RADIO STATION NEWS...IRELAND. The rather extended spell of good FM reception conditions unfortunately came to an end this past week, leaving us with very little to listen on FM from Ireland, with one exception, Kiss FM. Undaunted, we turned back to good old medium wave and landed a rather good catch, for us at least, in Glencoe Radio on 1143kHz., from Donegal town. This was a ground wave catch and the signal was received best around mid-day each day. Plenty of ID's were noted, including one which said 'the voice of Glencoe', along with lots of adverts for businesses in the area. We obtained a telephone number, but are unsure if it is correct, due to the poor reception. Anyone who may have the address and telephone number details, may like to pass them on to us.

Co. DUBLIN. Q 102 announced that last week really was the final week in the very successful Abrakebabra (fast food outlet) competition. Only one car number is being read out each day this week, the final one being today, during the Jason Maine Breakfast Show. When the driver hears the number, he has twelve hours to contact the food outlet and win £100. Although Abrakebabra are no doubt delighted with results, one Sunday paper scribe didn't like it at all and gave both the station and food outlet a good slating in his column, last Sunday (see cuttings sheet). The 819kHz. transmitter, although sounding fine all week, certainly sounded a bit ropey yesterday morning, in fact was only just audible here. Later reports told us that it left the air, but on checking in the evening, it was noted back again.

We asked, last week, if one of our Dublin readers would check out Heartbeat FM. David in Rathmines gave them a listen on Monday evening last, on 95.5MHz., and was rather surprised to hear the popular Tracie Evans finishing a programme at 22:00. Tracie has, of late, been heard with a regular mid-morning show on Liberty 104. However, on ringing Liberty, David was unable to ascertain from the guy who answered, as to whether she had left the station, or what, due to the fact that he, himself, was new that day. We will listen out next week for the answers to this one. He goes on to say that the station seemed to have quite

a number of adverts and sounded quite well. As far as we know, they still play love songs' and the like. We are unable to monitor this one here, due to local BBC activity.

On the subject of Liberty 104, we are informed that the station may now have a Three Rock (local mountain) site and it is thought to be the one on 103.5MHz. The other two FM's are 104.0 and 104.5MHz., in addition to 1035kHz. AM. Ex Energy weekend news-reader, Michael Mahon can now be heard on the station, Saturdays and Sunday, reading the news from 9:00 till 16:00. He joins Tina Gates, who deals with news in the week, and Dennis Murray, who does the 'drive' spot daily. CAU FM apparently moved from 103.5MHz. because of the Liberty move. They can now be found on 104.2MHz. Former Energy deejays, Liam Coburn and John O'Hara were supposed to be joining CAU, but so far, have not been heard. The station has, though, 'borrowed' one or two now unused 'Power Station' voice-overs, formerly heard on Energy.

Radio Dublin has re-employed Gerry Maher as station manager, after an absence of eight years. Audio quality and general professionalism have already improved, we are told, and big things are expected. We hope to be able to report on these.

We mentioned a survey carried out by Sunshine 101 FM, in last week's issue. We now have the advanced ratings from the 1988 radio listenership study, carried out by Wilton Research for Sunshine 101.....



He is delighted to be able to listen to Kiss FM from Monaghan, and says the signal is great on 103.7MHz., there, although their local station, K.L.B. on 103.5MHz., occasionally causes some spaltter over the Kiss signal. K.C.R. are no longer broadcasting on 1413kHz., during the week and it seems that the only time the station broadcasts is on Sunday mornings for hospital requests, in fact, last weekend, it was not heard at all. It is rumoured that the station could be for sale, complete. Meanwhile, over in Newbridge, some eight or so miles away, the joining of Zee 100 and K.L.B.

has not been too successful and it seems that all is not well there.

Excellent programmes have been heard all week, once again, especially of note was an oldies show last Sunday afternoon, with tunes not heard for many a year being played. The FM audio on 103.7MHz. was noted missing on Wednesday, although the transmitter remained very much alive. MW was unaffected on checking. According to the station chief engineer, Miles Johnston, in a live interview on Radio West this morning, the link packed up and the installation people had to fly in from London to rectify the problem. Miles went on to say that advertising was coming in nicely and the station were now consolodating their position, before further expansion, in the form of split programming, in the Autumn.

Kits FM, on 100.9MHz. were missing on our regular bandscan on Monday morning, although for what reason, is not known. We are unable to monitor the 837kHz. transmissions because of BBC local activity and FM conditions dropped and left us with nothing, so we don't know when they came back! No mailing address has been noted for this station, can anyone help?

Co. LONGFORD. Longford Community Radio (L.C.R.) are now back on the air with full power, following their aerial being re-erected to its former height. Also, a new amplifier has been fitted to the transmitter, to give the station good audio once more. Whilst operating on low power, the audio had been very distorted. The station are announcing the new channel of 1035kHz.(formerly 1071kHz.) as 290 metres. Unfortunately, this is a very busy channel, and whilst the 1071kHz. used to be receivable here in Blackpool very well in the Summer and often at other times (due to no U.K. operator), we cannot now hear L.C.R. due to the powerful signal from Dublin station, Liberty 104. In a car, the new channel reaches Kells before Liberty 104 is clearly audible in its place.

Co. WICKLOW. Viking 105 has been noted missing all week, when monitored by us, on 1602kHz. FM is no doubt on air, but inaudible here due to very low power.

Co. WATERFORD. The famous 'religious' broadcaster, Roy Masters, has been in Waterford this past week, for a seminar. We were told that he was going to be interviewed on ABC Radio, live. Poor AM conditions prevented us listening, however. A new deejay, Dara Corcoran, has joined ABC. He comes from BLB in Bray, and briefly Sunshine 101. He can be heard at present, on the 21:00 till 23:00 slot, nightly. Waterford Local Radio (WLR) continue to prosper, along with ABC in the city, we are told, whilst N.C.R., the third operator, finds things not quite as good. Both their AM and FM signals are very low in power and the coverage area is resultantly small.

Teledisc to be Radio Nova's first ad client

New satellite service Radio Nova International has secured its first advertising client: record company Teledisc.

Airtime for Nova, which starts broadcasting across Europe on 1 May, is being sold by Independent Radio Sales.

Nova is the brain child of former Radio Luxembourg station manager Chris Cary. He said that £1 million had been invested in the service, which will beam a 24-hour pop station to cable head-ends across Europe, including the UK.

The signal will be received in the home on audio equipment plugged into the same socket that supplies TV receivers.

Cary said: "I reckon we could earn £20,000 a week from advertising. We just want to go up to people and sav. 'Look, you might as well just spend £1,000 because Nova is so cheap'."

Tony Blackburn will present a Sunday afternoon European top 40) programme and a soul show.

Following last week's mention of the station, test transmissions began at 14:50 on Friday afternoon (29th April 1988), beginning this new era in radio broadcasting. Owner Chris Cary was in the studio at the time, and played the first record, along with several Ex Energy announcements. Tim Kelly, deejay, first to programme, continued until an old Gary Owens syndicated show was aired. Some of the old Radio Nova jingles have been heard, along with a few promotions, but obviously at this time of only tests, no commercials have yet Further additions to heard. the on-air staff include, ex Dublin and Cork deejay, Liam Quigley, now resident for some time in London. It is reported that Tony Prince may not, after all, be able to host any shows, due to his heavy commitments elsewhere. This is rather unfortunate, as people many

were looking forward to hearing this very popular voice. The station is officially opened at 16:00 on 4th May. (see copy of an invitation below). The article above comes from a recent edition of "Campaign" and it appears that the writer here, too, is confused about receiving the station!

LAND - BASED STATIONS : U.K.

BRISTOL. Last time, we left B.A.D. Radio (105.0) on the point of possibly about to start a full week's schedule. In fact, they programmed through the night into Monday 18th April, announcing that they were going off at 09:00, although if they felt like it, possibly a little later. B.A.D. Radio next appeared on Friday (23rd April), and were first noted at 19:40. Extended hours were again in operation, with the station still plugging away at 09:30 on Saturday morning (24th). At 12:00, 'Freddie Banton' hosted a lunchtime reggae slot, and gave mention to B.A.D.'s 24 hour schedule, and also stereo transmissions were referred to. The station continued throughout the weekend, continuously, apart from a few short technical breaks, with its regular diet of reggae, soul, dance, hip-hop, and jazz music. Audio quality was again up and down, resulting in distortion at times.

Monday (18th April) saw Radio F.T.P. (104.0 - mono) on air for their regularly scheduled weekday evening broadcasts starting at 17:00. The signal was weaker than normal. Mention was given to their forthcoming night out in London, with a telephone number of Bristol 557062 given for ticket information. The station had vanished by 22:00, and was not heard again until Wednesday evening, when their audio was very low and distorted, and the deejays could hardly be heard. This also occurred on Thursday, but by sign-on at 17:00 on Friday afternoon (22nd April), the problem had been cured. At 17:31 the presenter cut over the record, and appealed for 'Soulful D' to turn up at the studios. It was repeated several times that the situation was on a 'red

alert', before all audio fell almost to inaudibility. At first there was thought to have been some DTI activity, but the programmes soon recommenced and went on through until' sign off just after midnight. Radio For The People returned late on Saturday afternoon, and broadcast through until at least 22:00. When next checked at 23:30, they had vanished, and did not appear on Sunday either. We hope to find out next week, if anything sinister has happened to Radio F.T.P.

> LONDON WEEKEND SURVEY. 22nd - 25th April 1988.

This weekend, locked into 28 stations, 8 in stereo.

Missing / not heard :- London Rock, Solar 93, Starpoint, Ice, G.R.L./R.F.L., Raiders FM, Hits FM, SW Sound, Galaxy and TKO.

One or two notable names were missing this week, on a weekend when listening was complicated with a ridge of high pressure bringing in stations from all over the U.K., Belgium, Holland and France. Some time was spent, for instance, in trying to resolve a station on 105.6 playing soul music on Sunday evening, only to find that it was Radio France Int. This also meant that it was necessary to get. quite close to some stations to ascertain that they were actually on. WNK (102.85) could only be clearly identified North of the Thames, whereas it can usually be locked into well South of the river. It also brought the bonus, that Essex and Easterner's Stomp FM (105.45 - stereo) were, for once. resolvable in quite good stereo in some parts of the West End. The best place found was actually at the centre of Waterloo Bridge, just about 200 yards from the DTI/RIS main office, which is a building bristling with more antannae than MI5 have at their Curzon Street HQ.

