Radio Caroline sels the way I had back to her mooring

The 274-ton Mi Amigo, which carries the North Sea pirate pop station Radio Caroline, set out for her old moorings off Scheveningen, near The Hague, to-day, after her seizure last night by the Dutch authorities had been lifted.

A spokesman at the Dutch lawyer's office in Amsterdam, where talks lasting several hours were held between the ship's crew and its Irishborn owner, Mr. Ronan O'Rahilly, said a satisfactory financial settlement had been reached between the two parties.

The Mi Amigo was towed out of Ijmuiden harbour, near Amsterdam, by a Dutch fishing vessel.

Trouble aboard the ship started on December 28, when the 43-years-old Dutch master, Captain Will Van Der Kamp, reported a mutiny on board and fired off flares.

Two days later. Captain Van Der Kamp ordered a tug to tow him into Ijmuiden.

Captain Van Der Kamp

told reporters: "My lads have not received their wages for months now." He estimated that the 12 crew had wages claims totalling 32,000 guilders (about £4,000).

To-day, it was stated that the owner had settled all back payments with the crew and the seizure had been lifted.

The above article was taken from the "Liverpool Echo" during the first week in Lanuary, 1973. The latest news about the return of Radio Caroline is certainly the best news we could have hoped for. The contents of this article are what happened after Radio Caroline made the B.B.C. and National news on December 28th, 1972, following a "Mutiny" on board the Mi Amigo.

The Mi Amigo, after being fitted out and towed out into the North Sea near to R.N.I., has been making transmissions on 199 metres, and reception reports have been poer in this country. Apparently, on December 27th, 1972, the Dutch crew complained that they had not been paid their wages "for months". In consequence, the oil feed pipes to the ship's generater were disconnected. The three English Disc Jockeys, wishing naturally to continue Caroline's broadcast, protested, and what followed has been described by the press and television reports as a mutiny, ending with the Captain, Wil Van Der Kamp, being locked up on board.

Shortly after these events took place, the Mi Amigo was forcibly towed back to Holland mear Scheveningen, and the Dutch Government held it there until, on January 2nd, the ship sailed back into the North Sea as described in the article. Transmissions have now recommenced on 252 metres, although the callsign is still "This Caroline, en 259 metres".

The signal isnow much stronger, and we hope that this is the start of a good year for Radio Caroline. Ronan O'Rahilly, the man who has always been behind Caroline, should be congratulated for his efforts in restarting the station. Some people are saying that this is a good publicity stunt for Caroline. Well, there remains this possibility, but even so, it certainly warrants some publicity, because Caroline has had so much been luck in the past.

CFRO would like to take this opportunity in wishing Caroline and all the offshore stations the best of success in 1973.
