What its all about

The Main purpose of this programme is to give our listeners a further insight to WLR and indeed to Local Radio in general. In the two years and three months we have been on the air we have grown steadily, maturing all the time and we also know our audience has grown with us. Due to the fact that the newspaper media has chosen to ignore local radio because we are not unionised, some people are under the impression that local radio's consist of a bunch of kids spinning records for the want of something better to do. Hopefully, this programme will dispel any doubts and indeed show, as our radio has to many Waterfordians, that local radio is part and parcel of every day community life.

Our aim over the two years and indeed for the future is to provide the best possible service to the community and I think most of our listeners would agree that we are definitely on the right tracks. In the two years we have grown from a small gathering of enthusiastic radio enthusiasts to a radio station that is able to command a huge percentage of radio listeners in Waterford, despite intense competition.

Hopefully we will continue to grow without losing our closeness to the people. In the two years we have steadily added improvements to our service thus gaining a wider audience.

This in turn increased our finances which in turn means we can again improve or better our radio.

I think one of the things people tend to forget is that because of our legal position advertising agencies who control the advertising accounts of national advertisers cannot advertise with us though many have said they would like to. Our main source of revenue comes from the small advertisers.

In reality, financially, we are only available to 15% of the advertising market and therefore we are running on an extremely tight budget, a budget that increased as our audiences increased. This is why the services that we provide, news, etc, could not be provided two years ago when we started. Anyway this gave me a chance to thank all those who have advertised on WLR since June 1978. I think you will find that Waterford Local Radio has reached a professional standard on par with other stations on the waveband.

The Programme

This also gives us a chance to introduce our wide and varied timetable in detail, hopefully, this will be advantageous to our listeners.

Finally, I would like to thank everyone connected with WLR for their help over the last two years, all the presenters, News and advertising staff for their time, trouble and patience. I would like to thank also all those people who have helped, whether it be those who have given their time to feature in interviews or have given their comments about the station, those who took the trouble to 'phone us with news items and indeed our listeners who gave us 400 requests every day, Thank you all. It is nice to know that they are there. All of these have played their part in the growth of WLR.

Where to now? – The future



DES WHELAN

In the not too distant future Waterford Local Radio along with many other pirate stations in the country are going to find themselves faced with much heavier penalties for broadcasting illegally. This is definite. What happens after that is not so definite. If the Minister for Posts and Telegraphs follows RTE's recent proposals, they would be totally unacceptable for anyone wishing to see a local community radio service in Waterford. RTE's proposals are to set up a local community radio in Cork and Shannon and to service the South East there would be a radio transmitter somewhere in the area probably near Kilkenny to transmit to an estimated 440,000 people.

To transmit to such a wide area North and East Munster and South Leinster, cannot be called Local Radio and the Minister must see from the unsuccessful introduction of RTE 2 to stomp out the pirates that local radio on smaller scale is the only answer.

Indeed, RTE's Only coverage to the Waterford Area, apart from our 15 minutes per week has been their community radio service visiting Waterford. This, last year, was totally unsuccessful and in fact most people in Waterford were not aware that it was actually being broadcast.

The other option, and I believe the fairer one, is for the Minister to set up an independent Broadcasting Board, which would consider applications for independent local radio from Commercial and Community Interests. If this happens and the Minister realises that Waterford has a culture and tradition of its own, I believe that WLR would best serve the interest of the Community and give the best possible service to the people.

Over the last two years Waterford Local Radio's main objectives with the resources available were as follows:

- (1) To provide a popular radio station particularly concerned with providing a public service.
- (2) A radio station that as a priority is available to the Community as a communication media.
- (3) A company that reinvests its profits to develop existing facilities.



Are the Government going to put us all out of our jobs?

Our aim over the last two years has been to lay the foundations of a legal independant local community radio station for Waterford. Over the last two years Waterford Local Radio has proven it can survive any competition. It has grown from a set-up of five part-timers playing records to a radio station which broadcasts 19 hours a day employs 10 full-time and 18 part-time staff who provide a service that has become part of every day community life in Waterford.

If Waterford is to have independant local radio, its owners and staff should be drawn from the area, thus ensuring a genuine interest in the community.

This Waterford Local Radio has already proven, and obviously, when we do apply because of the finance involved in setting up a local radio we will need financial backing this will come from the local interests and businessmen not from outside interests. At present all of the 28 people involved in WLR are from Waterford.

OUR PROFESSIONALISM AND GOODWILL

In the two years of WLR we have become as professional as any other station on the waveband This again has been proven by our popularity and the fact that two of our presenters are now with RTE, another is training to be a newsreader and two others were approached to apply for RTE 2 but declined.

Of course, there are two main questions being asked about local independant community radio:

- (1) is it financially viable?
- (2) If so, who is to guarantee that local community radio will serve the community's best interests and not just financial gain.

We will deal with part one first. At present, because of our legal situation the amount of advertising available is at least one sixth of what would be available if we were legalised. At present, all our advertising is small and local. Advertising agencies who control the accounts of large advertisers such as banks, finance houses and alcohol firms are unable to advertise with us because we are illegal. Along with an increased range and more diversified advertising I believe we could increase our income tenfold and thus provide the service we believe would serve the community and advertisers best.

Waterford Local Radio in just over two years broadcasting has steadily tried to better its Community Service, as our profits increased our service bettered and without losing our youth we have tried to make our service attractive to all ages and walks of life by introducing news, magazine, community and non playlist programmes. This I think already shows a genuine interest in the Community. We have never charged for advertising for non profit making and community organisations and nearly all small adverts have been given free of charge thus making ourselves more available to the community in general. We also give news of traffic, bus- timetable changes, power cuts, water cuts in fact anything that is of benefit to the community to hear about. Along the way we have helped raise thousands of pounds for Charities, Youth Clubs, Sports Clubs etc. Although I believe there are a lot of improvements to be made and a lot of avenues to be explored nobody could accuse us of not using the limited finance available to us in the best possible way. If Waterford Local Radio were legalised we would propose that besides having a financial board of Directors, there would also be a section of the Board made up of Community groups and people involved actively with the community. This section would have a sizeable voting percentage with no financial contribution necessary, thus ensuring the best possible interest of the people. At the moment we are setting up such a committee for ideas, opinions and help with WLR'S programming. I hope this will play a big part in our gaining a licence and thus ensuring that the best possible radio service is brought to Waterford.