Sangam has been on the move again this week. Having settled on 94.3'ish, a couple of weeks back, alongside the recently moved PRS (94.3), Sangam have now decamped to 89.95MHz. This is becoming another crowded sector, especially at the weekends. The 'powerhouse' transmitter of London Irish Community Radio (LIC-R) (89.6), the country and pixie music station from the North, already tramples low power Deptford weekend soulsters Groove FM (89.75). And on 89.95, RJR returned on Sunday from a few days holiday at the behest of the 'Reggae-cide Squads'. LIC-R are currently in mono, suggesting a recent visit, but newcomers Sangam have brought a stereo encoder with them.

Also missing this weekend are Greek Northerners, GRL/HRFL (96.15), who have on occasions been going 24 hours at the weekend. It has been found, that the literal translation of HRFL comes out as "The Greek Radio Voice of London" - but both sets of initials will continue to be used. It looks as though LGR (88.3) were also hit during the week, but made a quick comeback. GCR (104.45) were also notable for a couple of short absences, but this is thought to be technical problems, rather than the DTI.

CD 93 (93.2 - stereo) were back on Saturday for the. weekend, with what started out as a good quality clear stereo. signal to complement their material, which is a mixture of rock to jazz, via soul. By Sunday, they had begun to sound a bit ragged around the edges, so maybe a transmitter overhaul is called for already. A number of stations sounded as though they were having distortion problems. Super Fresh FM (103.4) were having problems again, as were renamed, and returned in low power Big Time Radio (103.9 - shades of Max Headroom perhaps), who were missing again on Sunday morning, only to be back by the evening.

Eastern weekend soulsters Sunrise (88.8) were on for the weekend from Friday, with a much enhanced signal, which is possibly why Saturday night rockers London Rock (same frequency) were not heard. A shame really, just when LR appeared to be getting everything going smoothly, they get done down again.

Saturday evening, a soul station was heard on 91.15, which was impossible to identify. This was mainly as my wife had been celebrating her birthday a little freely, and insisted. on watching the portable tv. In normal times this would not have proved too much of a problem, but at the time we were driving down Streatham High Road at thirty m.p.h.. She was in the back I hasten to add.

The 'Magnificent Seven' at Rock FM (94.25) are taking over part of the mantle, originally cast by Clockwork Wireless. last year, with the inclusion of a number of comedy records. At one point, with Hugo, they even included 'Hugo's Singing Dog', howling along to guitar accompaniment. Ah well it's only rock and roll I suppose.

More from Sid next week.

LONDON UP-DATE. Although the DTI have obviously been around this week, very few stations seem to have missed any air-time. In fact, this weekend, the only station missing seems to be the newcomer, CD - 93. All others were heard as normal. Solar 93 made a return to the air, after being missing for several weeks. Hits FM were also back on Saturday and although announcing programmes till 01:00, Sunday, had disappeared well before this time. Raiders FM made a test on the unfortunate frequency of 98.1MHz., and were wiped out over most of the city, by Traffic Jam. Also missing was Essex's Stomp FM.

Stations reported on air this weekend include..... London Greek Radio (88.4), Sunrise FM (88.8), London Rock (88.8), London Irish Community Radio (89.6), Groove FM (89.7), RJR (89.95), RTR (90.2), Passion FM (90.6), Sina Radio (90.9), Faze 1 (91.0), Sky FM (91.7), LWR (92.1), Studio FM (92.7), Solar 93 (93.0), Jive FM (93.15), Kiss FM (94.0), Rock FM (94.3), City Radio (94.5), Traffic Jam (98.0), TKO (102.4), Fresh FM (103.3), Time Radio (103.7), Greek

Community Radio (104.4) and Hits FM (105.5).

Two mysteries.... a blank carrier on 105.2MHz. for much of Saturday, which was not Raiders FM and also a station on 96.9MHz., very weak in Essex, possibly identifying as 'Strong Island Radio'.

MIDLANDS. The first Asian station to be logged for some weeks, has been noted during the past week, around 106MHz. The full identification was not heard, but the name included 'Islamic'. This appeared to be a test transmission, as the format was mostly records, with very few announcements. Another new station was heard being promoted via Enterprise FM (91.9). Calling itself Solar Rock FM, it was supposed to start on Friday at 18:00, and run through the weekend until Monday morning. It will be a weekend only station. The frequency has been announced as 90.9MHz., the former Enterprise FM channel. The format will be 70% soul, and some reggae. It is part of the West Midlands Music Network. Radio P.C.R.L.(103.6), Enterprise FM (91.9) and Powerhouse Radio (105.1), have all been heard as normal this week. Electro Radio (95.0) has been heard intermittently, giving out an address c/o Hackwood House, Oldbridge, Warley, West Midlands B69 1EG.

YORKSHIRE, HUMBERSIDE & DERBYSHIRE. Just two stations have been noted in Leeds this week. Peoples FM (91.8) have been on, both in the week and at the weekend. Their audio is still said to leave a little to be desired (distorted). ABC FM (105.2) have not been heard in the week, but were back on the air on Friday night for what now appears to be a weekend only schedule. Music City Radio (90.3) have not been heard for several weeks.

W.L.N.G. (104.95) were on the air on both 26th and 28th April, between 20:30 and 22:30. Their regular variety of music formats and shows were apparent, interspersed with several adverts.

In South Yorkshire, Rebel Radio (105.4) were once again on the air on Monday night (25th), with programmes commencing at 20:00. A break in transmission was noted at 20:40, after which the audio was only half of what it had been. As well as Scooter Jones, a new presenter, Ken Crescendo was heard for an hour starting at 20:30. A mystery station playing 'house' music was heard several evenings in the past week, on various frequencies between 102.4 and 106.8MHz. No identification was noted. Village Radio also conducted a few tests last Monday, although the transmitter has moved up to 105.2 from 104.85, causing problems for the nearby Rebel Radio.

In Derbyshire, Radio Freedom were on the air today, with Bank Holiday programmes from 08:00 to midnight. Frequencies in use are 1242kHz. and 105.0MHz. They are also announcing similar Monday broadcasts.

NOTTINGHAM. Heatwave Community Radio (105.1) were heard in Derbyshire with their regular strong signal up until Wednesday evening (27th). From this time, the signal has either been very weak, or the station has been off the air. In fact, it appears that the latter was correct, from a further local report, which confirms that both Heatwave and Mainline International Radio (note correct title, here) on 105.5MHz., were both missing from the airwaves on Friday. The reporter tells us that Heatwave returned on Saturday.

THE SOUTH COAST. A.B.C. Radio (105.3) has decided to have a few weeks 'holiday' after repeated attempts by the DTI to raid the station. Luckily, each time the staff have managed to escape. Also, the temporary departure of A.B.C.'s number two man (Mike Williams) to Radio Caroline,

has caused this decision. A.B.C. hope to be back on the air by the end of May. More information and car stickers can be obtained from 128 Kingfisher Drive, Eastbourne, East Sussex BN23 7RT.

Radio Atlantis (105.3) made one of its monthly broadcasts on Sunday 24th April at 19:00, for two hours. The signal was good over much of East Sussex and Kent. Presenters were Nick Thomas and Johnny Diamond. Their address is the same as A.B.C.'s.

RENFREWSHIRE. Neon Radio (103.9) appeared again today, after several months absence. Theye were on their old frequency, and announcing a telephone number for requests. Tests were carried out up until regular programmes commenced at 13:30 until 17:30. Paisley Free Broadcasting were heard broadcasting on Saturday night between 19:30 and 20:30. The station is only an occasional one, and is using only low power. Northside Community Radio are expected back on the air during the coming week.

MERSEYSIDE. Its been a week of little action in this north west region. Monday saw the two main operators, Radio Merseywaves on 1242kHz. and Radio Atlantis on 1197kHz., on air. Normal programmes ensued and both stations completed their weekend schedules. On Thursday, Radio Merseywaves emerged once again, but sounded a bit 'rough around the edges', so to speak. Friday and they were joined by Radio Atlantis, as usual. On Saturday, the main two were on air and were expected to be joined by Radio Julie, but alas, Julie seemed to experience some problems when they switched on in the afternoon, as the signal kept going up and down, on 104.8MHz. Since then, and right up until time of printing on Sunday afternoon, power has been severely reduced and we can no longer hear and log the station. We are told by colleagues in the area that they are on air, however, but with a very poor signal indeed. Veronica 104, on the other hand, came on air as usual, at 15:00, and for the first time in weeks, we had little problem listening in on 104.75, due to the fact that Julie was not there, well, at least in this location. We checked for Phoenix AM, on 1296kHz. this morning, but found no audio at all. We did note a carrier, but this may well have been the World Service of the BBC, who use this channel. No other operators have been noted or reported from the area.

MANCHESTER. Just two stations have been heard this weekend so far. They being Laser 10-35 who have been on the air all week with their diet of reggae and soul. Frequency tends to vary between 103.2 and 103.5MHz. They are using various old Laser jingles, which makes a strange mixture in between the reggae records. WBLS (102.4) were noted on Saturday night, but not today, again with the ususal soul etc. music. Not monitored this weekend, but reported to have been on the air at times over the past couple of weeks, are Sunshine Radio on 92.0MHz., and F.A.B. FM (97.0MHz.). Outlook 96.3 was on the air last Sunday evening, but when checked last night for their regular Saturday

slot at 20:00, nothing could be heard.

SHROPSHIRE / WORCESTER. WR Shropshire were on the air last Sunday, and programmes included the first part of the T'Pau concert. The second part should be broadcast on 28th May. This was broadcast on 105.2MHz. A little further down the band on 103.8MHz., another station calling itself WR (Worcester & Gloucester) was on the air with some test transmissions. Two of the presenters heard were from the former Sunshine Radio in Ludlow. No more is known about this operation, although they are expected to be conducting another test broadcast today, using 80 watts. Problems were possibly encountered during the afternoon, as their was just a blank carrier on this frequency. READING. A station called KICK FM (102.4) was heard in this area on 28th March. No more in known about it.





OFFSHORE STATIONS...THE VOICE OF PEACE.

