous tape was being played. We may expect more stations such as this, over the next couple of weeks, especially from Radio Enoch, who normally broadcast on shortwave at times of high political interest. Also in the Manchester area, a comment on Piccadilly Radio apologised for interference to their 103MHz. outlet, which was apparently being caused by the drifting transmitter of L.C.R.(Independent Community Radio). This station is normally on the air on a Saturday on a frequency around 103MHz., and plays reggae/soul music to the Moss Side are of Manchester. Sunshine Radio hoped to be on the air last night on 92.2MHz., but were being wary in case of DTI activity brought about by the above mentioned interference. YORKSHIRE, HUMBERSIDE & DERBYSHIRE. Bank Holiday Monday brought very little action in the Leeds area, with only Music City Radio being heard on their usual frequency of 90.3MHz. The signal as usual was good, but was only in mono. Early in the week, Z - FM on 105.2MHz., announced that they might change their name to Centre Radio. On Wednesday 27th May, a station called Centre Radio was in fact heard on that frequency, using the old jingle package from the ILR station of the same name. Later on at 21:55, Z - FM were heard taking over from Centre Radio, so it appears as if the latter was just being relayed. The address was the same as Z - FM, and letters should be addressed to presenter Tim Prince. In Derbyshire, Radio Nemesis are to change frequency to 107MHz., apparently due to alleged interference to Z FM! Radio Radar were noted on the air in Leeds today, with their final broadcast, for some time. This is due to shortage of staff and other commitments. The frequency was 104.7MHz., in stereo. Last night, Ocean Sound were logged on 106.3MHz., from Rotherham. Music City Radio have not been noted however, this weekend, at the time of going to press.

GLASGOW. Some disagreements concerning Radio Mercury, between the transmitter owner and the programme makers, meant that last week's scheduled programmes did not go ahead. The presenters are now looking at other means of transmitting their programmes, and indeed may well have found a way, as an unidentified station was reported on 96.1 Mhz., with a very weak signal, today. Radio Mercury, of course, broadcast on 96.1 MHz. Neon Radio were once again heard from 13:00 until 15:00 today, on a frequency, starting at 98.0 and working it's way down to 97.6MHz!

HERTFORDSHIRE. Radio Neptune were heard on the air, during Bank Holiday Monday on 1566kHz. This station now only operates on odd occasions, and can be contacted at 9 Concorde Drive, Hemel Hempstead, Hertfordshire. Thanks to SSM for information on this one.

THE MIDLANDS. Last Sunday evening, U.K. Radio were received locally, on 105.3MHz., along with Continuous Music Radio on 94.25MHz. Radio PCRL have been noted at all times of the week, on around 103.7/8MHz. Soul City are now broadcasting each second Sunday (next expected 7th June). They were heard over the Bank Holiday Sunday and Monday last, on 103.3MHz., with superb audio, playing many CD's. Soul City broadcast from Rugeley in Staffordshire. In Stafford itself, "AD87" are broadcasting late hours on Friday night/Saturday mornings on 106 MHz. No mailing address has been given out for either of the last two stations.

LONDON. In an update of the previous week, 18th to 25th May, our

reporter, Sid tells us he heard 23 stations in South London over that period. All were identified with the exception of one, which was testing imtermittently on 94.6 MHz., and playing Afro - Music, on Friday evening 22nd May. Spurious signals were also noted from RT-R (91.2MHz.), and MRS (105.5MHz.).

The DTI were out during the week, but despite this, virtually all the regulars were represented, even if only briefly. The three Greek stations were again removed. Greek Community Radio, on 105.35MHz. was back on Saturday, 21st May, and London Greek Radio, on 104.95MHz. by Monday 25th May. It seems that the Greeks have been hit twice this week, as has RJR (the Tottenham black community station), on 89.95MHz. The latter have only been heard briefly testing in stereo on Friday, and in the early hours of Bank Holiday Monday, 25th May. Quest - FM on 89.8MHz. were heard testing during the early hours of Sunday 24th May. It is not known if they are still suffering from technical troubles or raids. It is certainly nothing to do with their aerial, which sits on a thirty foot mast above a 25 story block of flats, and during the down time, has sprouted an extra two directors, to join the four already there.

