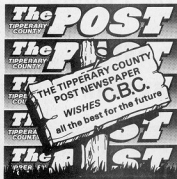

AUDIENCE GROWING

The CBC audience continues to grow and the potential for benefit to the community is realised more and more each day. A month has not gone by without some notable contribution being made to South Tipp. In January CBC, in conjunction with Sean Treacy T.D., was responsible for getting army helicopters into the Nire Valley to relieve snow-bound people and livestock. In February extensive coverage was given to the General Election. This included an audio broadcast unit based in Hearn's Hotel.

In March, CBC managing director attended the Tralee Conference on Local Radio.

SPECIAL PROGRAMMES

In April a special hour long programme was recorded for Mercia Radio in Coventry for broadcast to local listeners. The tape was brought to England by the visiting Cloanell Towns.

May, June, July saw the station bring its oh dear to the Rowing Club, Grange Field Day, St. Josephs Ferry-house, Whitlands Sports and the Presentation Convent Family Day.

In August the entire celebrations to mark the centenary of C.J. Kickham in Mullinahone were recorded and transmitted. The o.b. unit went to Tipperary Raceway in September and so it continues... CBC is your station. It is and will be what you make it. We invite you to set switched on, and come on over to CBC today.

CBC Broadcasts on Medium Wave and VHF. The main Medium Wave transmitter is located outside Connell on a height and is custom built 500 watts loaded into an inverted L aerial with a vertical height of 100 feet. Shortly this transmitter will be joined by the Main VHF Transmitter which is being re-located from its present site at the Station.

SAYS

The Managing Director of CBC Radio made the following report to the A.G.M of the company in October 1982

IDEAS EXCHANGE

One of our functions here as local radio service is that of an ideas exchange centre. Unlike the National station, which falls down heavily in this regard, our information service is two-way. It comes in firstly and we dispense it. The National Station, R.T.E., has a tendency for one-way traffic in this regard. They tend to talk out at us. This two-way process of CBC's helps foster the self help idea in so far, that an idea from any town in our area broadcast on the station, could be implemented in any other town in the area. This is, in fact, the case as I know.

COHESIVE FORCE

What CBC is doing, is acting as a cohesive force in the community aware of themselves and of other small communities around the county. There now exists through CBC an active interchange of healthy ideas, which help each small community and in turn the larger community, which is our broadcast area. I genuinely believe, that every little village in town and South Tipperary can be a shining light to the county in some respect. Part of our wide belief, is to reflect this light and magnify it in terms of the number of people the lights fall on.

JOB CREATION

Hand in hand with the economy, in national terms goes unemployment, and here again CBC has stood out. We have created seven full time jobs in this station. Seven people employed who might very well have otherwise been on the dole. The company can feel justifiably proud of this fact. It has cost us, that's true, but that cost will be returned to us in kind when, I feel sure, this fact will be considered favourably in our licence application. In employing seven people, we have further shown our commitment as a local broadcasting service, by this we show, that we are here to stay, that we are serious about the job, that we are here to develop the medium of radio in South Tipperary and not to exploit it as do some stations in Dublin.

GOOD UNION RELATIONSHIPS

Our relationship with the Unions locally has been excellent. They haven't been between other stations and their local unions. Three members of our staff are members of the Institute of Journalists—a fully fledged recognised Union. Recently, this proved to our considerable advantage, when the Nationalist Newspaper, unaware of this fact, tried to turn the local chapters of the Unions on us. When they investigated and found we were unionised, it completely flattened their attack.

PROGRAMMING

Our programming of course, is the most important aspect of our work. For the first year, with limited knowledge of the county as a whole, we have been feeling our way. However, it has proved successful. The present schedule is, I believe, one of the best, rivaling even that of Radio 1.

It's bright, interesting, informative and entertaining. It almost accurately reflects life in any day in South Tipperary. It must be more than that, in fact, when we find letters from Knocktopher in County Kilkenny, Poetlaw, Co. Waterford and Thurles in the north of the county, in our mail box, not to mention phone calls from Waterford city, Mitchelstown and Fermoy in Co. Cork and Hospital in County Limerick. We have a wide appeal. We have listeners in areas which were served by other stations.

PRESENTERS

Our presentation staff, I am convinced are the best in the country. People of the calibre of Peg Power, Pat O'Regan, Patricia Cantwell and Steward McLellan, would certainly enrich R.T.E. Their commitment to local radio, and in particular to C.B.C., is unquestionable. We are fortunate to have them. They are household names in South Tipperary, each one of them a gem in their own field. They are professionals who are imbued with the spirit of CBC Radio, and are deeply interested in the development of the station and of the area.