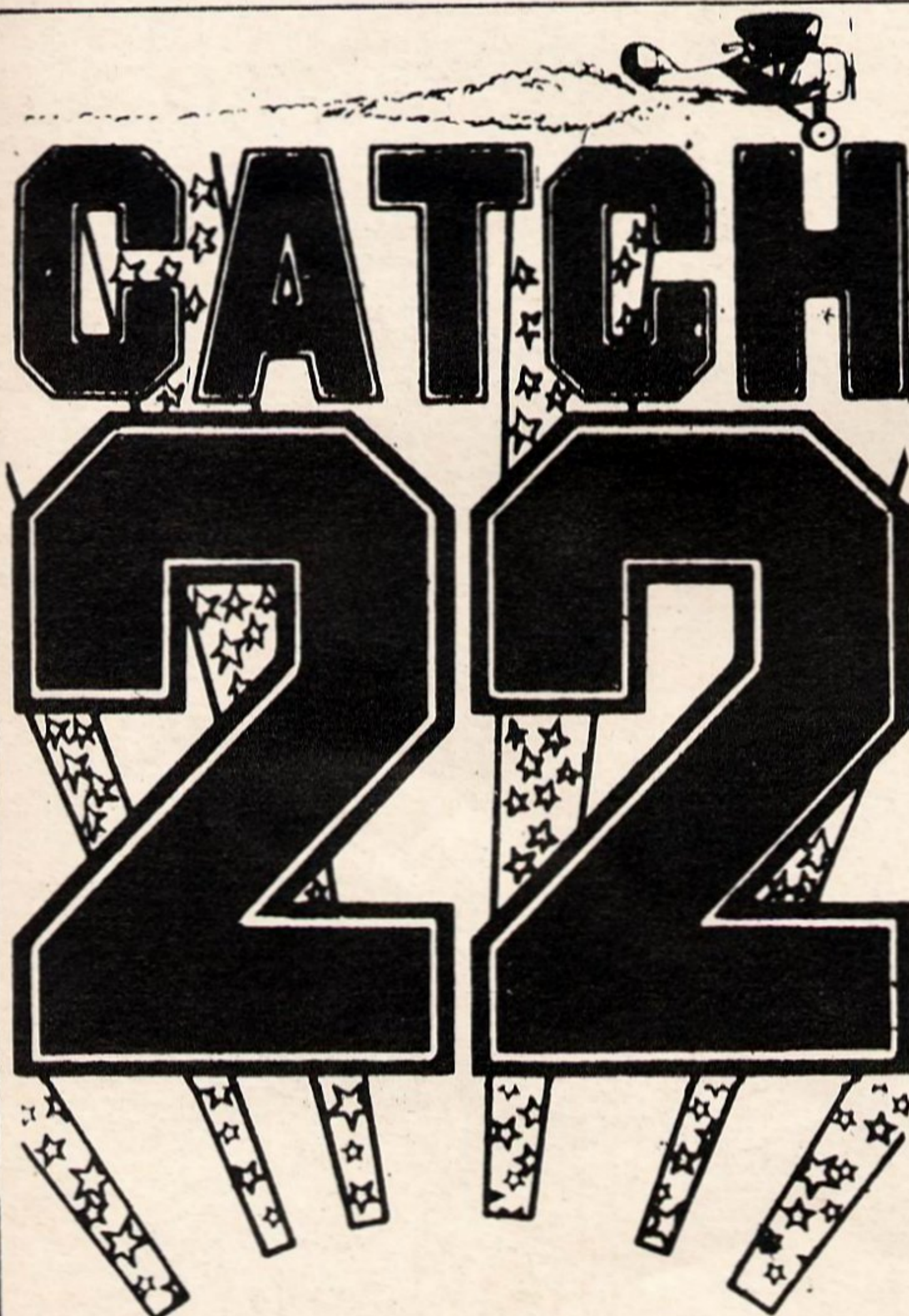

The history of WLR

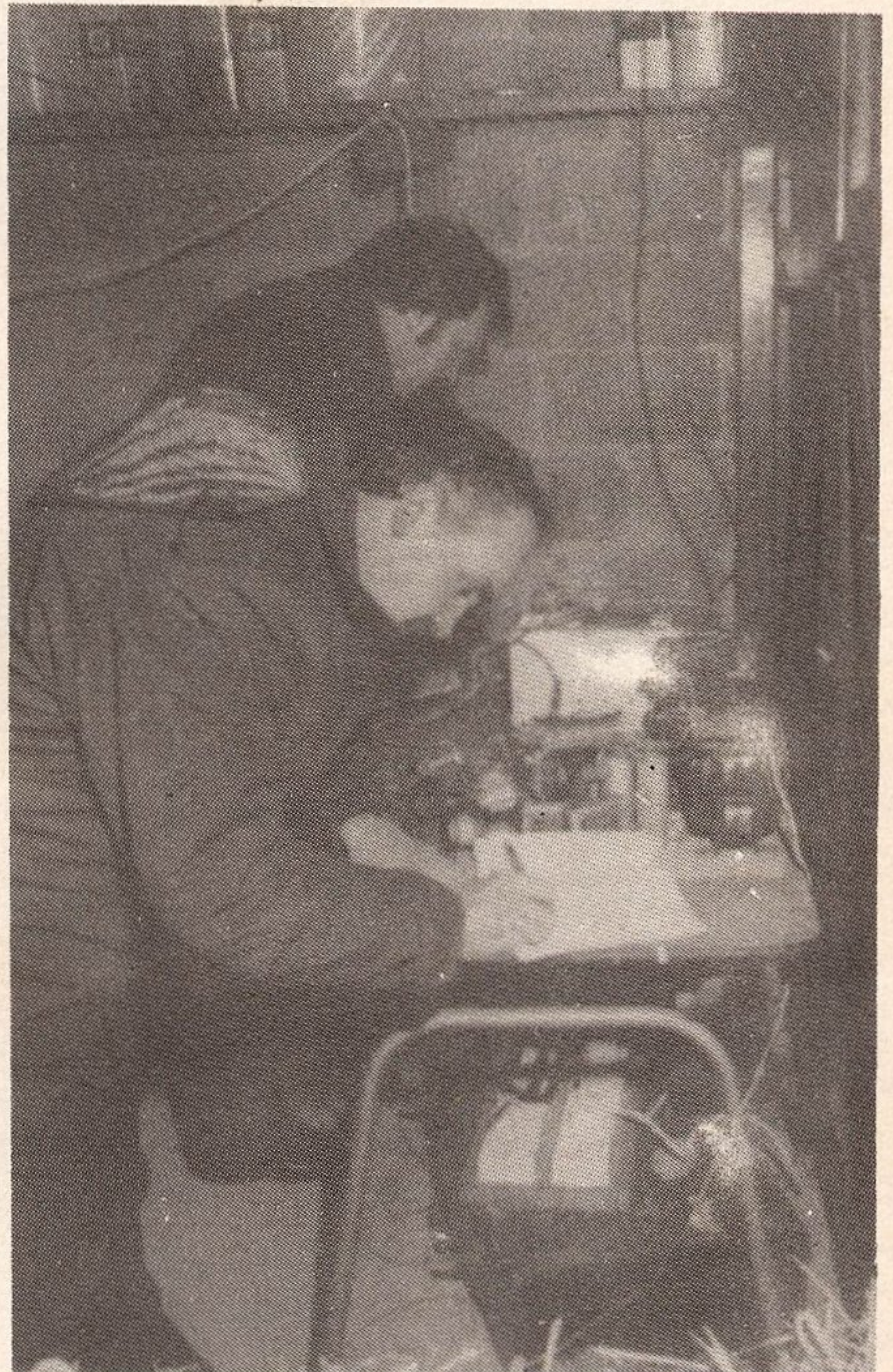
Although Waterford Local Radio's history, technically began in June of 1978 the whole idea was hatched many years previously back in 1972. It was then that Rick Whelan and Egidio Giani broadcast on a tiny transmitter, the broadcasting range was only about a hundred yards but then it was a start.

Rick always held onto his ambition of having a local radio station in Waterford and when he returned to Waterford in 1976 he immediately contacted Egidio and put his ideas to him. For over a year Egidio worked on a transmitter that would give a quality signal and a reasonable range while Rick lobbied support from people interested in radio.

By May of 1978 the transmission tests were at last proving fruitful. Very few people hear of Egidio who is forever behind the scenes but his electrical genius is one of the most important contributions to WLR. Egidio is now a well known and highly regarded technician having built over twenty transmitters and supplying many to other local radios in Ireland. The fact that WLR is the only pirate station operating on V.H.F. and Medium wave is testimony to his talent.

JUNE 1978

W.L.R. Makes it's First Official Broadcast from Director Rick Whelan's Garage in Butlerstown on Sunday 23rd. June. Reaction is extremely good and by the end of June we have five presenters and are broadcasting from ten in the morning until six in the evening.

JULY 1978

Our first advertising revenue starts to come in, so we then boost our transmitter which now has a radius on medium wave of 20 miles. Five O in the Waterford Shopping Centre becomes our official supplier of records. W.L.R. is proving to be a huge novelty and we are delighted. More money is put into equipment.

AUGUST 1978

We are finding Rick's **Garage** a little restricting, so we move to a gate lodge down the road. Our Telephone arrives and rings constantly with requests, news items and lost and found. We are still broadcasting from ten until six. Our part-time staff now are Rick Whelan, Pat Haberlin, Ray O'Brien, Geoff Harris, Jackie O'Keeffe and Tom Mullane.

SEPTEMBER 1978

Things are now getting more organised, so a meeting is called and its decided that we need news Bulletins and proper office organisation. Helen O'Brien joins as newsreader and we take on another girl for the office. We do our first interviews with people from Community Organisations and we are getting away from the 'All Music' idea. Des Whelan joins as Rock presenter.

October 1978

We are now receiving over 250 calls during broadcasting hours and it is time to appoint a full time manager. Des Whelan gets the vote and immediately extends broadcasting hours to 7.30. p.m. and makes out a regular weekly timetable. The station now starts broadcasting at 8.00 a.m. We start our own roadshow in the **Andree** Hotel on Sunday nights. The average attendance over two years is 400. A contribution from each night's takings goes to the care of the aged in Waterford.

NOVEMBER 1978

The timetable is now stable, so our first community based programmes are introduced, including Saturday Morning Community Round-up, The Saturday afternoon local sports show, Hospital Requests programme and interviews are now featured daily. More Community groups are getting involved. We are raided at 7.10p.m. on Thursday 8th November by the P and T and our transmitter is confiscated. We install our spare transmitter and back on the air by 7.50.p.m.

DECEMBER 1978

We start an appeal for Toys and Clothes for needy kids in Waterford. The response is incredible and we have a great Christmas. We introduce a 'Phone-in system and Waterford people living in England send greetings to friends and relatives over the air.

JANUARY 1979

We decide to extend broadcasting hours and are now on the air from 7.30 in the morning until 1.30.a.m.

FEBRUARY 1979

We introduce a Magazine type Programme every morning between 11 and 12. The programme features local news, interviews with well known personalities and community groups. The show proves to be a great success.

Jono Torrie is appointed Head of our Advertising Department.

MARCH 1979

Our transmitter is again confiscated by the Department of P and T and we are treated much more informally this time. We all have a cup of tea and a chat.