Two reports from the VOP this week.... We learn that Paul Fraser left on April 7th, having completed his contract. This leaves the on-air staff level at six. The ship sailed into Ashdod on 14th April to take on the new FM transmitter. Everything ran quickly and smoothly with everyone working hard under Abie's direction. The ship was in and out within four hours and in appreciation, Abie sent on board a case of beer and a case of coke! The broadcasts resumed before dawn on 15th, but only on AM, the FM appearing on 16th, reportedly with a new and powerful sound (from the new

transmitter?). Parts were also taken on in Ashdod for the repair of the old FM transmitter, so it is not certain which FM transmitter is presently on air. Seaman, Jim Kavanagh left in Ashdod and the station is currently recruiting a replacement. Ian Hudson is due to leave in early May and Steve Richards is waiting to re-join the ship. A date has now been set for a visit to the dry dock and it appears to be 2nd May. On Monday 18th April, at 15:55, the station broadcast the sound track of the movie, 'Forty State Independence' in a live broadcast from 'The Educational TV'. From 16:50 till 18:00, Abie talked with listeners about the movie. On Tuesday evening, 19th, at 19:00, 24 hours of classical music commenced, until 19:00 on 20th, in commemoration of the soldiers who perished in the Israeli wars. As Independence Day began on Wednesday evening, there were some special broadcasts featuring well known artists. Current line-up reads.... 00:00 Michael O'Sullivan, 03:00 Martin Murphy, 06:00 Kenny Page, 09:00 Ian Hudson, 13:00 John McDonald, 14:00 Abie's phone-in, 16:00 John

McDonald, 22:00 Ian Hudson. Our thanks to Vered, Gali and Steve for these reports. RADIO CAROLINE. Things don't look too bright at present, as far as the staffing situation is concerned, and this week brought a real 'International' sound to 558kHz., with English, Irish and Dutch accents. After losing Peter Philips two weeks ago to Kent's Radio Invicta, and struggling through with one deejay short, the presenters at the beginning of the week (Chris Kennedy, James Day, Paul Graham and Richard Lee) must have been getting a little tired of the whole situation. The station left the air at 13:39 on Tuesday (26th) afternoon, and was not heard for the rest of the day. A close-down announcement was not heard by us, but we understand that aerial work was announced, and they would return later. When Radio Caroline did reappear at 05:00 on Wednesday morning (27th), it was with both fresh voices and a change in frequency of the shortwave outlet, back to 6215kHz. Steve Conway did the breakfast show that morning, returning after a short time on shore. Great, we thought, a complete staff change, to give the other lads a rest. In fact, it turned out that the shortage of presenters had got even worse, as Steve not only did the show, he also read the news all day, and did an extra hour, too. At 10:00, we believe there was a new voice, but with almost the same name as one of the jocks from last year, we were a little confused. The new voice identified as Mike Milliams (a D.J. called Mick Williams was on board last year). Mike programmed through until 15:00, at which point the shortage of staff became clear, as two Dutch deejays programmed in the English language, through until 19:00. First off was Erwin van der Blieck, who hosted for two hours, until Ad Roberts sat in with a drive-time show. At 19:00 came the return of John Bibby, who was heard all the way through until closdown at 01:00 the following morning. Thursday and Friday saw the same line - up. The Dutch crew members have been on board for a while, preparing for the return of the 819kHz. service, but although the studios have been finished off, they still await the installing of the 'flexible' tower for 819kHz. The weakness of these type of masts was mentioned in a previous report, and indeed, we hear that a crack did occur in the base of this mast when it was tested out a few weeks ago. Repairs are understood to be required, along with the relevant staying equipment which was deemed un-necessary by the manufacturer. Whether this aerial will ever be suitable for broadcasts from a vessel is doubtful. Calm weather willing, all seems set for a relaunch of Dutch programming in the coming weeks, but from which aerial, remains to be seen. Some suggest that the 'T' aerial might be used for the Dutch service, at the expense of Caroline, which doesn't bring in much money at the moment. Saturday morning (30th), saw the 08:00 news started, but not finished by Steve Conway. In actual fact he was well into it, when he began to falter, and then stopped talking altogether. There was then rustling of paper, followed by footsteps, then some knocking and Steve saying 'Peter, the transmitter's died'. At about 08:07 programmes recommenced. We were actually listening on the shortwave, and it was the 558kHz. which had cut off, and we assume that the newsroom fader must have been left switched on in the main studio. Today (Sunday) saw no extra staff arrive, making it very difficlut fot those on board to attempt a serious full day service. This is, fuelling the rumours which abound, that Radio Caroline, as a station, may well have not long to go. We hope this is not the case however.

A quick mention for the shortwave outlet, which is still getting out very well. Some listeners with certain types of radio, find it impossible to lock on to the exact frequency, suggesting that the carrier is unstable. This is in fact the case, and it is this same problem, which is causing the hum, or growling. When the transmitter was first put into service, this phenomenon was not apparent, and this was because the oscillator was running from a battery at the time, and thus giving a stable voltage level. The 'mains' power supply supply was then introduced, which appears to have a ripple on it, from one source or another. This is giving the fluctuations in the frequency output from the oscillator, and hence the slight 'wobbling' in frequency. Mystery solved at last! Anyway, Saturday was the last day for those outside the AM range to listen to Caroline 558, as from around 06:00 BST, this morning, Sunday 1st May, World Mission Radio took its place. Caroline is not expected to be heard on this outlet, and was only used for test purposes. These religious programmes have been expected for some time, and should give a well needed boost to the resources of the Caroline Organisation. Hopefully, this will mark the start of an uphill climb back to healthy position they were in prior to the mast collapsing.

SHORTWAVE STATIONS. First of all this week, Neal West, compiler of the free radio news on Radio East Coast Commercial, was taken into intensive care last weekend, with stomach problems. We believe he is now out of danger and we send him our best wishes for a speedy recovery and look forward to hearing from him again very soon.

It looks like we have heard the last of Caroline 558 on short wave, as this morning, 1st May, saw the commencement of religious broadcasts on 6215kHz. We first noted it at 06.00gmt., so it possibly commenced at 05:00gmt. The station appears to be called 'World Mission Radio' and on later checking, we heard 'your Dutch evangelist, Johann Maasbach'. The address for WMR was given out... Box 3416, Corona, California 91719, U.S.A.

The two transmissions on 6264kHz, were both audible with no heterodyne whistle noted. Apollo later moved up to 6289kHz, with 'combined broadcasts with Radio 48'.

Our thanks again for all info for this week's report. Once again, we must apologise for continually holding over items. This is unavoidable and we are trying to rectify matters. We have even made the paying adverts smaller this week in an attempt to get more news in!

He is one of two Dutch presenters (the other being Ad Roberts) who has been helping out Radio Caroline during their staff shortage. The show is very well presented in English. Since the shortwave outlet does now not relay 558kHz., we felt that many distant listeners may want us to continue to offer Radio Caroline recordings, hence this one. Losing our contact in New York meant that up to date recordings from the 'Big Apple' have not been forthcoming. However we have a few from last year which it seemed a pity to waste, and so as Tape 199 we feature WHTZ FM ("Z-100") and the well travelled Scott Shannon in action for one his famous "Z-Morning Z00" programmes. This one was recorded in April 1987, but still makes good listening, and is of excellent FM stereo quality. As always, tapes are 90 minutes in length and cost £2.00 each including postage and packing.

RADIO STATION NEWS...IRELAND.

Co. DUBLIN. Things in Dublin seem very static at the moment, following the closure of Energy 103, and all stations seem to be consolidating their positions and programming away to their own loyal audiences. We wonder if any new transmitters will appear, relaying the programmes of the recently started Radio Nova Satellite Station?

Q 102 still seem to be having problems with AM transmissions. The 819kHz. signal has been noted as being very distorted at times, this week. Another regular staff change around seems to have taken place, no doubt due to holidays, the missing man on this occasion being Greg Gaughran. The current line-up presently reads.... 06:00 Scott Williams, 10:00 John Power, 15:00 Gareth O'Callaghan, 19:00 Dave Kelly, 00:00 Al Dunne. Thursday, and Scott and 'The Star in the Sky' changed places, with Mike Hogan feet firmly on the ground, behind the DJ console and Scott flying high. It all makes for good listening. Scott was back on the ground for Friday morning's show.

Someone kindly sent us a recording of Heartbeat FM this week, and we were pleasantly surprised how well it sounded, very laid back of course! Lots of pleasant, easy listening music was noted with David Paul running the show. Adverts seemed a-plenty and apart from a few crackly records, the audio and signal seemed quite good on 95.5MHz. Apparently the station is listened to mostly by the female sector, for some strange reason! It is nice to see these specialist stations continuing to survive with just a small percentage of the audience. Of course as well as the 'Love Songs' of Heartbeat, the rock fan is also catered for amongst Dublin's variety of stations, with Capitol / Nitesky and its FM only service on 95.8MHz., and 93.9MHz.

Co. LOUTH. Following the raid on Boyneside Radio last Spring (15th April), the case finally came to court recently. The four defendents were told before the case that if one of them pleaded guilty, then the other charges would be dropped and they would get all the equipment back. Station owner Eobhain McDonnell pleaded guity, and the result was just a £20 fine, along with costs and expenses. The newspaper article re-printed below tells the story in more detail, and was taken from the 'Independent' of 22nd April 1988. The station got more media coverage last week, in the Newry Reporter of 28th April (see opposite page) who were investigating the unique situation in that border area. Boyneside Radio North came top of a list of stations, including BBC, RTE and ILR, people had uppermost in their minds, when questioned. The latter station is about to move into the Carrickdale Hotel, formerly occupied by Radio Carousel.

The transmitter site remains the same and the station, beaming into the north, can be heard on 1233kHz.AM, 101.3 and 98.4MHz.FM. Zee 103 can be heard regularly, when FM conditions permit, on 103.25MHz. They, too, run a news service on the hour. They can be contacted at Ardaghy House, Ardaghy, Omeath, Co. Louth...Tel. Co. MEATH. Boyneside Radio Navan is understood to be doing much better than expected, and as a result, will be having a power increase during the coming weeks. The current power is 400 watts, and the aerial is an 80 foot pole at the transmitter site in Bohermeen, four miles west of Navan Town. Frequencies for this service ar 1332kHz medium wave and 97.7MHz. Radio Carousel Navan, the only remaining station in the network, continues on 1386kHz and 105.0MHz., with several hours of music and requests during the daytime. Mystery pirate TV plan

Two anonymous Newry businessmen are planning to put Newry on the map by launching the first ever pirate Television station in Ireland.

The scheme is still largely a closely guarded secret but it is believed that large sums of money are involved in the region of 'not quite seven figures,' according to Mr. John Raymond of Imagemakers.

He claims the cost of television has gone down dramatically over the last number of years and the 'gear' would be easily moved if need be.

He said the shift in allegiance from radio to television had been huge and the interested parties were confident of success.

"I believe they will be using it as a testing ground to provide positive proof that they can bid for the next IBA television franchise which is coming up in two years time," said Mr. Raymond.