TKO on 90.6MHz., have gone stero this week, and with it a much

improved signal.

Traffic Jam, on 97.95MHz., seem to be the low powered reggae station from the Wembley area, which has been picked up intermittently over the past month or so. During difficult reception conditions on Saturday, 23rd May, when the station was being blocked out by French skip from time to time, a particularly acerbic jockette, dedicated a track called 'One Night Stand', to Beverley of Sudbury, who had had plenty of experience of one night stands. Unfortunately for the listeners, Beverley's phone number wasn't included in the announcement!!

Community Development Radio on 88.7 MHz., seem to be diversifying their programming somewhat. Heard this weekend, apart from the wonderfully enthusiastic Nighthawke's all night reggae show, have been programmes dedicated to 50's and 60's black rock n'roll, and E & B. Also what sounded like an Arabic presentation was heard twice

an the week.

London Town on 92.45MHz., didn't make it back for Saturday, but were on air for Sunday (24th) and Monday (25th May), with a slight change of frequency, which still left them suffering from being adjacent to BBC Radio 4. Without any doubt London Town - FM, are the slickest, most upbeat and generally most professional sounding of any station currently broadcasting in Europe. If they go seven days, they must surely sweep the board and end up as Number One across the Capital. A programme schedule was being trailed for Saturday nights, which showed that they intend to be more than just a straight CIIR station. Early evening had the top - forty style shows gradually changing to a mix of rock and dance music, until after midnight it became music for partying to, with a mix of top - forty, rock, soul, and reggae.

Rock - FM on 94.3 Mliz., London's only rock outlet, have hit problems again. No sooner had they settled on thier new frequency, than MRS starts up on 94.3MHz. as well. The resulting banshee wail, meant that neither station was receivable across major parts of London,

on Sunday.

Monday night (25th May), saw Dave Pearce off BBC Radio London's Nite - FM series pouring scorn on newspaper reports of trouble at the RUN/DMC/Beastie Boys concert at Brixton Academy. However, a much chastened LWR (92.05MHz.), presenter on the 13:00-15:00 lunchtime show (thought to be Jasper), painted a different picture. During an emotional fifteen minutes, he expressed sorrow and apologies to the 99.9% of the audience who were there to party and enjoy themselves. Unfortunately for them, the concert had also attracted the worst elements of the dregs of London. Because of his own sense of guilt /responsibility, he would now no longer publicise his own gigs on air, as he had no desire to see a repeat of these scenes. He finished by "damning to hell', those people who caused the trouble and ruined the gig. Apparently similar scenes had occurred at a reggae festival held in the Wembley area on Monday, which had received heavy promotion from the North London reggae stations.

As Sid comments at the end of his report, let us hope that next

week brings some more cheerful news.

The DTI seem to have been quiet in London during the week, as all stations have been on the air, with the exception of LWR. They appeared to have a carrier on 92MHz., but with white noise, indicating that their link may have gone down. Those stations logged so far this weekend include Community Development Radio on 88.6MHz., RJR on 89.95MHz., Rock to Rock on 90.2MHz., Total Knock Out (TKO) on 90.6MHz., Sky - FM on 91.8MHz., Studio One on 92.65MHz., Solar 93 on 93.0MHz., KISS - FM on 93.9MHz., Rock - FM, on 94.3MHz, Asian Community Radio on 94.3MHz., Traffic - FM on 98.0MHz., Time - FM on 103.7MHz., JBC on 104.7MHz. There were also three Greek station audible on 88.5MHz, 105.0 MHz. (probably London Greek Radio), and 105.3MHz. Once again R - FM were having their signal blotted out by the other station on 94.3MHz, Asian Community Radio, who were also reported to be covering several channels.

Finally, North of this area, ISIS FM are regularly logged each Sunday evening, from 21:00 until 23:00 in the Oxford region, on 105MHz. The D.J. heard calls himself Pablo. Much correspondence is mentioned,

but the station rarely gives out the mailing address, we are told.

