BIG D RADIO BURNED IN BLAZE....

In the early hours of Tuesday morning, January 2nd 1979, a fire distroyed the premises and studio of the BIG D Radio station. Garda J.P. McGuire, of Store Street station smelled smoke coming from the premises at Chapel Lane - and raised the alarm. According to Gardai, firemen were hampered in the early stages of fighting the blaze by frozen water pipes. The two-storey studio building of BIG D radio was completely gutted in the fire and all the radio equipment was damaged.

Three D.J.'s at the BIG D had a narrow escape from the fire. When late night rock show host Dave Fanning finished his show at 3.00am and handed over to John Paul, he was unable to get a taxai because of the freezing weather. Station boss James Dillon offered to give him a lift home, but before they started, the three men decided to look for an all-night coffee shop—leaving a taped show on air. When they returned later, the place was a mass of flames.

Despite the fire, the station returned to the air a few days later from new premises with equipment that had been taken in a Post Office raid some months ago, and returned to them after their court case had been heard (on the Wednesday before Christmas).

THE HISTORY OF DUBLIN FREE RADIO..... (part one)

The first pirate broadcasts in Dublin were made during the 1940's when several small transmitters broadcast anti-British propaganda and relayed the speeches of William Joyce (Lord Haw Haw) a strange contrast with the present pirates who suprisingly have spawned no politically motivated stations.

TONY BOYLAN, who still presents a selection of 78's on ARD, can claim to be the longest serving pirate still on air. His career started with RADIO GALAXY, which broadcast regularily right up to the 1970's, presented a unique selection of records, mostly 78's, including recorded war speeches and many JOHN McCORMACK records. Of the stations still broadcasting, RADIO DUBLIN is by far the oldest, started in 1966 by KEN SHEHHAN, an office worker, now loosely connected with the BIG D.

RADIO DUBLIN, or RADIO BAILE ATHA CLIATH as it was then called, could be heard for only a few miles around the Drimnagh area when it started but in September 1971 it moved location to Crumlin and increased power considerably and attracted a sizable audience. By this time other low-powered pirates had started broadcasting a mixture of of pop music and chatter. Among these stations were RADIO VANESSA, located in Santry, ANALY RADIO NORTHSIDE and RADIO Eamo. One of the more memorable stations was RADIO JACQUELINE, later known as CHANNEL '70, RADIO CLEO and various other names. DAVITT KELLY, one of the founders of ARD, was largely responsible for Jacqueline and Channel '70, which broadcast from 1970 to 1973 and received several hundred reception reports from Europe - the Scandinavia countries, Russia and Poland. RTE were awage of their existence, and letters addressed to Channel '70, Dublin, were re-addres -ed by RTE.

Another station in the early 1970's was RADIO CAROLINE DUBLIN, based in Dalkey and run by a U.C.D. engineering student. Capoline's programming was slick and professional; they used the old offshore gimmick of car-headlight flashing to the station, this time talking to cars parked on Howth Head. In 1977, Caroline's operators came out of retirement to build the present transmitting rigd used by RADIO DUBLIN, BIG D and RADIO CAROUSEL in Dundalk.

All the Dublin stations formed an organisation called the United Dublin Stations and provided each other with spare parts, records and Disc Dockeys. They used an English mailing address in Brighton and were part of a network of pirates all over Europe. In November 1972 eight pirate stations were broadcasting more or less regularily in Dublin. RADIO MELINDA operpated by young people in the Gloucester Diamond area of the city was the latest. Melinda, unlike the other stations, had some real community involvement; a local priest even used the station to broadcast Mass. Melinda broadcast for.../... (Continued on page 3).

3(continued from page 2) .../... long hours and had planned continuous Christmas service when the post office moved in. Most stations closed down to avoid raids but Melinda continued and was the only Irish station on the air when RTE went off the air due to a strike over Kevin O' Kelly's imprisonment after Sean MacStiofain's trial.