We were back broadcasting the next day after installing our new and more powerful medium wave transmitter.

We introduce a special weekly two hour show for youth clubs in the locality. We also form a playlist committee for the selection of records to be played weekly. We introduce a singles and album chart based on sales and popularity.

APRIL 1979

Our transmitter arrives, but our present location has not enough height.

We introduce two bilingual programmes to the timetable. Martin Harte joins the ranks. Massive coverage is given to the N D C National Milk Run.

JUNE 1979

We celebrate our first year on the air with a live broadcast from the WLR Birthday party at the Ardree Hotel on Sunday night. Alleyn Pheasey does a marathon show of 10 hours. The money raised goes to the St. Vincent de Paul.

JULY 1979

Tony Weldon takes over the Tea-Time Special which is now catering for an older audience. Sports results are introduced at 5.15 p.m. in the afternoon and at 10.15 each night.

AUGUST 1979

The station is still based in Butlerstown and we are now finding that to offer a better service we must move into Waterford City. The site we require has got to be (a) Central (b) Height in order to use our VHF transmitter (c) easy access and (d) spacious. We look at several premises.

SEPTEMBER 1979

In the first week of September we see our present premises. It is just right, situated on one of the highest points in Waterford. It is also spacious and easily accessible. We move in on a Saturday in September and we are broadcasting from Wellington Street the following afternoon on VHF. We relay our VHF signal and put it out on medium wave from Butlerstown.

OCTOBER 1979

Because of the VHF we are now being piped throughout every shop, licensed premises and factory in the City. Reaction is terrific.

NOVEMBER 1979

Geoff Harris returns from RTE 2 to WLR and presents his own programme daily from 4.p.m. to 6 p.m.

A survey carried out as part of a project by pupils at Saint Paul's Community School reveals that 76% of the people in the area listen to Waterford Local Radio.

DECEMBER 1979

We again appeal for Toys and Clothes to the Community for the needy people in Waterford to help brighten up their Christmas. Reaction is fantastic, so much that we are still distributing toys and clothes almost two months later. Again we feature 'phone in from Waterford people living in England, this time for all of Christmas week.

JANUARY 1980

'What's on this Weekend' is introduced to our Friday timetable. We decided to do a spot check on our listening Audience in central Waterford. Out of 30 shops visited, 27 radios were tuned to WLR on medium wave and VHF 15 on VHF and 12 on Medium wave.

FEBRUARY 1980

Waterford Local Radio and Five O sponsor their own Rally car.

MARCH 1980

Waterford Local radio participate in St. Patrick's Day Parade as 'Pirates'.

A Swop Shop is introduced and in a week we have arranged over 50 swops.

We are approached by South Eastern Licensed Entertainments Association with regard to advertising. We immediately see this as a chance to present a programme of Local Music, and we record nearly all the groups in the area. The programme goes out weekly, on Fridays at lunchtime.

APRIL 1980

We collect over £1,000 worth of Easter Eggs for Needy Children in Waterford. We also raise nearly £1,000 in cash which is later donated to a charity. £200 is raised by auctioning an Easter Egg. We give details of Waterfords FAI Cup return. 20,000 people turn up to welcome them home. We run the official Victory dance in the Ardree Hotel and auction the FAI Cup winning ball for £650 which goes to the supporters club. Interviews with cup winning team in the dressing room after the match are requested over 20 times the day following the big match

MAY 1980

Our summer timetable is introduced with Community news on all shows. Dermot Graham starts on a new Magazine programme, covering local issues. Reaction is incredible. 7.00 to 9.00 p.m. is set aside for non playlist music programmes. Eoin Ronayne and John Fletcher join the ever expanding staff at the station.

JUNE 1980

We introduce a job finding service with a great success. We are now filling a dozen vacancies per week. With the introduction of the timetable changes advertising jumps and in fact has more than doubled in a year. We extend our news bulletins. News is now read hourly from 8.a.m to 8.p.m. 7 days each week. We decide to start broadcasting a half hour earlier. W.L.R. now starts broadcasting at 7.a.m. on weekdays and 8.a.m. on Weekends.

JULY 1980

Our job finding service is becoming increasingly popular with employers. We do special features on the Bob Marley Concert, The Police at Leixlip and Pairc Ui Caoimh where we had representative talking to the stars.

We start work on a new V.H.F. Transmitter, our current one is only 40 watts with a range of about eight miles. The new one will be 200 watts with a range of up to 30 miles.

AUGUST 1980

WLR are asked by the local Gardai to help with appeals to people for information about an assault and are publicly thanked by a detective after a successful conclusion in which Waterford Local Radio and their listeners proved invaluable.

We are overjoyed and see this as a major breakthrough with the authorities recognising the station and hopefully we can assist the Gardai again in the future.

Waterford's Alltime favourite singles are compiled from listeners votes and requests. The reaction to this is great. Tommy O'Keeffe joins our list of presenters.

Some examples of our Community involvement include the promotion of the Gaultier Community Festival, the raising of funds for St. Mary's Day Centre. In the month of August over 50 interviews have been featured on the station in connection with Community affairs.