CO. LIMERICK. On this morning's 'Anorak Show' on Radio West it was announced that Radio Luimni would be closing down at the end of next month. It appears that station owner, and main presenter, John 'The Man' Frawley is selling his house and moving up to Dublin. Radio Luimni is currently the longest running station in Limerick, operating now for many years, and the loss will leave a large hole in the radio market there. With Hits 954 having closed and their transmitters being run from studios in Galway, this means that Sound Channel are the 'biggest' station operating from the city. Some smaller operations are also on the air, and these may grow bigger as the listeners of Limerick have to tune their dials to hear an easy listening station like Radio Luimni. Of course wherever they tune, they will never again find a unique presenter like John 'The Man'. The closure of Radio Luimni will certainly bring to an end a unique part of broadcasting history in Ireland.

Co. WICKLOW. Viking 105 has again not been heard at all this week on its AM outlet of 1602kHz.

Co. MONAGHAN. Last week we mentioned about the news services on KISS FM and KITS FM. We failed to mention however, that Northern Star Radio have had a full news service in operation for the past two months. Bulletins are read on the hour, between 07:00 and 18:00, and they were apparently the only station from Co. Monaghan to have such a service. Northern Star has now fully moved into new studios in Monaghan Town, and is using a link from the studio, to the main 1116kHz. transmitter which is located some 10 miles out of town. Battle of the airwaves waging in N & M

The Newry and Mourne area has a unique situation in Europe as far as broadcasting is concerned, claims Mr. John Raymond of "Imagemakers". In this area there is the closest thing to 'close competition' in Europe without Government regulation, he told the 'Reporter'.

An experienced media expert, Mr. Raymond claims however that provincial newspapers such as the Newry Report have 'solid advertising' making them one of the most popular and steady forms of communication, with radio still very much a 'dark horse.'

Imagemakers, creative consultants in Newry have carried out an extensive survey of the radio environment in this area which they will be publishing in full in the hext few weeks.

"Newry and Dundalk is either lucky or cursed," claims Mr. Raymond. "It is broadcast to by no fewer than 12 radio stations seven of those are commercial stations and at least three of them are pirates.

"This is a situation which simply does not exist anywhere else in Europe, and

The most listened to radio station in this area is unusually not one of the local stations. nor is it a Northern Ireland station. Instead, RTE One squeeks into first place with 16 per cent of overall listeners.

Radio Ulster runs a close second with 15 per cent of the overall listenership, but says Mr. Raymond, much depends on the programme with ratings soaring at certain times of the week, and falling off to almost nothing at others.

"Unlike television, we found that listeners were dedicated to a programme or to listening at a particular time of the day. Their listening duration was normally shorter than with television, but they were intensely loyal to their programme," he said.

"Unfettered by regulations the pirates sometimes show a little daring and advertisements are starting to break out of clusters. The recording studios, as an ancilliary industry building up around radio, is getting more and more inventive."

Two pirates are running almost identical programmes, with local personalities either helping or severely hunting the ratings.

Mr. Raymond predicts in his survey that one station will go by the wayside within the pext nine months.

"Our research shows that if the advertisers want good coverage they will have to advertise on at least two of the stations at the same time. Advertisers are beginning to , divide up, many rationalise that the station they support is better than the others and often this better station is the one that the advocates regularly 'isten to themselves."

"But the sad fact is that the competition will not last much onger." said Mr. Raymond. Radio Rainbow can be considered the favourite radio station of the lower social classes. according to the survey. It is listened to by 56 per cent of the lowest level of the social classes and 26 per cent of semi-skilled manual labourers.

Boyneside is listened to predominately by administrative management sector of society, skilled manual workers and semi-skilled manual workers.

BBC seems to get the most part of the top levels of the social classes right down to the semi-skilled manual workers while RTE attracts the middle sections of society, as does Downtown Radio.

The two most popular listening times for this 25 to 40 age group appear to be the Tommy Sand's "Country Ceili" on Downtown Radio on Saturday evening and Boyneside on Sunday morning.

Radio Ulster is the most commonly listened to by all categories and the lower social classes listen mainly to Irish Radio (67 per cent of the lowest classes and 76 per cent of the second lowest classes) whereas the social categories of a higher level seem to prefer non-Irish programmes.

the station's publicity machine has certainly got into full swing. On the programming side of things, the news service got underway on Monday, with Colm McCondle sounding very confident when we tuned in at 08:00, 09:00 and 10:00. We have yet to check the other 'top of the hours', but feel certain that only a limited service is operational at present. A number of promotions for the Summer are being lined up and include PA's by the on air staff, along with the 'Kissettes'. It all sounds very exciting as the station settles down and consolidates its position. KISS FM, Unit 2, The Mall, Old Cross Square, Monaghan Town, Co. Monaghan...Tel (047) 84028.

According to numerous sources, (including Radio West on this morning's 'Anorak Show'), yet another station seems to be about ready to come on the air during the next few days in the Monaghan area. A name of Star Radio has been mentioned, although not confirmed, and the format is thought to be country music. The man behind this new venture is known to be Gerry Byrne, ex Radios Telstar, Big 'M' and Northern Mid Star. frequencies, possibly 927kHz., should be checked for a new arrival, we believe. A few tests were apparently monitored mid-week.

The cutting (left) comes from the Newry Reporter of Thursday 28th April 1988, and gives an insight into the situation in the border area. The listenership details are quite interesting, especially when even in this area of many strong local signals, Dublin stations Sunshine 101, Energy (now closed) and Q102 are feature in the results.

We are told that Kits can be heard quite well on 837kHz., away from this area, in particular in South West Scotland, but here, they don't seem to receive the 100.9MHz. transmissions at all good. Programming on Kits seems a bit erratic, with no set schedule, but deejays heard include Paul Thomas, John Anthony, Shane Martin, Kenny Davies, Simon Dee (!) and station manager, Brian James. Brian can also be heard on the news which only seems to be heard during the morning. At long last, we seem to have a mailing address (thanks to Ian who heard it announced - they don't seem to plug it much as we listen for hours at times!)... LONDON WEEKEND SURVEY. 29th April - 3rd May 1988.

This week locked into 33 stations, 7 of which were in stereo. New this week are :- WLIB and an Indian station on 95.5MHz. Revived: - Fame and Strong Island.

Missing / Not Heard: - P.R.S., Faze 1, Playback, Starpoint, K-Jazz, Galaxy, Stomp FM, Raiders FM, SW Sound and CD-93.

Faze 1 (90.95) and LWR (92.1 - stereo) both went out Friday. LWR going out just after 9pm, to return in low power, with test tapes, in the early hours of Monday morning with a very bright toppy sound. The signal could almost be compared to TKO (102.4 - stereo), except that it seemd to have been highly compressed and limited almost to the point of distortion. Surprisingly, LWR's man who launched a thousand comebacks, Wayne Turner, was not in evidence for this return. The signal was noted as deteriorating, going South thru' town, and this may indicate a change of transmitting site. Several new jingles and Bill Mitchell 'drop-ins' were noted, one announcing LWR as 'London's Wicked Radio'. They finished up Monday, with a good quality mono signal on 92.35MHz., before switching the stereo back in for Tuesday morning.

Also in the highly compressed league, and sounding it, are Super Fresh (103.3), who are still suffering from distortion problems, possibly because of over compression / limiting. The problem remains even after the main transmitters have been replaced, which suggests a problem in the studio /link chain. It is particularly noticeable when switching over to TKO (102.4 - stereo), who returned Sunday morning, with

the bright quality stereo signal, that we have come to expect from them. Overnight on Bank Holiday Monday / Tuesday, Fresh were claiming to be coming 'live and direct' from their 'Away Day' to Great Yarmouth. It is thought unlikely that they managed to actually set up links across 150 miles of countryside to North London, but the show certainly had atmosphere.

With the Brixton 'power house', Faze 1 (90.95) out, a couple of other outfits were heard to take over the slot, at least for the time being. First heard on Friday night was WLIB (91.0) in the usual soul / funk style. The low level of signal in this noisy area of the band, made it difficult to say if they were on continuously over the weekend, as they were suffering from the side-splash from both Brixton's Passion (90.7) and Southall's SRI (90.85)! They had a stronger signal in North London and are probably the unidentified signal heard last week under somewhat difficult conditions. With SRI out of the way in the early hours, it is easier to establish what is there. And it was at this time that the return of low power Northerners, Soul FM (90.95) were noted early on Sunday. It is not known if they have been on at other times and masked by Faze 1, et al, or if this was an opportunistic move with the slot being open. Soul FM have been on or around this slot for the last year - more off than on. When they had some kind of regularity, they were noted for putting out a series of very fine sixties soul shows.

London Irish Community Radio (LIC-R) (89.6) pixie and country specialists, are maintaining a 'power house' signal, but have still to regain stereo status. Deptford weekend part-time funksters, Groove FM (89.65) were heard in the side splash from LIC-R Saturday evening. Overnight, they enhanced their signal, and they could be heard clearly over most of South East London. LIC-R suffered accordingly

in those areas.

It now appears that Sangam Radio did not make the move to 89.95 from 94.4 (WR 210) as thought. Although not yet having a name, the station in this slot is certainly Arabic. Maybe a comeback for Arab Radio for London, which was on the air between August and October 1987, with one of the most distorted signals ever to disgrace the airwaves of this fair city. The current signal is in the 'power house' league and is in clear stereo. On Saturday, (the Muslim Holy Day), readings from the Koran were heard in English. Further complications set in Bank Holiday Monday, when another Asian station was locked into on 95.50, also playing traditional Indian music. No English ID's were heard. It was a slot near here that LGR were on the receiving end of a lot of aggro from megawatt ILR regional Capital Radio (95.8) last year. LGR suffered a lot of attention until they decamped down to 88.4. GRL/HRFL (96.2) on the other side of Capital, have yet to be the butt of Capital's mega wrath. What is still believed to be Sangam (94.4) is still in the same busy area as before, although the nomadic PRS appear to be on the move again, which clears 94.3. There is still a big stereo signal from Northern reggae-rockers City Radio (94.45 - stereo) that washes right across them. Just a couple of notches up again, on 94.60, and Saturday brought the return of Fame FM, with a transmitter that must have been bought second hand from London Rock. The signal contained various clicks, buzzes and hums, and very little bass, which gradually made some improvement over the weekend. Fame were regulars in 85/86, but were last locked into, briefly in March 1987. Strongly featuring a wide range of jazz, they may well be the original crew who were running Fame before, as a number of the same Bill Mitchell 'drop-ins' and jingles were noted.

