MERSEYSIDE FREE RADIO SCENE

Week ending Sunday 28th June 1987

This week there hasn't been a lot of choice of listening. Radio Mersey Waves disappeared again on Friday afternoon, and Steve Bishop in his Free Radio Show said that this was due to DTI activity on the Wirral side of the river. Radio Julie opened at 6pm on Friday, but with so many DJs standing-in for others who turned up late, or didn't turn up at all, it was impossible to keep up with their schedule. Holidays also seem to be causing changes to schedules.

RADIO ATLANTIS 936kHz & 1197kHz: 150, Rake Lane, Liscard, Wallasey, Merseyside L45 1JW On Monday evening, this station announced at 5pm close-down that Atlantis II would be on the air from about 5:10pm, on 1197kHz. The signal on 1197kHz couldn't be heard when walking down to the ferry, except when crossing Derby Square and on the Pierhed itself. The signal at Seacombe Ferry was barely audible, even through the earphone of my portable receiver. However, by the time I got to Liscard, the signal was well heard on the speaker of the same pocket-portable. It isn't known whether they carried out any "adjustments" while I was on the bus, and the station doesn't seem to have used this frequency since that date. "On air" announcements suggest that they have "tested" this frequency, and also another undisclosed frequency, a number of times recently. I must confess that in the past I used to listen to Radio Atlantis to find out what idiotic scheme Steve Bishop had "dreamed up", but these days I listen to them because I LIKE their output, which is different to the continuous "disco" and "chart" music put out by the other stations who are supposed to be "alternative". RADIO MERSEY WAVES 1242kHz: 9, Meadfoot Road, Moreton, Wirral, Merseyside L46 7UW. As stated above, the station was on the air at 12:27pm, but had gone by 2:45pm. Other sources suggest that the DTI were active on this side of the river and that the station had closed-down voluntarily until their normal "sign-on" at 7am on Saturday, after they had previously announced that Phil Davies would be doing the 4am-7am slot that would allow them to go "24 hours". .