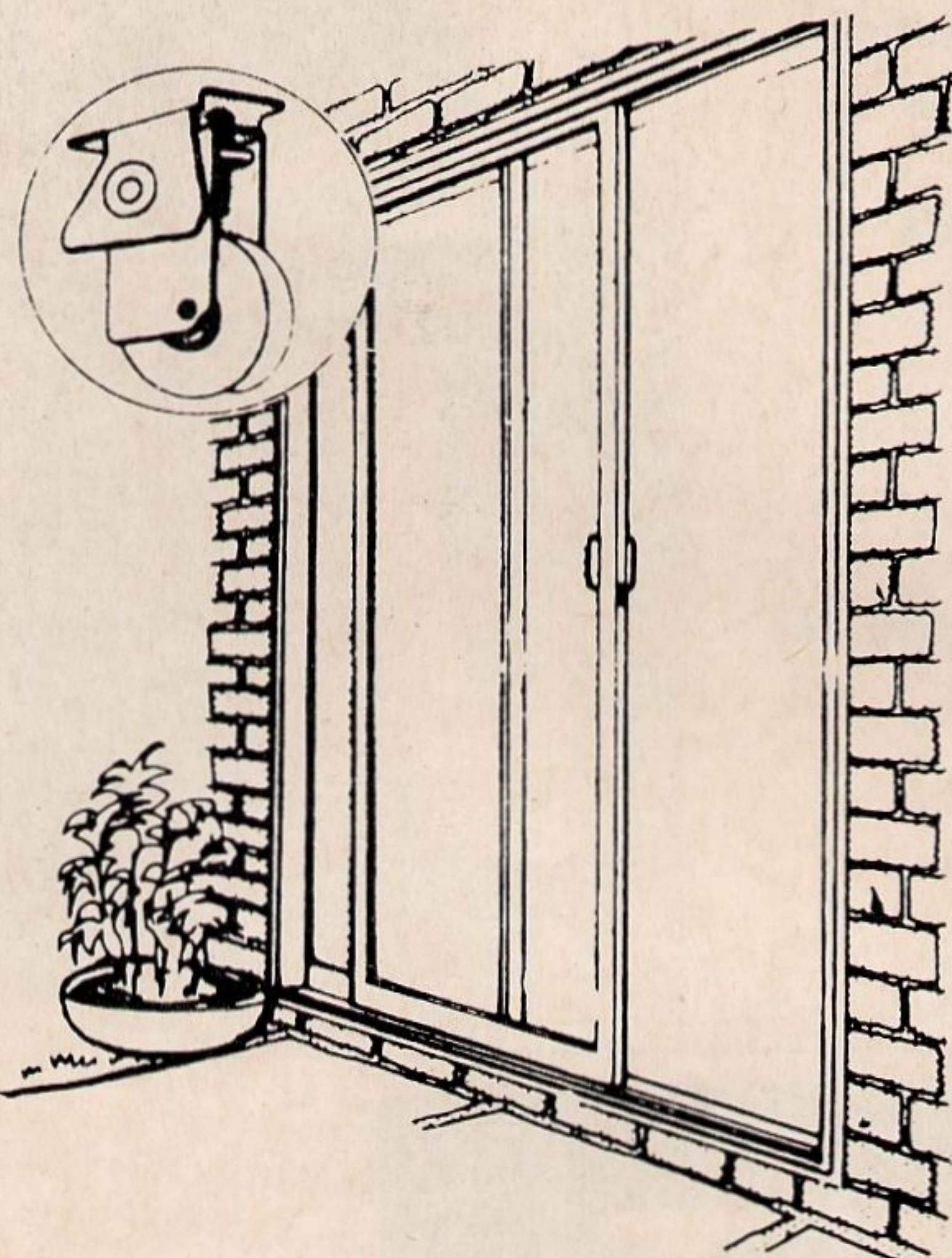

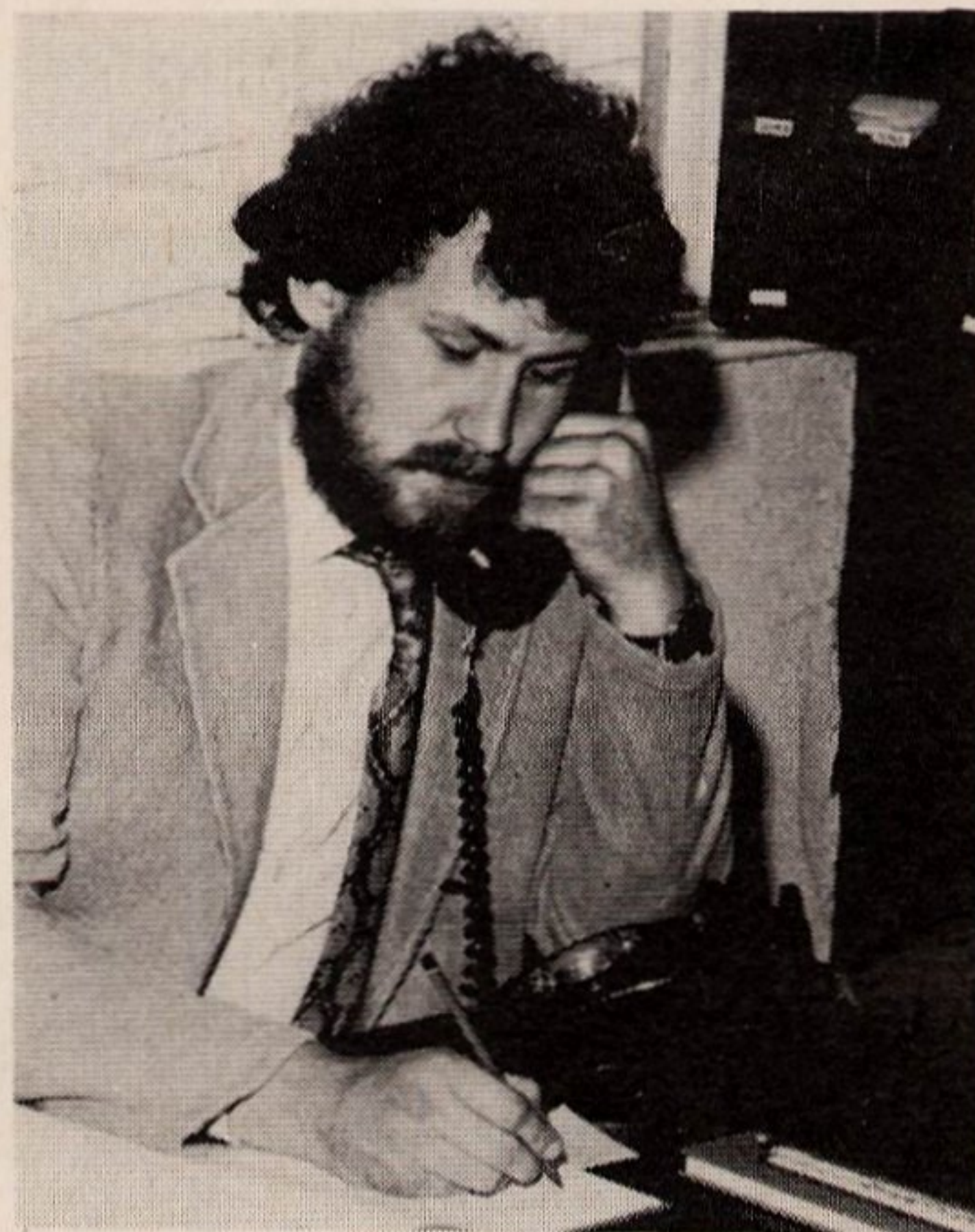

On the news

Did you ever hear where they got the word NEWS from? I don't know if it is true or not but one explanation I've heard is that it comes from the Cardinal points of the compass, i.e. North, East, West and South, or NEWS. Well you don't have to believe that really but it does go to illustrate what the news means. Everything that happens around us is news and if Man does happen to bite Dog you the public want to know about it, pronto. Hence that breed of Homo Sapiens known as the News Reporter. These are known to live in tiny hovels equipped with one small typewriter (they can't afford large ones) and a worn out telephone. They are permanently enshrouded in cigarette smoke and their fingers evidence the signs of much card playing to pass the time.

In the instant media context the News Reporter is a very valuable animal. Speed of communications has meant that the instant media of radio and television have become the vital and most important source of news to the public. If, for instance, a Government is overthrown in some remote island state in the Indian Ocean we know about it in Ballybeg within a couple of hours through the radio news. Similarly if there is tragedy on the Tramore road we know about it within an hour through local radio news.

You, me and the rest of the general public demand this news service. We all want to know what is happening around us. It brightens up our lives and it gives us something to talk about. What a dull place it would be to live if we had nothing to talk about every day. Have you ever noticed at home or in your place of work how there is frequently a lull in general conversation when the news comes on the radio and how the topic of conversation quickly changes to the latest news happening.

We all crave the news and we news reporters crave that you continue to crave the news and keep us from having to crave for our daily bread in some other dastardly way.

June of 1978 saw the realisation of Rick's ambition when W.L.R. came on the air and he has been instrumental in its growth ever since.