Saturday rockers, London Rock (88.80) came out and joined battle with East London funksters Sunrise Radio and the result was probably an advantage to London Rock, who were predominant in most of the North, West and South, whilst

Sunrise were clear down the East (appropriately).

South London Saturday 'Golden Groovers' Hits FM (105.5) made a welcome return for a full day's programming. This sector has been relatively quiet recently, since the attempted muscling in of Classic Radio. Although a stereo carrier was noted on 105.25 Saturday, nothing has been heard from Raiders Pop FM (105.25) or Essex funksters Stomp FM (105.45 - stereo). What was noted in the centre of town was a nasty distorted spurious signal from Lambeth soulsters Rock to Rock (90.25) on 105.35, which will no doubt bring the boys from Waterloo Bridge down on them in a great hurry once the weekend is through.

Returning for a full weekend's listening pleasure, were

Solar 93 (93.0 - stereo), in glorious stereo, with a rock solid signal. Their new neighbours CD-93 (93.2 - stereo) were not in evidence for the Bank Holiday, as had been anticipated. Maybe the transmitter problems noted last week have kept them off.

Tottenham's reggae rockers RJR (90.0) have now been chugging along in second gear for a number of weeks now. Now they finally hit the gas pedal and have burst into full power. Not yet in stereo, but that now cannot be too long.

After a lot of noise coming from the Strong Island camp over the last week or two, they finally made it back sometime over the weekend with a low power signal in the new slot of 96.85MHz. Time Radio associates Girls's FM were previously located in this slot, but haven't been heard since early January. Strong Island were previously located at 92.35, but LWR didn't like competition being that close, and had it away with their tx. After a little persuasion it was handed back. On Bank Holiday Monday, they held a live phone-in for listeners who wanted to know more about Strong Island.

A busy Bank Holiday, with little activity from the men from the ministry. I'm off to meet Batman at the Virgin

Megastore.... More next week.

LONDON UP-DATE. After a quiet week as regards DTI activity, the past seven days seems to have made up for it. Many of the larger stations were vistited in the week, and these included London Irish Community Radio (89.6) who are still not back on this morning, and Solar 93 (93.0) who only returned to the air last weekend, and are once again off the air. Also missing today were KISS FM (94.0), although they had started their regular weekend broadcasts, and were on the air yesterday (7th). Others missing today were Rock to Rock (90.4) and Studio FM (92.7). Many other stations were missing for periods during the week, but have now returned. TKO (102.4) were back on the air today after yet another week of not being heard. Let us hope that this time, they last a bit longer before the DTI make another visit. Starpoint (93.2) were heard on both Saturday and Sunday, and there was no sign of CD-93 at all. Hits FM (105.5) were heard with a strong signal yesterday (7th), playing their usual 'oldies' format. As with last week, they left the air before the end of scheduled broadcasts, but we did not know why. (Last week it was due to a faulty transmitter). Otherwise, things are as normal this week. Just a little out of the area, Stomp FM (105.4) were logged on Friday

night. An unknown foreign language station has been monitored recently on 89.8MHz., and is believed to be in the Turkish language. No more details are known about

this one - can anyone speak the language.

YORKSHIRE, HUMBERSIDE & DERBYSHIRE. Activity wise, things improved a little in Leeds over the past week, especially at the Bank Holiday, with all three 'black' music station being heard at one time or another. Music City Radio (90.3) were heard just on the Monday, but Peoples FM (91.8) have been reported on each evening since, and ABC FM (105.2) were back on for this weekend. Also in the city, it was a welcome return to the air of Radio Radar on Monday, 2nd May. The station transmitted on a frequency of 105.5MHz., as their old channel of 104.5MHz., was a little close to various local radio stations who have cluttered up that end of the band since Radio Radar was last on the air. This was just a one off broadcast, and they are not expected to do any more transmissions in the near future. Many of the old voices were heard throughout the day's programming. A new improved aerial systen was used, and they were heard as far South as Rotherham, with their 25 watt stereo transmitter. Broadcasts were from 10:00 until 22:00, and were live. Thunder Radio (104.8) mentioned a couple of weeks ago, were heard last Sunday evening after 20:00, their now regular time slot. They have apparently been on the air for two months and use a power of 10 watts, which covers their local area quite adequately.

W.L.N.G. (104.9) are now regularly heard on Tuesday and Thursday evenings, following a break a couple of weeks ago. This weeks programmes included, on Tuesday, Ric Sellars with chart music, Mark Crosby with heavy rock and Steve Wilson until closedown at 22:30 with house music. Thursday saw Steve Perry with chart music and new releases, then Tony King and oldies until 21:30 when Stuart Graham programmed with some new local bands and an a.o.r. format. Several adverts continue to be heard, bringing in a few coppers

to cover the cost of each broadcast

Music Weekend Radio (105.0) were heard in South Yorkshire on Saturday evening (30th April) after 23:00. The presenter mentioned that the station would be on the air again in a couple of weeks. On Monday 2nd May at 16:00, Ocean Sound made a test transmission. It was announuced that they would be commencing regular transmissions in three weeks with new transmitters on 106.3MHz., in stereo. The same day, Rebel Radio (105.4) commenced their regular broadcast at 20:00 until 20:30. Last weeks problems were due to some children were messing with the equipment. This week a new location was used, but the signal was understood to be much weaker than it used to be. Finally this week, Village Radio have been on the air every evening up until 30th April, although they are understood to be still splattering quite a lot.

the weekend station are loaning the equipment from Enterprise, and in a deal relaying that station during Solar Rock's off air period. Enterprise were uderstood to be having a few problems with their link transmitters, with on occasions, only a carrier was being transmitted. The Enterprise FM roadshow is at the Porshe Club every Friday night, and the people there have to opportunity to read out requests live on the air.

Powerhouse 105 (105.1) seem to be playing the 'Black Heath Cycling Club' advert every hour on the hour, and are asking potential advertisers to write in for details. The station is on the air most evenings from 16:00 until midnight.

Midland Asian Community Radio have been heard occasionally, and it was probably this which we reported as being heard last week. They were heard testing on 29th April from, 22:15 until 23:00 when the transmitter was switched off. The frequency is 106.0MHz., and the signal is very strong. Other broadcasts were noted on 30th April and 1st May, and appear to be always in the evenings. On the latter occasion, regular programmes were thought to be in progress, as the records were being announced.

Electro Radio (95.0) were on the air with occasional broadcasts over the past week. On 1st May they had an appeal for £10,000 in aid of an operation for a young girl, who requires a heart operation. They said all money should be sent to the Electro Radio address. Electro have also been heard playing the same promotion for Solar Rock FM,

as has been heard on Enterprise.

Radio P.C.R.L. (103.5) are still plugging away with their 7 day schedule. Cecil Morris of P.C.R.L. is involved with a free newspaper called the 'Clarenden News', and this has been heard advertised on Enterprise FM, as well as being available from both Enterprise and P.C.R.L. headquarters. On 1st May, from 20:00 until 21:00, Radio P.C.R.L. had representatives of the Labour Party and the Alliance, in the studio to answer listener's questions. The Conservative candidate was apparently unavailable. Some problems with the microphones were eventually sorted out, and the programme went as planned.

MERSEYSIDE. It was a busy week in this area, but firstly we go back to last Sunday evening, when we heard a station on 105.0MHz. just around midnight. At first we thought it was an overload of the set from the BBC, as choral and organ music was being played. We realised it wasn't, when nothing else was found on the band, playing that type of music. Then, at around 00:05, the station announced as Chester Community Radio on 104.8MHz. Test transmissions were mentioned, and also an address. Unfortunately, by the time we had a pen and paper ready, we were too late to note it down, however after calls from other correspondents

we believe it was: The Chester Community Radio Association, 66 Oldford Road, Upton, Chester. C.C.R. then closed down, without repeating the address, and mentioning that the next broadcast would be on Spring Bank Holiday Sunday, 29th May, from 7pm until midnight. The signal must have been strong, as it was received here in Blackpool, without the aid of an external aerial at all. Craig and Neil in the area also heard CCR, who managed to swamp Radio Julie on 104.85MHz., completely, with their powerhouse signal last Sunday. On the

same day he heard Concept Radio on 104.25MHz., for the first time in ages, he says. They programmed past 02:00 with the well known 'Webb & Lowe' show from 01:00 onwards. Concept Radio were also conducting some tests in the week, on Wednesday night and also on Saturday lunchtime, with a new, but unfortunately unsuccessful aerial system. They are expected on tonight with their regular broadcast, and using the old aerial system. We understand that Liverpool Pirate Radio (LPR) on 1413kHz. were on air this day (1st May), and the same day the previous week. Power is so low though, that even detecting the signal here

is quite a feat.

Bank Holiday Monday (2nd May) brought three stations on the medium wave. Phoenix AM (1296kHz.) made a return, following tests the previous weekend. Unfortunately both signal level, and modulation was lower than on the tests, and this along with interference local to us, meant we couldn't monitor the station properly. Hopefully the problems should be sorted out by their next broadcast. The two regular

Radio chiefs try to track pirates

RADIO investigators have been called in to find a pirate station which has been broadcasting in the Derby area.

Radio Freedom, an illegal station playing chart hits and other popular music, was on the air over the holiday weekend operating next to BBC Radio Derby's 104.5 FM frequency.

The wavelength bandits even announced a list of DJs who they said would be on the air today.

Many listeners trying to tune in to Police passed on the complaint to Radio Derby heard Radio Freedom the Department of Trade and Indus-

because they did not have the scohisticated equipment needed to track down the source of the signal.

because the stations were so close try's international monitoring on the FM band. station which in turn told the Radio Radio Derby bosses complained Investigation Service. It uses high to the police, who said they were tech equipment to pinpoint the powerless to stop the illegal station signal and apprehend the culprits.

Following a successful broadcast in Derby, over both the Bank Holiday period by Radio Freedom (1242kHz and 105MHz.), it didn't take long for bad publicity to arise, as can be seen by the above article from The Derby Evening Telegraph of Monday 2nd May 1988.

NOTTINGHAM. After being missing for a couple of days recently, Heatwave Community Radio (105.1) are now back on the air with a good solid signal once more, and can once again be received over a large area with their black music format and community news. The breakfast show is said to be particularly good.