The long awaited consultative council is about to be born. I hope to have it operational by Christmas. This council will help us stay on the path we have been on for the past year. It will also increase the input from the community and act as our eyes and ears in the community. The people from the council will be hand picked by us from different community groups around the county. Their only qualification, to have the interests of their own community and of CBC at heart.

ILLEGALITY

The illegality of the station has not hindered us exceptionally over the past year. It does, however, frustrate me. There are so many aspects of programming that we cannot get involved in because of the illegal stamp. In association with local government, the Gardaí and other government bodies, we could provide our listeners with a wealth of programming. Some advertisers, for instance, Dunnes Stores and the Banks, will not advertise with us because of their company policy not to use the medium of local radio, which is unlicensed at the moment. Recently, however, as CBC has grown and earned re-

spect, we find a softening of attitude at least in some quarters. In the new year, we hope to be launching a series of agricultural programmes in association with A.C.O.T. I am presently having discussions with the Gardaí and the County Medical Officer, about a series of programmes on drugs. And I am reviewing the major accident plan with the South Eastern Health Board, with a view to incorporating CBC Radio in the plan.

POLITICIANS

Politicians—local and National, are willing to, and do, appear on CBC. People have criticised them and accused them of vote catching with audiences, and then saying on the other hand, 'no we would not appear on pirate radio!'

I can honestly say, that I have never heard any of South Tipperary's Politicians say that. I honestly believe, that they come

on CBC to make a valid contribution to the area, and not for personal gains. All our politicians have said to me, time and time again, when I asked them to appear on certain programmes "certainly, I'd be glad to help out". This, as late as today, when I had occasion to ring them about a future programme.

Finally, gentlemen, consciously or unconsciously, when we came on air last November 14th, we took an obligation upon this company to provide as broadly based a local radio service as possible. In our first year I feel, we have kept that obligation. It's now time to reaffirm that obligation, and to develop the station to the best of our ability. We can do it, despite our financial position. At least now, we have a year's work behind us. The station is established. We now have something real.

ADVERTISING

Revenue from Advertising is the only income which CBC has. Billy McEldan and Brenda Hyland are the people responsible for the Sales Department which handles anything up to 40 different Advertising Contracts in a week. Being the only source of revenue, advertising is the most important single department within the station.

Running now like a well oiled machine after extensive re-organisation, an advertiser can have his advertisement on the air within a matter of hours of confirming the order.

At the time of confirming the order, the customer gets his copy of the contract complete with essential information necessary to ensure that the commercial runs out to his satisfaction. Another copy goes to the script writer and from there to the producer where the ad is produced and voiced by an artist of the customer's choice. Both this copy and the completed commercial then return to the sales office where it is entered into a master log and from that to the Daily Advertising Transmission Schedule.

CBC TECHNICAL INFORMATION

A very important aspect of any Radio Station is the equipment used to get the job done. In the case of CBC, this can be divided up into two parts: Studio and Transmission.

CBC has two studios, one for on air broadcasting and the other for Commercial production, Comprod, for sheet.

The on air studio is equipped with an ex-HBC turntable unit which has two Gearing Transcription motor driven turntables. This was acquired from BBC Radio Scotland in early October of 1981. The mixer, through which everything is plugged in, is an 8 channel Solid-state mixer which has been modified by the makers to suit broadcasting purposes. An ex-Boscon Radio Revex A-500 open reel Tape Machine is used for recording programmes and is also used in the production of some effects used on Commercials. For transmitting commercials, the studio is equipped with two Technics M 130 Microprocessor controlled Cassette tape machines. In-studio monitoring is by a pair of Alice 100 Watt monitor speakers. Microphones in the main studio are AKG 190.

The Commercial Production studio is fitted with a Gersonic 4 channel Radio Mixer. Turntables are by Pioneer and two cassette decks are by JVC. Microphones are Shure 565s.

CBC's outside Broadcast Unit is a converted Ford Plaxton 40 seater Coach which carries a Studio master mixer, similar to that of the main studio. 220 feet of multicore microphone cable enables recording/broadcast operations to be carried out at a remote site. The six microphones are by Rode electronics and are the top of the range. The OB Unit is equipped with an Akai Open Reel tape machine and a Toshiba Cassette deck. Monitoring inside the unit is by means of an Akai 40 watt amplifier and two Phillips 100 watt speakers. Another two speakers from the Akai Amp is used for outdoors monitoring.

The OB Unit is divided into three areas, talk studio, engineering and reception.