SHORTWAVE STATIONS.

Following the large fine imposed on the operator of F.M.T.R., last week, we heard this week of further bad news for short wave free radio stations in the form of a raid on one of the largest such stations, Radio Delmare. This station used to broadcast programmes from a variety of stations, using its powerful 1kW transmitter. The following is an extract from the front page of Radiotelex Issue 99, which relates last Sunday, May 17th, during the relay of FRS - HOLLAND transmissions, at approximately 10:30 UTC. The transmitter finally left the airwaves at around 1045 UTC: The station operator, Johann Rood was raided

by two RTT (Belgian postal authorities) men, as well as two members of the police, the so called Rijkswacht. These men were quite friendly, and only took the transmitter; no audio equipment such as tapes and records were confiscated. The antenna though, has been put under seal>>. This second raid at Delmare, is of course an enormous setback for Delmare itself, FRS Holland, and also to all the other stations that used to hire airtime over the powerful TX.

At this point we would also like to mention that Johann of Delmare urgently needs money as with an upcoming court case, he is to be fined heavily, or even has to face imprisonment. It might be considered a normal thing that in particular, all those stations that have profited by Delmare's good signal all over Europe, should now support Johan as well as they can. Remember that this has been his second raid, and last time he had to pay approximately DM 5500.

Finally, it appears that the raid has been initiated by both the British and Belgian authorities. It April this year the RAD Control in London sent a telex to the Belgian RTT complaining about Delmare's transmissions on 6206kHz. However, no specific reason is known for tht complaint. Many thanks to Peter Verbruggen of FRS Holland, and Radiotelex for the above details.

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As can be seen by the BOLD logs (ours), we did not fair very well, due to our main valve set being out of action, although, having said that, conditions were far from good, and perseverence was the name of the game today. Other loggers were slightly more successful, especially one who rang from the South Coast of England, which in itself suggests a quite long skip today. Other loggers kindly rang in on (0253) 882017, from Yorkshire, Staffordshire, the Midlands, and Devon. Just a couple of comments on the logs today. The Unidentified station on 6210kHz, had a girl at the microphone at about 11:50gmt, and was playing oldies. Spectrum Leisure Communications were also reported as announcing an FM stero outlet on 103.9MHz, although which area this would be received in, we are not sure.

Additions to last Sunday's log from Podney and Apollo DX, include.... our Unid. on 6200kHz. was Radio Valleri at 10:55gmt., 4FWS on 6260kHz., at 11:06gmt....RADIO RAINBOW GERMANY on 6280kHz., at 10:04gmt....4FWS on 6280kHz., at 11:01gmt....RADIO ATLANTA on 6290kHz., at 10:46gmt. SSM heard the station S.R.I. (Southeast Radio Int.), as Static Radio International, and since no one else appears to have logged it, we are still unsure as to the exact name and address. The 6217kHz. mystery... we confirmed it was Riverside Radio, others said it was Britain Radio Int. We now understand that it was indeed Riverside Radio with Britain Radio's Roger Davis doing a guest programme.

In a recent letter to one of our readers, Michael Caine of Radio Skywave International stated the following, which may be of interest to Sunday morning SW listeners..... We have reluctantly decided to drop all broadcasts of Radio Skywave for the present, although we do intend to return at some stage in the future. The reason is that we are concentrating on FM. The station is called Downtown Radio, and is operating on 88.07MHz. FM, in the Dublin area. TX power is 50 watts into two SDH100 folded dipoles, giving an ERP of approximately 100 watts. Studio consists of a 9 channel mixer, two Marantz turntables, Sansui stero cassette players, graphic equaliser etc. We are aiming at a community type of stations serving the North Inner City area of Dublin. Medium Wave may be added in the near future.>> We wish Michael all the best with his new station, and hope it won't be too long before Radio Skywave returns on SW once more.

Our thanks as always, for the news, information, cuttings, photos, recordings, to ever so many kind people, who, without their help this

report would not be as comprehensive as it is.

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