THE MIDLANDS. Ken, in Rotherham reports regularly hearing two transmission from Birmingham as far North as his location. Enterprise FM has been heard during the week on both 90.9 and 91.9MHz. However in the early hours of Saturday morning, he heard a change to Solar Rock FM on 90.9MHz., whilst Enterprise was still operating normally on 90.9. So it seems as though the announcements on Enterprise two weeks ago were correct. We assume that weekenders, Radio Merseywaves (1242) and Radio Atlantis (1197kHz) were on air as normal, with Atlantis signing off at 19:00. Locally heard also, were.... Radio Julie on 104.85MHz. and CD - FM on 105.0MHz., the latter testing in the late evening, with good music (from CD's possibly?

Radio Merseywaves was logged early on Thursday again, here, although we understand they were testing on Wednesday evening until about 20:30, along with Radio Julie, who signed off their tests at 23:30. RMW continued until well into the night on Thursday (at least they were still airborne as we retired well after midnight). After a spell on low power last weekend, Radio Julie (104.85) are now back to a better signal, and although not quite as strong here in Blackpool as previously, can still be heard well with the aid of an external aerial. The audio quality of the station is also much better than when we last heard heard it, when it was tending to distort somewhat on high levels of music and speech.

Friday saw RMW and Radio Atlantis, both on air, from fairly early. RMW were heard plugging a 'listener's night out' for under 18's, at Birkenhead Pleasuredrome for Monday 23rd May. The price of admission being an unusually cheap and attractive £1. Times are from 7:30pm until 11:00, and each ticket will have the chance to win prizes in a raffle.

All the D.J.'s are expected to be there.

Saturday and Sunday saw both Radio Merseywaves (1242kHz) and Radio Atlantis (1197kHz) on the air on medium wave with strong signals, as well as Radio Julie (104.85) on the FM band. They were joined later by Veronica 104 (104.7MHz.) at 15:00, for their regular transmissions until 22:15. Veronica are now back to this time, after moving around their schedule somethat, and occasionally being heard on a Sunday morning with what we believe to be 'location tests'. Finally, with regard to Radio Merseywaves and the hum that seems to bug their signal from time to time, this weekend we took __ time out to have a good listen to find out exactly when it is occurring. After much earache, we found that on Saturday morning, the signal was great until around 11:20, when the hum started, as though another transmitter had been switched on 1242kHz. We do not know of any other stations except Radio Freedom in Derby who operate on 1242kHz., so can anyone solve the mystery. It is most unfortunate for distant listeners to Radio Merseywaves, and not any fault of the station. Does anyone know of any other operations on 1242kHz, who only open up during the late morning?

MANCHESTER. Outlook 96.3 were noted with their ususal religious programmes on Monday evenings (2nd May). The signal was very strong as it always seems to be when they are monitored here. No other reports have been received from the area, but we believe that Laser 10-35 have been

on throughout the week, on 103.5MHz.

RENFREWSHIRE. Just one station Neon Radio (103.9MHz) has been operating in this area all week. Neon were heard with the following schedule... Tuesday 19:00-23:00... Thursday 20:00-23:00... Saturday 13:00-16:35 / 00:00-03:00 and Sunday 13:00-16:30. There was no sign at all of Northside Community

Radio during the week.

OXFORDSHIRE. A couple of stations have been operating from in or just outside this county. On Bank Holiday Monday, one calling itself Radio Equinox was heard on 105.2MHz., and this appeared to come from the Banbury area, as many mentions were given of the town. Secondly, also around the 105.2/3 area, in stereo, a station called 105.3 FM has been monitored for the past few days. It is possibly from the High Wycombe area of Buckinghamshire. As yet we do not know if the station is just weekend only, or a seven day operation.

OFFSHORE STATIONS.

RADIO CAROLINE. Just before we start this week, many readers may have been under the impression from our writings last week, that the station was finished. This is far from the truth. However, it does appear that if the Dutch station does not get on the air soon, and they will be the ones supplying and bringing money to the keep the ship going, than something similar to the 1970's situation might occur. Then, the English service took a back seat and was left broadcasting just in the evenings, whilst the Dutch service was on the air during the daylight hours. After a time, an all English service did resume using a standby transmitter. The current problem, is that the 819 aerial seems to be faulty or broken, and that only one transmitter can be loaded at any one time into the 'T' aerial being used for 558kHz. We hope that the 819kHz aerial can be repaired and installed

Not a lot to report this week. The station has been off a few times, with what we presume to be generator problems (records slowing down). We left the station very short of presenters last Sunday afternoon, and in fact up to the time od printing, we have not noticed a staff change. They left the air for a time last Sunday afternoon, returning at around 19:15. Bank Holiday Monday, saw the same line - up as the weekend, with Mike Williams on breakfast, Steve Conway in the morning, and the two Dutch jocks, Erwin van der Blieck and Ad Roberts in the afternoon. The Dutch contingent continued to help throughout the week, but being heard earlier in the afternoon. Steve Conway continued with his news duties in addition to programmes.

The shortwave transmitter remained on the air most of the week, but of course, playing the tapes of World Mission Radio. We believe that this service was off yesterday, but this could have been poor conditions. Certainly this morning, the signal was very distorted, suggesting transmitter problems. The actual line - up of programmes is not known,

but they are heard in both English and Dutch.

Back to the Dutch station now, and one can only wonder how much longer they are going to wait to get their station back on air and earning some money again. At least if Caroline were sacrificed for a short period money will be coming in again, together with funds from the religious groups on SW, to enable the station to try and re-coup some of the vast amounts they must have spent in the last six dismal months. It goes without saying that the station, despite once again surviving all odds, has experienced one of the worst periods since the desperate days of the late seventies. In true Caroline style though, she will make it back to normal, thanks to the dedicated team on board and on land and their never tiring leader.

The unidentified on 6277kHz was of Dutch origin, but

due to bad conditions we couldn't tell which station.

The unidentified on 7367kHz was announcing something like R.N.O. or R.M.O. International, however due to it being on top another legal broadcaster, it was difficult to tell.

The 'alternative radio' scene is certainly always undergoing regular change (unlike some of the stale 'state' systems of Europe). After the beginning of a new era, two weeks ago, with the start of commercial satellite radio from Britain, this week, we sadly hear of the end of an era as far as terrestrial English broadcasting to Britain, from France, is concerned. Several stations located on the north coast of France have for a long time, beamed English programmes to the south coast of England and the Channel Islands. Due to new legislation in France, these must revert back to French, and as a result, the International Service of Radio Boulogne Littoral will make its final broadcast tomorrow (Monday 16th May). This will be a sad loss, both for the listener, and for the staff, who have worked hard to build up the service to what it is today. We presume that others (including Radio Force 7) will also finish their English shows around this time

(including Radio Force 7), will also finish their English shows around this time.

Many months ago, we heard about a new film involving offshore radio, which was about to be shot. The plan was to give an idea of the life on and around the station Radio 270, which was anchored off the Yorkshire coast in the 1960's, and we believe was the brainchild of Paul Burnett, who worked on Radio 270. This film is finally to become reality this year, as shooting begins during the first week of August, on the Isle of Man. A substantial amount of money has been put forward by Barry Gibb of The Bee Gee's fame. The film will be called "Rock: The Boat" (similar in title to "Abba: The Film"), and should follow the format of "American Graffiti". Many groups and former offshore deejays will be involved. The producer will by Beryl Vertue, with Ian Sharp directing from a script written by Roy Clark. As well as being based on the Isle of Man, a ship has obviously to be used for the rest of the filming. At one point the Communicator was in the running for this, but this plan was dropped, and so at this present time, the name of the vessel to be used is not known. What is certain, is that something resembling a 'radio ship' will have to be anchored off Douglas in order to fit in with the script. What will happen to it after the shooting has finished, one can only imagine! We look forward to seeing the film on its completion.

The line-up is normally Scott Williams in the studio and Mike Hogan in the helicopter, plus telephone callers, but they do vary this from time to time, sometimes even taking the telephone callers in the helicopter! It appears that the station has employed the well known American radio PD, Bill Cunningham, according to promos and announcements heard on air at the weekend. Bill's voice was immediately noted on subsequent promos promising a completely new programming format called 'Supersound' in the next few days. It is to be hoped that he does not mute this fine station and eliminate such excellent features as 'Star in the Sky'. Some of the

promos infer that Sunshine 101 and its 'Hot Hits' format is 'old hat', and Bill tells everyone that when they hear his voice on Sunshine 101, that it is from an old tape! He goes on to say that 'Supersound' is going to change our listening habits. If he had anything to do with John Power's fine rock programme on Saturday night, then we have certainly something to look forward to!

We spent some considerable time this week, listening to Liberty 104, as this station must now rate as No. 3 in the city. We found good presentation from Derek Flood (who recently left Radio West after a long period there) in the mornings and Dennis Murray in the afternoons, plenty of adverts, many with the voice of Tony Allan, who also is responsible for numerous promos. News on the hour, with headlines on the half hour, was read by Teena Gates in the morning, Mark Grace in the afternoon, with Michael Mahon on news and sport at the weekends. 'Job spots' featured every morning, along with general city information, and of course, plenty of Top 40 music. Signal-wise, and it is difficult for us to tell here, with the three FM's only receivable locally, except during 'lifts', and the AM on 1035kHz., a poor channel by anyone's standard on this side of the water, with many 'locals' resident there (Ayr and Sheffield to name two areas with stations). On top of this, Longford Community Radio was clearly audible underneath the Liberty signal, during quiet spells.

Tracie Evans has now joined Heartbeat FM, from Liberty 104, primarily as sales manager, although she does three programmes per week.

Elsewhere in the city, we understand that a John May has purchased KLAS 98.5 complete, from Hugh Hardy, who is now concentrating on promoting live artists. The whole operation has been moved into the Harcourt Hotel in Harcourt Street, and ex ERI, the Big 'D', Nova, South Coast Radio, etc., Hugh Browne, is in charge. Some American tapes have been noted being aired, and on checking the frequency on Wednesday morning, we noted normal Klas type music being played. Former Hugh Hardy right hand man at Klas, David Baker, has joined the ranks of pirates going legal and can be heard at weekends, on RTE Radio 2.

Down to the southside now and better FM conditions on Wednesday allowed us to receive CAU-FM on 104.3MHz. Announcing 104.2, the station identified as 'the power station' (another one!) and heard being promoted was a three week holiday giveaway, with the usual three records in a row being played. The thirtieth caller would win the holiday and the three records would be played anytime between now and 31st May. We understand the station had some transmission problems on Tuesday.