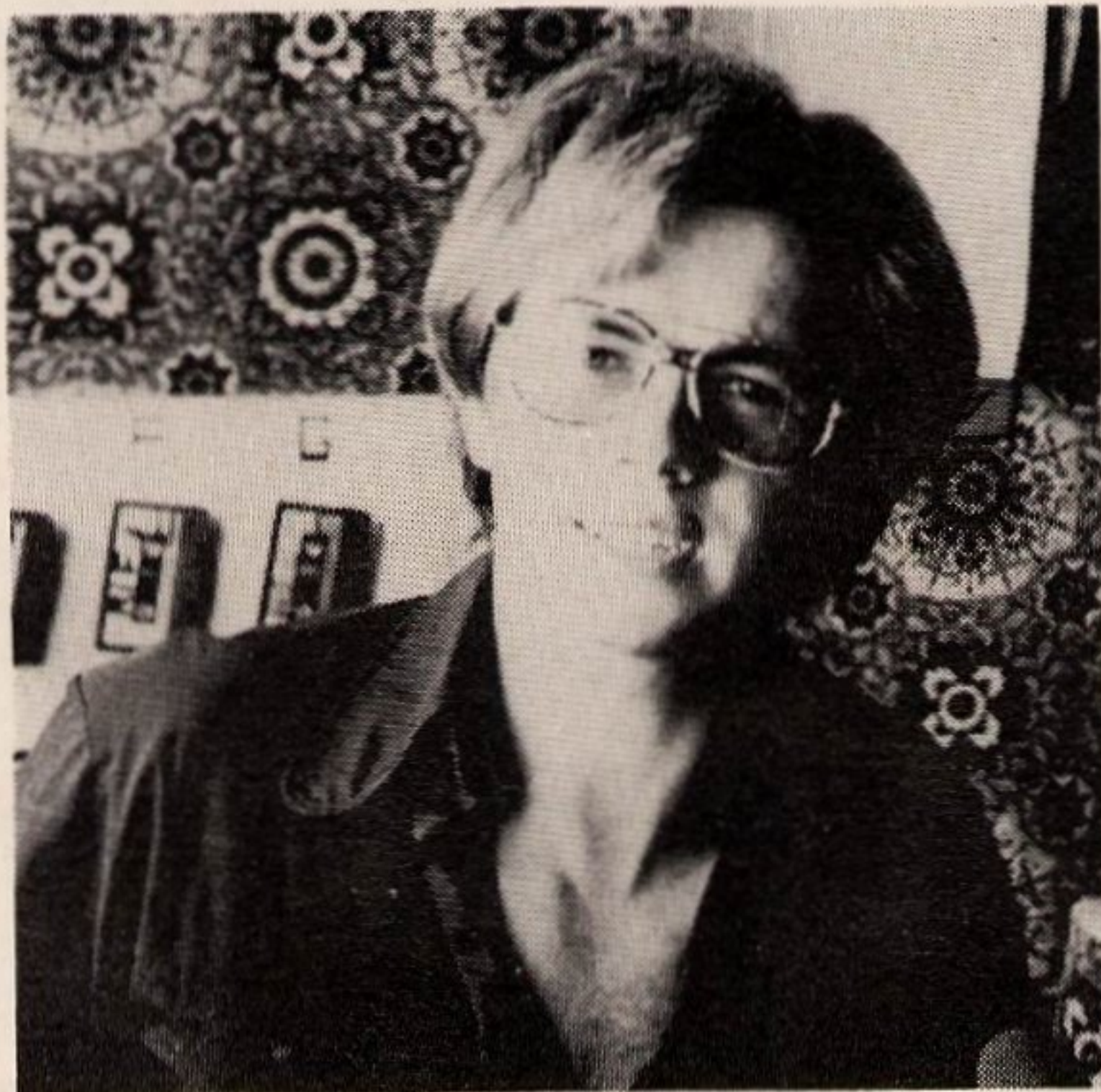

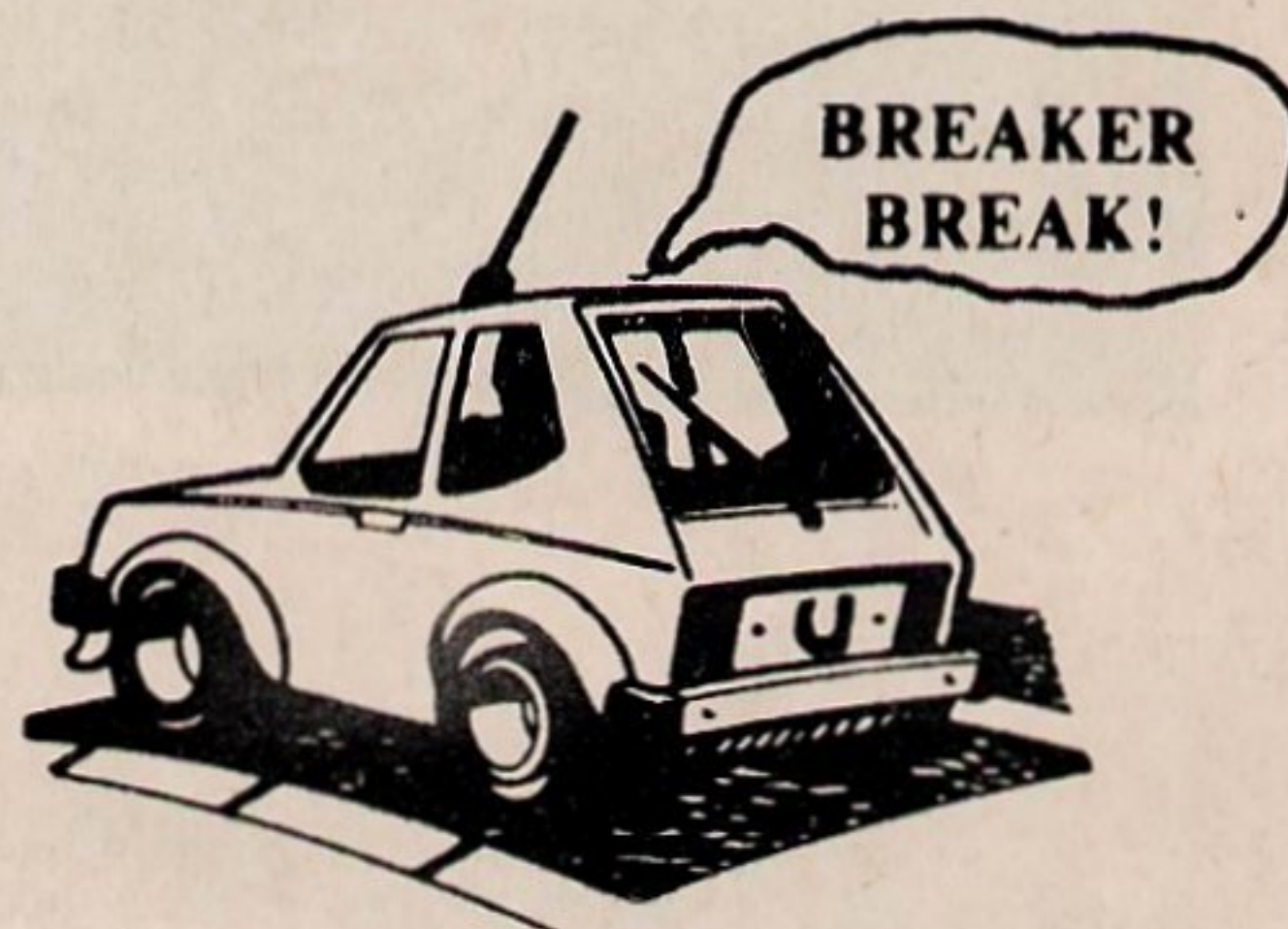

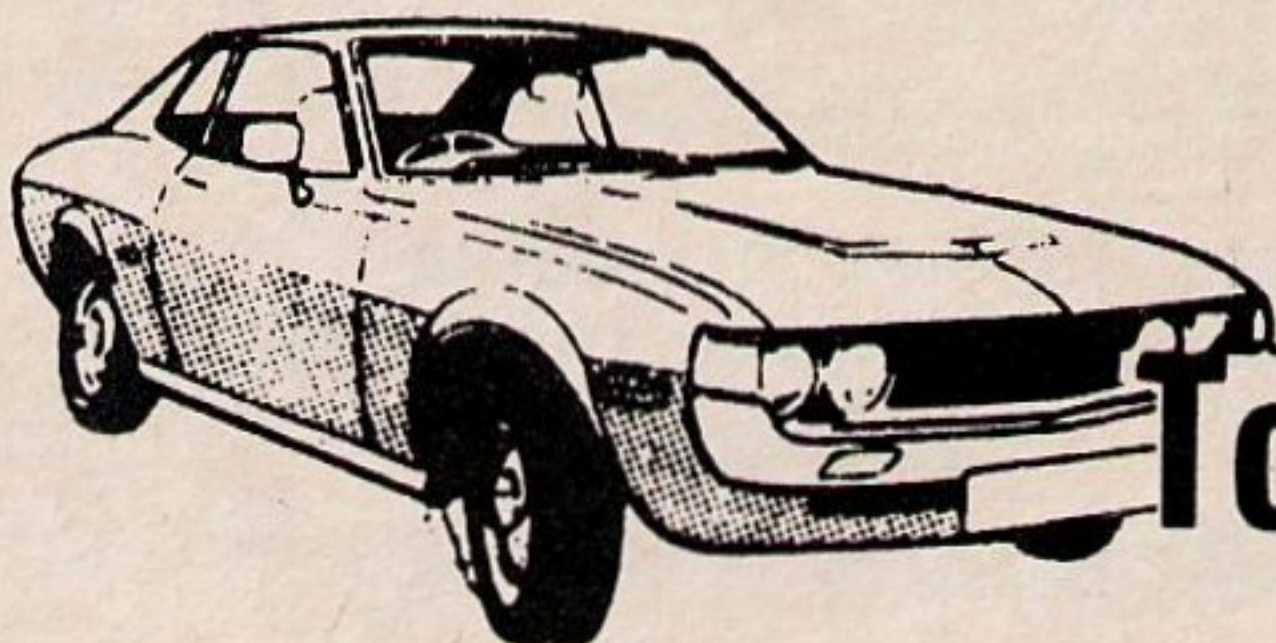