By 1973 a second wave of pirates had emerged. The RADIO DUBLIN transmitter had been given to Don Moore, alias Doctor Don who broadcast for two hours each Sunday - later aided by Dave Cunningham and Paul Downey, now on ARD. Moore, not happy with Radio Dublin's power, met Eamonn Cooke, who ran a radio and Television repair shop in Thomas Street. By 1976 Eamonn Cooke was closely involved with Radio Dublin. That September, Radio Dublin, located in Moore's home in Cabra, was raided by two Post Office officials and four Gardai. Moore successfully disposed of vital equipment by throwing it into to the next door neighbours garden, and by the time the officials had made a forcible entry the transmitter had been dismantled. When the P.O. men attempted to recover the equipment from the neighbouring garden, they were repulsed by an alsation dog. After the raid Radio Dublin re-opened, but soon Moore was purged by Eamonn Cooke. Radio Dublin was already being used to plug Irish records and this was generating a certain amount of income. Arguments between Cooke and Moore were said to centre on this. Despite these differences, when Moore went into District Court No.2 in June 1977, Cooke appear ed and gave evidence that equipment seized could be used for other purposes, namely as an amp. The Judge asked the Post Office if this was so; reluctantly they agreed and a loophole in the law was established.

You may remember in our last edition we asked our members for some information regarding the situation on RADIO CAROLINE. We were very pleased with the response and in particular to FRC member JOE EARLY, of Drumcondra, Dublin 3 for his very informative letter. He writes: 'Radio Caroline has been silent since 20-10-178. This is because the generator pr on board used for supplying power to the transmitter packed in. The people on board were aware of the generator problem so they started to close down early; and on the 19-10-178 they were off the air altoggether. Radio Mi Amigo did not want to loose advertising revenue and insisted on staying on the air. The generator couldn't take it and packed in altogether, hence the stations are silet ent while parts are being bought. There are rumours of a new ship. The fact that the Mi Amigo is to be replaced is known but when I'm not sure. Among the rumours are that one is be ing fitted out in Greenore and Spain and the Spainh Tourist Board is supplying the cash, As the ship is in very bad condition, Dutch D.J.'s Mark Jacobs, Frank van der Mast and Hugo Molenoff had to be paid danger money to return after shore leave. Following a trip to the USA, Ronan O'Rahilly and Peter Chicago decided to put Caroline on VHF/FM in Stereo as well as Medium Wave. ++More reports suggest that Radio Caroline has been sold to American backers++++

to feed the aerial:


Our first successful transmission was on 15/6/'75 on 6225 with reports being received from the U.K., Ireland and N.W. Europe. Subsequent transmissions were rather spasmodic throughout 1975, 1976 and up to December 1977 when regular programmes every 4th Sunday of the month were inaugerated on Christmas and New Years Day (25/12/'77 & 1/1/'78 respectively).

Since we started we have received reception reports from: England, Scotland, Ireland, Wales, Holland, Belgium, West & East Germany, Italy, Switzerland, Denmark, Sweden, Norway, Finland, France and Newfoundland:

RADIO DUNDALK SAY THEY WERE JAMMED

"The first of Dundalk's pirate radio stations, Radio Dundalk, has gone off the air indefinitely They claim that their frequency was being jammed possibly by another station, but a spokesman for Radio Capousel, Dundalk's other pirate yesterday (Wednesday) denied they were responsible for the jamming and expressed regret at the closure. Independent Radio Dundalk, which operated from the Fairways Hotel, had been broadcasting since last May. After months of technicial difficulties they went off the air on Sunday evening. A statement by Mr. Adrian St James disclosed that the station was closing indefinitely due to technicial difficulties that could not be resolved. "We believe we were being jammed" he said "It could be by another station" he explained. However, a spokesman for Carousel said that "It has nothing to do with us" "We are a long way from Radio Dundalk on the medium wave band" he pointed out, saying that perhaps it was some foreign on neighbouring station that was causing the interference. The spoksman added that he was "dumbfounded" by the news, "and I am terribly sorry to hear it". Mr James said it was becomming pointless operating the station. "Disc Jockeys were doing their shows but the public could not hear them". The statement revealed that they will try to keep faith with the public who had supported them.