Radio Sandymount took to the air on 1530kHz.AM and 94.1MHz.FM, locally, for the festival period, lasting from last Thursday for a further two weeks. The station will be heard daily from 09:00 until 18:00 and the usual team are involved, and include Dave Reddy, Bryan Lambert and Al O'Rourke.

Co. MONAGHAN. Despite chronic FM conditions again early in the week, Kiss FM was rock steady into this location. Conditions did improve mid week however. A TDK tape promotion has been aired each morning on the Nick Richards show, with various goodies being offered as prizes for answering some simple questions. The two syndicated shows, Scott Shannon and Gary Owens, aired daytime at the weekends, can be heard overnight (as Nova used to do) in the week. This weekend sees 'Ulster's Sailboard Championships' take place, sponsored by Kiss, at the Antrim Boat Club, on Saturday and Sunday. A good turn-out is expected and everyone will have a chance to see who's who in the Kiss team, as lots of other activities will take place,

Still in Monaghan Town, and on Wednesday, just after lunch, we logged music on 927kHz. at 13:30. This cut off shortly afterwards and on tuning in later, we found country music playing, along with frequent identifications saying.... 'you are listening to Radio Star Country on 927kHz., 324 metres medium wave and 103.2MHz. FM from The Swan Lake Hotel, Monaghan Town, telephone (047) 81179'. Several cliches were regularly used.... 'best in country music', 'this is Radio Star country' and 'the winning team in ??? race'. We tried 103.2MHz., but found that Zee 103 on 103.25MHz., from Co. Louth prevented us receiving anything in that region. The station has been duly noted each day since.

Co. LOUTH. A carrier on 1125kHz. on Tues.10th is proving a mystery. John in Dundalk thinks Radio Carousel may return on 18th May. Of course, it may be Boyneside Radio?

LAND-BASED STATIONS: U.K.

BRISTOL. First off, we missed mentioning a new station operating in this area on 1st May. Calling itself Emergency Radio, it is another 'black music / community' station. Unfortunately this operation has plonked itself right in the middle of the 'police' band on 99.9MHz. We wonder how long this one will last before it has a visit.

Now onto Terry's report for the past two weeks; starting. with the previously mentioned Emergency Radio (99.9) who were first monitored in between utility transmissions on Sunday 1st May. Their signal is said to be very strong, and seems to be spreading a large distance either side of the main carrier. Not only is it rather a strange place to go on the dial, but the station name seems to suggest that they know exactly where they are positioned. The first deejay heard was 'Martin' from 'Mad Hatters & Co.' in London. He was playing some Bill Mitchell jingles saying 'probably the best radio station in the world', 'Emergency - it's funky fresh', and 'it must be said, Emergency leave the rest for dead'. Apparently, even at this early stage, the station does sound a lot better, both presenter and technical wise. Stereo was mentioned but the signal was only in mono. At the end of his show, 'Martin' said that it had been an honour to present the opening show on Emergency, even though it was likely to be his last. He handed over at 14:00 to 'D.J. - C.J.' for an afternoon of reggae, during which a promotional recording asked potential advertisers to get in touch with Emergency. A telephone number of (Bristol) 540163 was given, along with an address of: P.O. Box 52, 37 Stokes Croft, Bristol BS1. Very competetive rates were announced. The station have obviously gained staff from B.A.D. Radio, as one of the presenters announced as B.A.D. during his first link, before correcting himself. B.A.D. Radio (105.2) themselves, were having a few technical problems with a severe hum. They were missing on Friday, and had a late start and early finish on Saturday 30th April. They were heard again on Sunday 1st May, but with very bassy audio.

Radio For The People (Radio F.T.P.) (104.0) were also having a few technical problems, but did manage to put in an appearance on Friday 29th April, and programming started early on Saturday afternoon, 30th April. Most of that afternoon, seemed to be for publicising the night out

to London that evening. Another F.T.P. night out was announced for the 'Moon Club' in Bristol on Bank Holiday Monday (2nd May). The station carried on into Sunday but had few breaks, and had disappeared by 19:00. They were not heard for the rest of the week.

After a busy Bank Holiday, last weekend (7/8th) was an anti-climax, with neither Emergency FM (99.9) nor B.A.D. Radio (105.2) being monitored. Radio F.T.P. (104.0) was on, following the disappearance the week before, but again with severe problems with low audio and a weak signal. They only came on Saturday evening (7th May), and many of the presenters were heard in the studio at the time for this return broadcast. On Sunday (8th) a marathon three hour edition of the 'Senior Citizen Hour' was broadcast. A mailing address was plugged regularly throughout the weekend, it being P.O. Box 548, Bristol BS99 1NX.

Hopefully the other two stations will be back on the air

for our next report.

LONDON WEEKEND SURVEY.

6th - 9th May 1988.

This weekend touched down on 31 stations, 9 in stereo. Revived / New this week are :- S.L.R., P.C.R. and MMR.

Missing / Not Heard: London Rock, P.R.S., S.R.I., Faze 1, Soul FM, Raiders FM, Hits FM, SW Sound, LIC-R, Ice, Studio FM, Sangam and Strong Island.

Busted / Believed Busted: L.G.R., Rock to Rock, Sangam, KISS FM, Solar 93, TKO, WNK, Galaxy, Super Fresh, Time, LIC-R, S.R.I., Faze 1, Studio FM, Strong Island,

Sky FM, and LWR.

After recovering from the wounds sustained in the crowds at the Virgin Megastore in Oxford Street, whilst trying to get a personally autographed copy of the 'Batman' movie from Adam West, the machinations of the DoTI people were of little-consequence to your intrepid reporter, as he bravely twiddled the knobs of radio sets all over London. It was a weekend preceeded, and overshadowed, by the heavy hands of the 'Soul Destroyers' as they stomped around crushing many stations. Some were to return almost immediately (LGR, Solar 93, Fresh, Time, Sky), others, like Rock to Rock, were back in a day or two. Still others were not heard over the weekend at all (Sangam, Faze 1, SRI, Studio FM, Strong Island). LWR (92.35 - stereo) were back in test mode on Friday evening (presumably with their own transmitter), with a variety of test subjects. Among those noted, were relays of WMR, and various other short wave samplings, and the highly detailed (and entertaining) happenings on a mini-cab circuit. Most of those who returned quickly were in reduced power modes, and were subject to slight frequency variations. LGR (88.4) - Rock to Rock (90.4 who went out Saturday, to return yet again with tests Sunday evening), Sky Radio (91.8). Escaping the scythe were Harlesden's JBC (104.3 - stereo) and Brixton's Passion Radio (90.7), both of whom are rumoured to be unofficially sanctioned. Conversely, a massive beefing-up of signal has been noted again from Tottenham's RJR (90.0) and Wembley's Traffic Jam (98.0). Both are now very loud.

With London Irish Community Radio (89.55) out, Deptford's low power weekenders Groove FM (89.65), who are now calling themselves GWR - Groove Weekend Radio, were expected to take advantage of the situation. But it was not until the early hours of Saturday, that a blank carrier

preceeded their two day programming.

Out of towners Playback (93.2) and Stomp FM (105.45) were both believed to be heard on Friday evening, but conditions were such that a positive ID could not be made. Further problems with Playback were had when Starpoint (93.2) switched on the stereo tx for a warm up, for a brief spell just after 5:30am on Saturday morning. Problems were also found at 91.00 when either WLIB or Soul FM was heard at various points over the weekend, but not long enough for a positive ID.

With Raiders Pop FM roaming the dial, chasing PRS in search of the perfect slot, it was not thought surprising to hit an unidentified, non-stop CHR signal on Saturday evening. What was surprising, was that they were running the on-hour news from IRN. They were a little slow in switching out at the close of the news, when it was realised that they had filched it from ILR regional talker LBC (who are running almost as much music as Capital these days). They turned out to be South London Radio (SLR - 103.2), who from what was said, have been on the air at least once before. Fulham micro-poppers SW Sound (105.6 - stereo), who have not been heard since the end of March, were late last year, reported as intending to up power to cover South

London, and rename as SLR. Whether there is any connection between these two ventures is so far unknown. Anyhow, this at last gives an explanation for one of the three dead carriers which have regularly been locked into since Easter. SLR must be descended from the shakey tape loop heard over the Easter weekend, to be followed by dead carriers for a week or two. Last week, a stereo carrier was briefly commented on, and again was locked into on Saturday of this week. On Sunday, it burst into life as People's Choice Radio (105.25 - stereo), covering soul, funk and jazz. From references made, it would seem that at least some of the original crew, who were involved with PCR between November '86 and March '87, are still involved today. That now only leaves the blank carrier on 88.6, which has been hanging around for the last week or two, to be explained.

Lively new pop-rockers Middlesex Music Radio (MMR - 105.5) were heard for the first time on Sunday. They are presumably in West Middlesex, as they were booming in at Croydon, but were only barely audible in Central London.

Rockers London Rock (88.8) and oldies Hits FM (105.5) were both missing on Saturday, probably keeping a low profile as a result of the crazed rampaging of the Government's finest. However, Sunday rockers Rock FM (94.25) were around all day, despite the threat. They are so regular these days, with a good clean signal (despite occasional splashover problems), that they now appear to be part of the 'Privateer Establishment'.

Weekenders Solar 93 (93.0 - stereo) and Starpoint / CD-93 (93.2 - stereo) seem to be co-existing quite amicably, at the moment, in their adjoining slots. Both have good clean stereo signals, and are being transmitted from fairly close to one another without too much splashover or other mutual interference. As both stations are very listenable, it would be a pity if things were to deteriorate.

Look out for next week's stunning 'Bat' episode! LONDON UP-DATE. Most stations appeared to have escaped the wrath of the DTI this week, and only KISS FM (94.0) were noted missing over the weekend. TKO (102.4) were on in the week, but on much reduced power. WLIB were heard with a strong signal, rather than the more usual Faze 1 on the 91.0MHz. slot. CD-93 (93.2) were noted early on Saturday morning, but had disappeared by the afternoon, suggesting the worst. There was not sign of either Hits FM or Raiders Pop FM. Two new stations were monitored in South West London by Terry. Firstly was Border Radio on 104.4MHz. in stereo, who appear to transmit only on a Sunday evening between 7 and 10pm. Secondly, on 89.9MHz., Free Music Radio have also been monitored in this area, again only on a Sunday evening. The Turkish / Arabic station heard for a time on 89.8, has been partially identified as ..?.. Arab London. Can anyone complete the name?

THE SOUTH COAST. The sad news this week, as we mentioned in our leading article, is the end of the English service of Radio Boulogne Littoral. The final show will be broadcast between 20:00 and 22:00 tomorrow evening. We hope to have a few more details next week, when space will permit.