JOHN FLETCHER

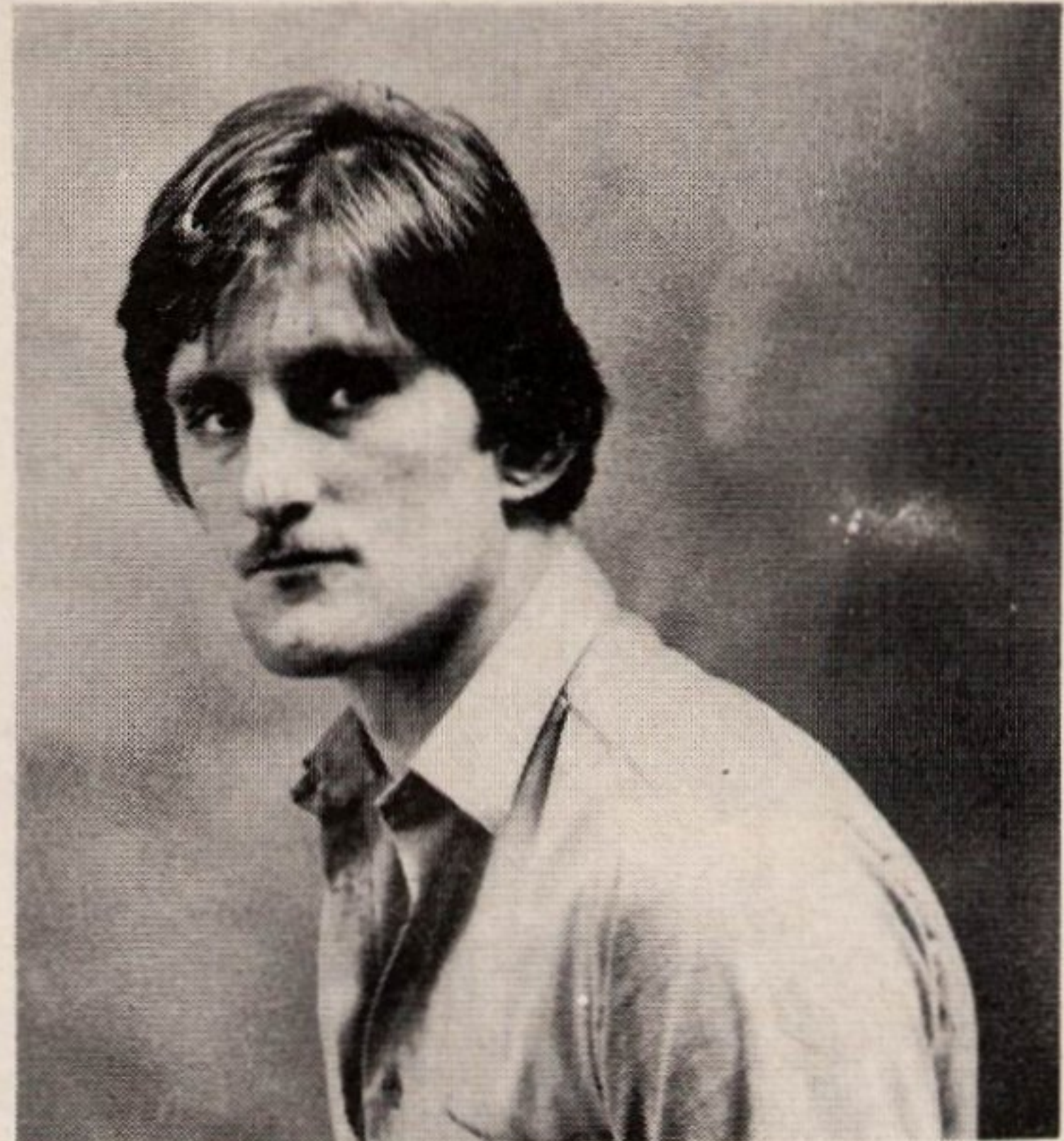
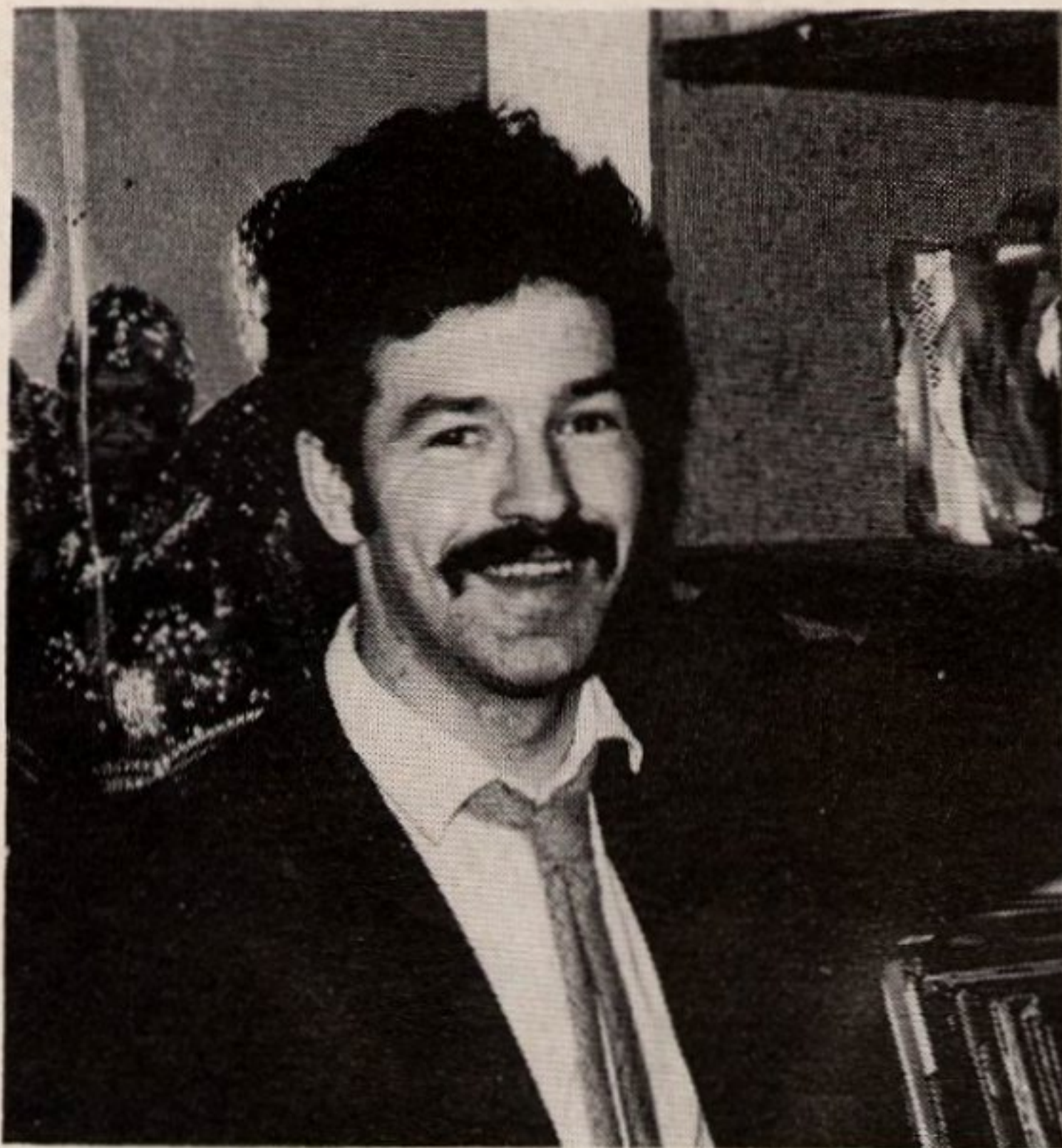

JOHN CRAIG



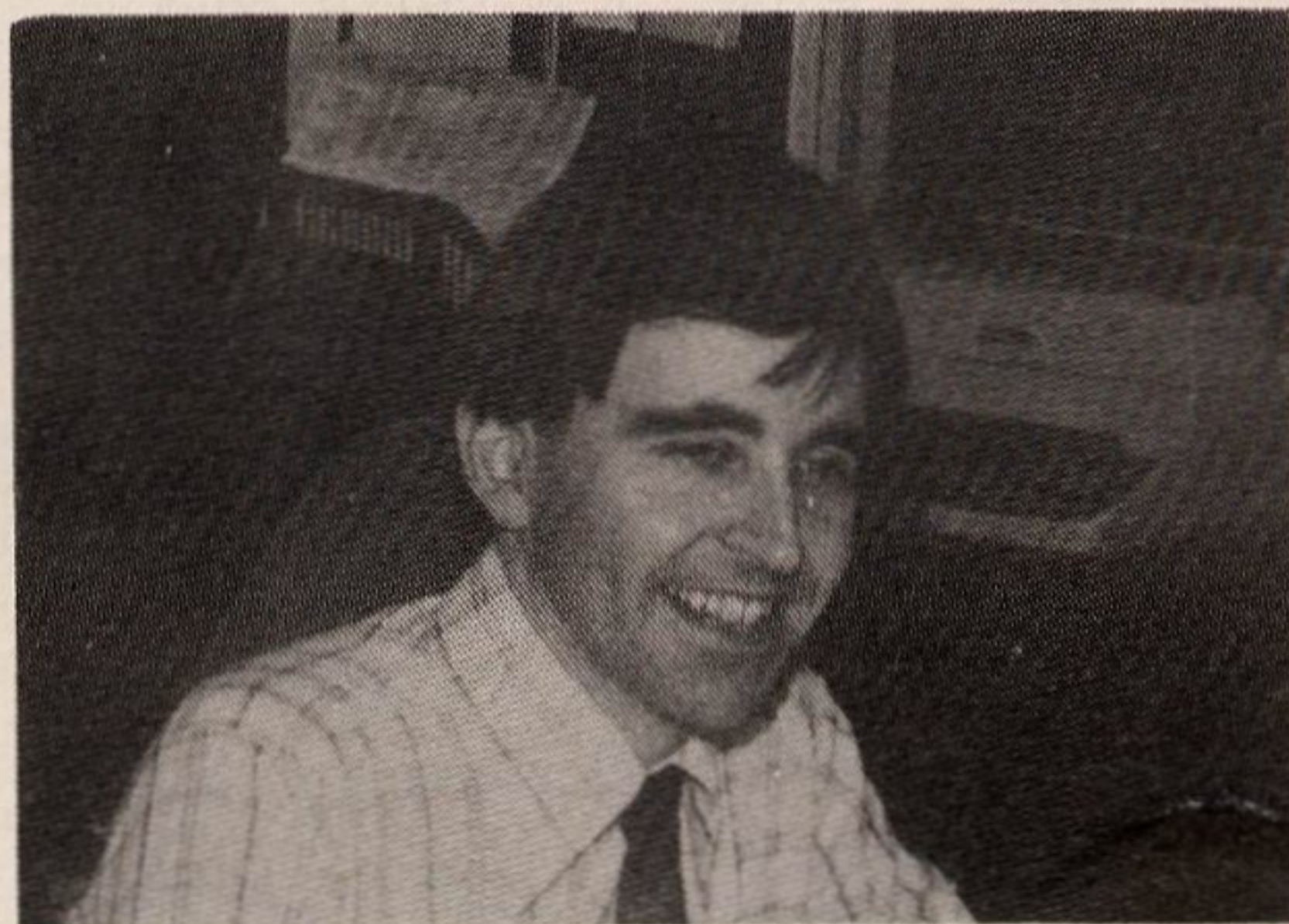
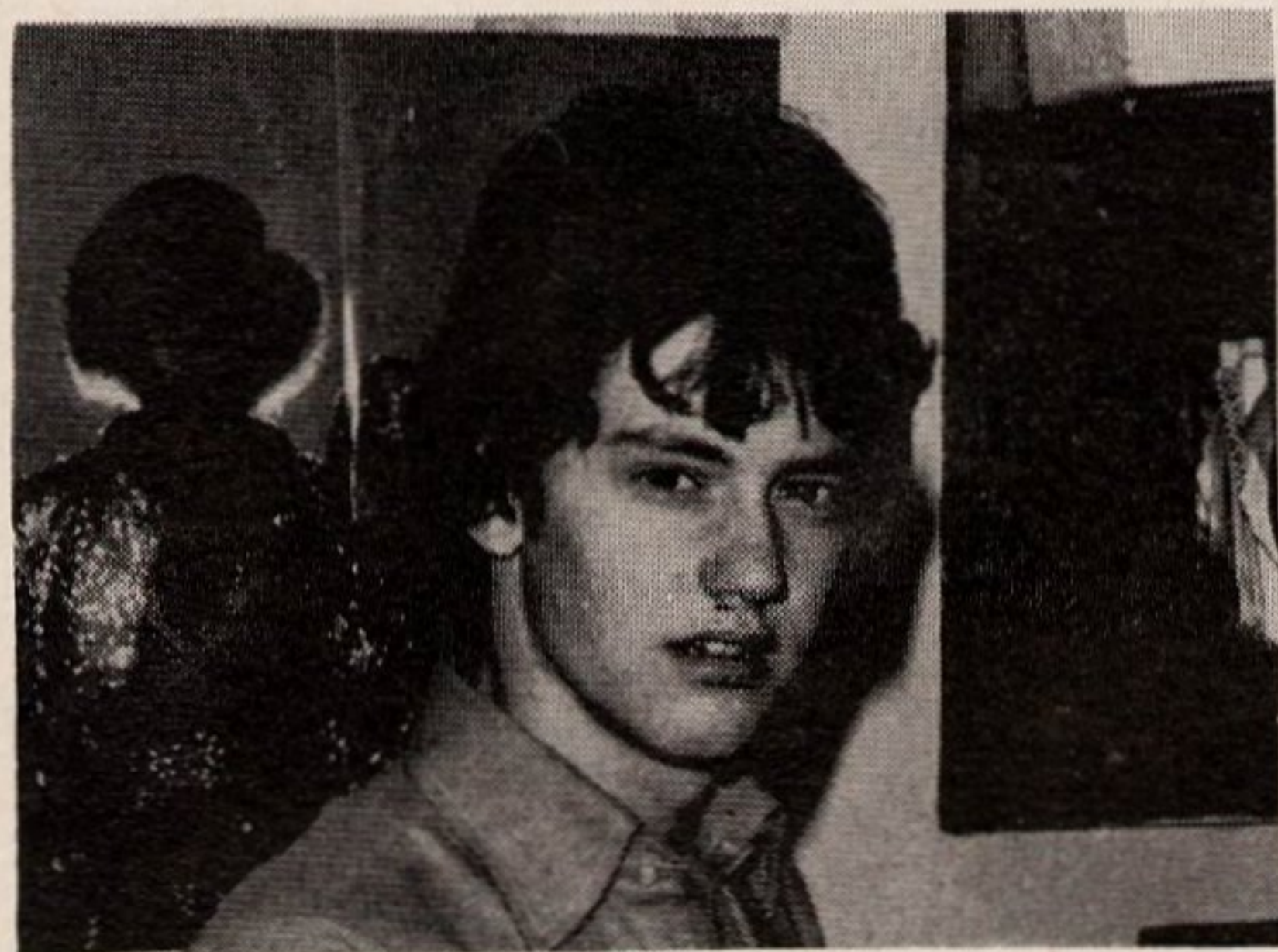

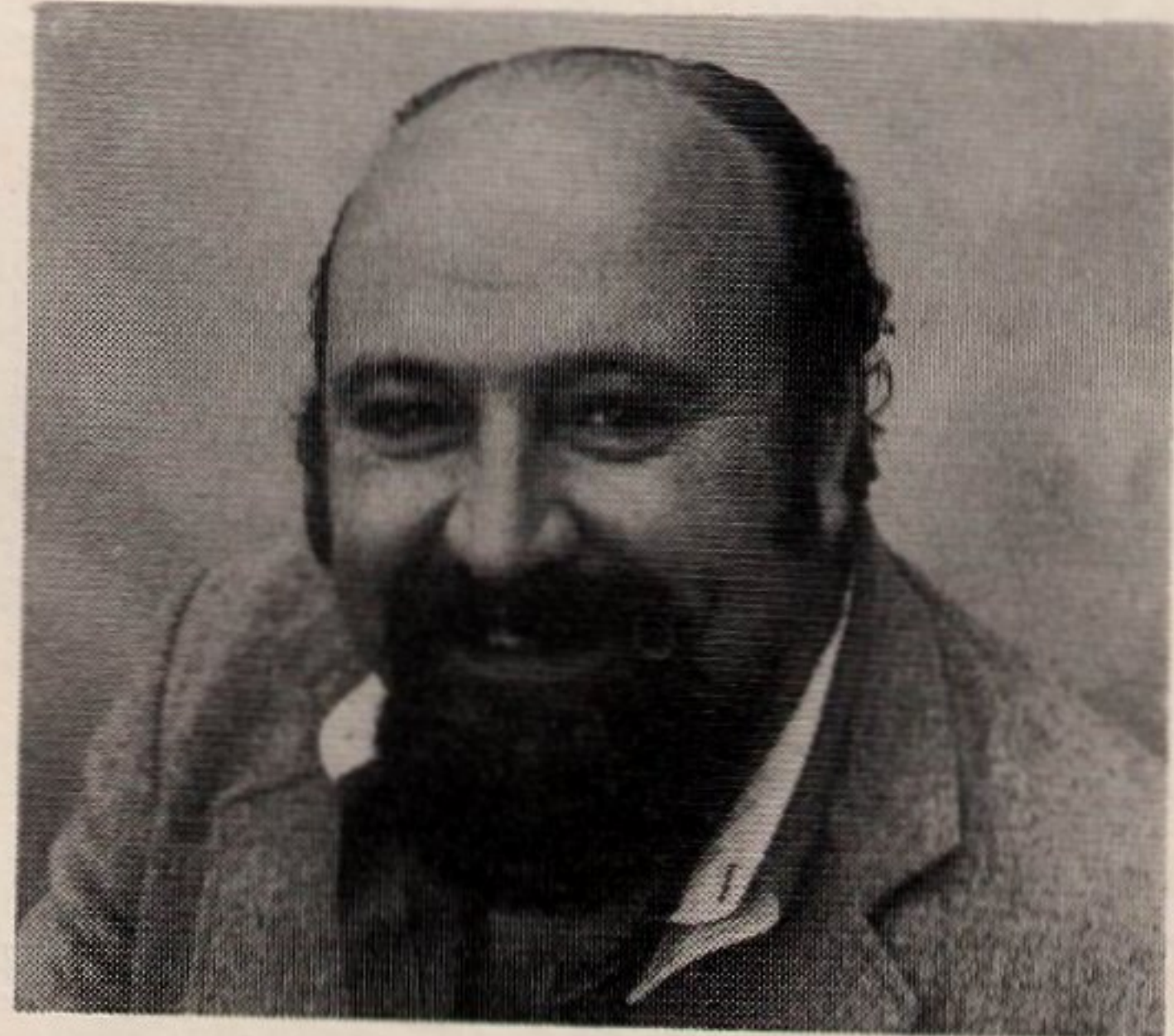
DERMOT GRAHAM

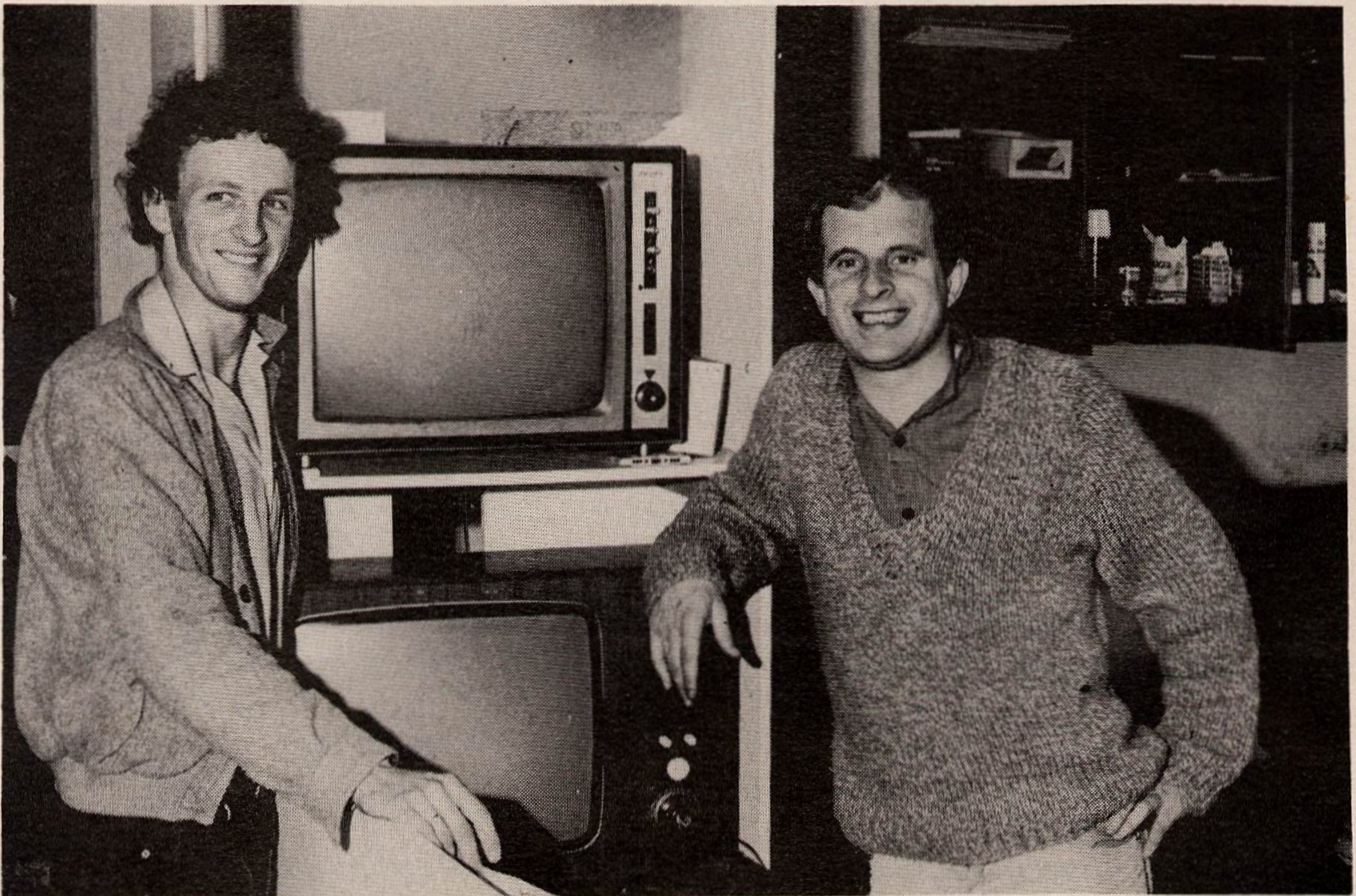
Sport on WLR

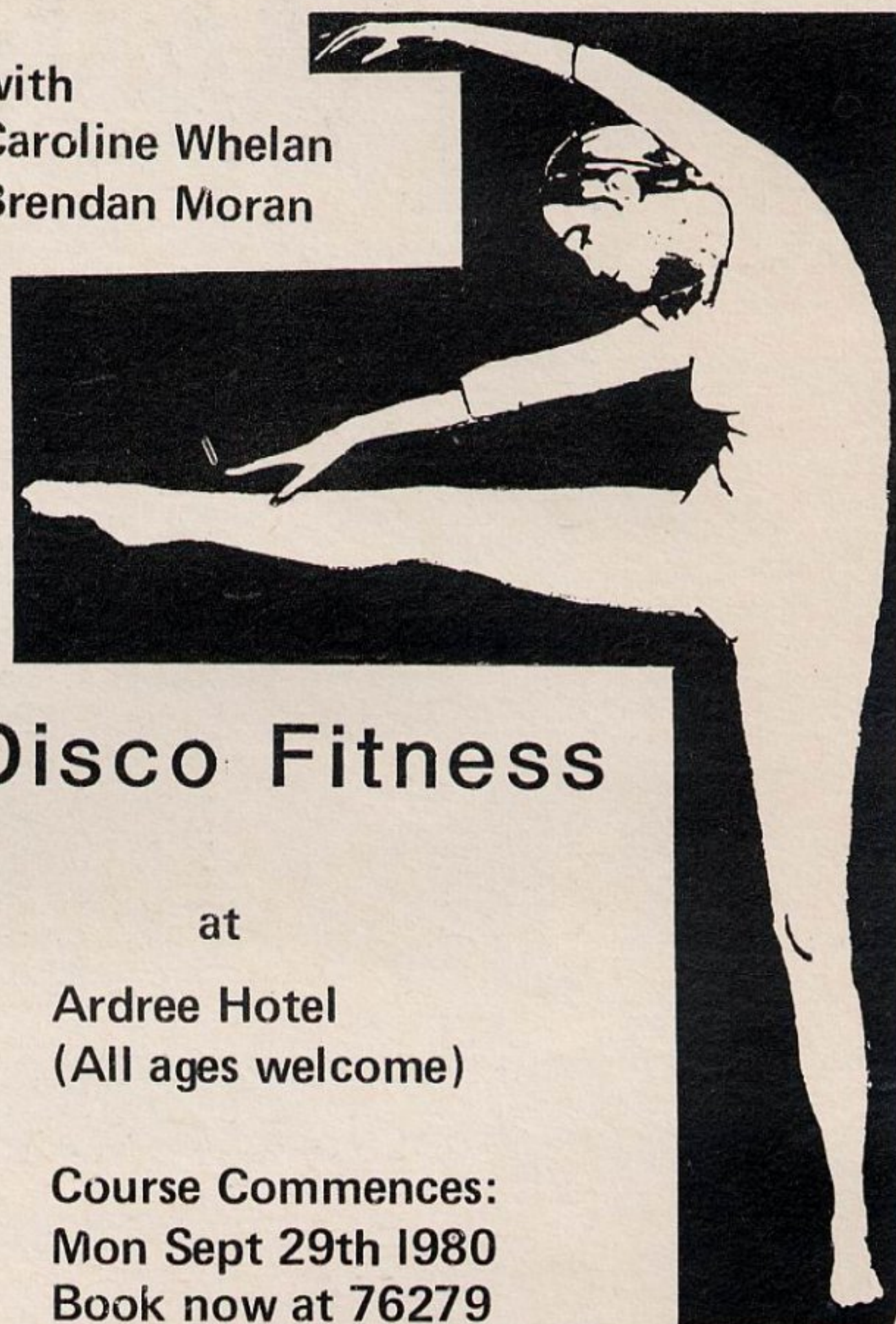

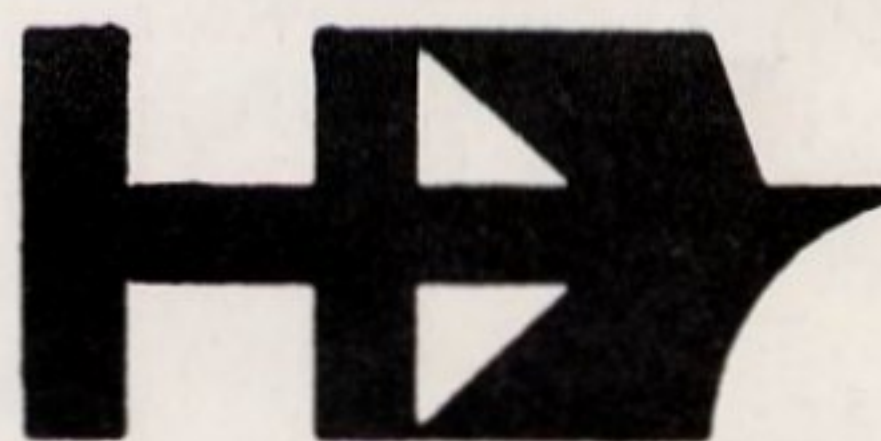