O.T.R. (Old Town Radio) on 106.0MHz., has just started up nightly broadcasts to the Old Town part of Eastbourne with a power of only four watts. The signal however is good over most of the town, and the programmes are understood to be presented 'live'. Only one presenter has been noted so far, calling himself Paul Davis. He used to present shows on A.B.C. Radio (Eastbourne) about twelve months ago. The signal is mono, and the audio is excellent. They use an address of: c/o 128 Kingfisher Drive, Eastbourne, East Sussex BN23 7RT.

YORKSHIRE, HUMBERSIDE & DERBYSHIRE. Starting off in the Eastern part of the area this week. W.L.N.G. (104.95) are understood to have unexpectedly lost the use of their studio premises, and as a result will be off the air for several weeks, until a new location is found. Their final broadcast for a time was made last Tuesday (10th) between 20:30 and 22:30. In Hull, Radio Takoradi (105.0) are expected to be back on the air testing very soon. The station was raided several weeks ago. Apparently the strange name is taken from the name of a port in Ghana! Ken in Rotherham reports hearing an unidentified station from the east of him, on 105.0, playing a tape of 60's and 70's pop music, on both Thursday and Friday evenings. Perhaps these were tests from Takoradi?

Rebel Radio (105.4) were on the air last Monday (9th) with an improved signal, until in some areas they were wiped

out by the appearance of Village Radio (105.2) at 21:45.

In Leeds, just two stations have been monitored this week. Peoples FM (91.8) have been on most evenings, whilst ABC FM (105.2) have been heard on occasions. Finally, just to the South of Leeds, Thunder Radio (104.8) were monitored with their regular Sunday evening broadcasts from 20:00.

NOTTINGHAM. We had confirmation this week, that Heatwave Community Radio (105.0v) were indeed raided by the DTI two weeks ago, and this was the reason for their absence for two days. The station is now back up instrength, but seems to alter in frequency between 104.95 and 105.15MHz. Plenty of community programming is aired on Heatwave, with even Church services being broadcast. They have a phone number of 0860 328628, which, as with many other stations, enables them to receive the calls at the studio.

MERSEYSIDE. Monday morning saw Radio Merseywaves (1242kHz.) on bright and early with a good signal. We listened out for the hum which was commented on in last week's report, but this was not in evidence throughout the day. It suggests that another station is on the air (possibly in Ireland) on 1242kHz., but only at the weekend, and with an off-channel crystal. Radio Atlantis (1197kHz.) opened a little later, and were heard through the afternoon up until sign-off at 18:00. On FM, Radio Julie (104.85) were also on the air on Monday 9th, and so their schedule has now been extended from just Saturday and Sunday which they were operating up until last week. The station has also been announced as RJ 104. The new station, Phoenix AM, last noted on Bank Holiday Monday last, on 1296kHz. has a mailing address.... P.AM (no station names on U.K. operator's mail), 91 Newham Road, Whitchurch Estate, Birkenhead, Merseyside. Nothing further has been heard from this station at the time of going to print, although correspondence from them state that they hope to be back shortly from a new location, the previous one being unsatisfactory. A change to 1026kHz. seems on the cards, also.

A carrier was noted on 1242kHz on Tuesday, presumably a test emanating from Radio Merseywaves. Regular programmes however were not heard by us until Thursday morning. Friday, Saturday and Sunday saw both RMW and Radio Atlantis on air at their usual times, and both with strong signals. The 'hum' on 1242kHz was not apparent this weekend, making listening much more pleasant. The 'country show' was not on the air this lunchtime, which must be the first time for a long while.

There was a return to the air today, on 1350kHz., of North Coast Radio. The signal was very strong, but the modulation was low and a little bassy. The records were much lower than the speech or jingles. This is the first time this transmitter has been used, and the whole day was announced as a test transmission, so there are obviously a few more adjustments to be made before the signal is perfect. An address of 26 Harcourt Avenue, Wallasey, Wirral L44 6LJ, was given out, and the 'new look' N.C.R. seems to be going to get itself involved in the community, as they are asking people to sent in details of local events etc., which will then be publicised over the air. Mark Wright, who left RMW a couple of weeks ago, was heard this afternoon. A call from the station yesterday informed us that they are the same staff as the pre-Christmas N.C.R., without those who are now on Radio Julie (104.85). Radio Julie were on the air with a nice clean strong signal with their weekend schedule, as well as on Wednesday and Thursday night. The signal is still not quite as strong as several weeks ago, and requires an external antenna to listen here in Blackpool.

MANCHESTER / CHESHIRE. After not being heard on Saturday last, Outlook 96.3 (96.35MHz.) was back on last Sunday evening with a good signal at 20:00. The usual religious programmes were monitored. Only two other stations have been monitored this week. Laser 10/35 has been on the air most days but on a frequency varying around 103.4MHz. Most evenings and the weekend WBLS can be heard on 102.4MHz. Both these stations play soul and reggae, with some community information.

RENFREWSHIRE. After being missing for a week, Northside Community Radio (103.25) were back on last Sunday evening for four hours, and again on Wednesday evening. Neon Radio (103.9) were heard Tuesday and Thursday nights, and again on Saturday afternoon. It is not known if they finshed this particular broadcast, as they did not turn up for the midnight transmission for Sunday afternoon's regular few hours. We hope to know by next week, whether they were 'visited'.

OFFSHORE RADIO: THE VOICE OF PEACE. There is very little to report about happenings on the Peace Ship over the past few weeks. On Monday 25th April, Michael O'Sullivan went on his regular shore leave, with Steve Cromby returning to make a full crew. Friday, 29th April was owner Abie Nathan's 61st birthday. Kenny Page played a 'happy birthday' record without mentioning his name, as apparently, according to Abie, any mention of his name 'causes problems'. We presume this means his links with the 'offshore' operation are frowned upon by those in the upper classes of Isreali society. The Eurovision Song Contest was broadcast live via the station on Saturday 30th April from 22:00 until 01:00. This was to be the last full day of programmes for a week, as the following afternoon (1st May) at 17:00, the ship sailed into Haifa for its regular 'check-up'. It was due back out on Friday 6th May, but a few problems were encountered with the prop shaft, and at the time of writing, it was due back out to sea on Sunday 8th May. A new presenter Richard West joined the ship in Haifa, along with Steve Richards who returns from shore leave. The aerial array for the FM transmissions was also repaired and rigged up whilst in port, and that, along with the installation of the new FM transmitter by the manufacturers staff in Haifa, should see the FM service back on the air now on 100MHz. with a very good signal indeed. Only the medium wave had been in operation for several weeks, on 1539kHz. Ian Hudson left the station at this time, and is now back in the U.K. His last show was on 1st May. The line-up at the time of sailing into port was... 00:00 Martin Murphy... 03:00 Steve Cromby... 06:00 Kenny Page... 09:00 Ian Hudson (final show)... 12:00 Martin Murphy... 13:00 John MacDonald... 16:00 Kenny Page... 17:00 Closedown after Abie's speech.

RADIO CAROLINE. The week started off with still no change in the line-up of... 05:00 Steve Conway... 09:00 Mike Williams... 13:00 Erwin van der Blieck... 17:00 Ad Roberts... 19:00 Mike Williams... 21:00 John Bibby... 01:00 Closedown. On Tuesday evening, we were listening and noted Mike Williams handing over to John Bibby at 21:00 saying he would be back on Wednesday with the same two shows. We were able to listen for a further short time past 21:00 until the foreigner swamped the signal completely. We are now approaching best ground wave conditions time and the 558 signal on this power is reaching about as far as it will reach, without an increase in power. A correspondent asked why they did not put out 50kw on 558. This is simple to answer.... the aerial, as it is, is just not good enough to handle great power on this rather low frequency and at present, only about 3 kilowatts is being put out, and this with rather poorer than normal audio, due to the above problem. A bigger better aerial is the answer, but in a regularly hostile sea, with 'hostile' countries (well, the Governments are hostile!) all around, this is not the easiest of things to do. The 819kHz. signal would fare slightly better, however, on this aerial system, but as we said previously, only one transmitter at once can be loaded into the 'T'.

We finally saw on Thursday additional staff arrive on board, and the return of Keith Francis who proceeded to do the breakfast show from 05:00 until 09:00. He was followed by Mike Williams, who, incidentally, is in no way connected with Mick Williams of some time ago. At 13:00, it was Erwin van der Blieck, with Steve Masters returning to the ship, and hosting from 17:00 until 21:00. Ad Roberts moved further down the lineup until 21:00, but still only programmed for two hours. He was followed by John Bibby from 23:00 until closedown.

The line-up has remained like this since.... 05:00 Keith Francis... 09:00 Mike Williams... 13:00 Erwin van der Blieck... 17:00 Steve Masters... 21:00 Ad Roberts... 23:00 John Bibby... 01:00 Close. 24 hour operation has been mentioned, and indeed the station went through the night on Friday, with John Bibby extending his two hours, to six. Steve Conway has been heard on all bulletins up until Saturday at 13:00, when Keith Francis sat in.

Some listeners have commented that since Thursday (when the new staff arrived), Radio Caroline has sounded much fresher, and the sound of the station in general has changed. Firstly, the music seems to have altered somewhat. Then, with Steve Conway having a little more time, extra bulletins on the half hour have been added at 'drive time' until 18:30. The Lotto adverts are also thought to be being played more, and one of the old long ones has been re-introduced.

World Mission Radio who use the shortwave transmitter on 6215kHz., suffered last Sunday with a distorted signal.

We were unable to receive them on Monday (9th) and assume that work was being carried out on the transmitter, as it was back to normal on Tuesday morning (10th). One interesting note, is that HCJB - The Voice of the Andes, can now be heard in the early morning on 6230kHz. We wonder whether this is due to Caroline causing them interference when they spent a couple of weeks on 6205kHz., HCJB's former frequency. Tuning to 6215kHz. just before midnight on Tuesday night, we were surprised to hear a first class signal here, with superb audio and no fading at all. This continued for all the period we listened, over an hour, during which time, some rather pleasant music was featured, along with various multi-lingual promos for WMR. On awaking Wednesday, a strong signal was still evident, although programming was in Dutch by your Dutch ... evangelist' to quote the exact words, although Johann Maasbach was not heard. In his place a female voice was noted (Mrs Maasbach?), who ended with some announcements in English stating that the Dutch programmes could be heard each morning at the same time (05:00 till 07:00?) and later on Sunday mornings, in addition to programmes in the early evening.

As far as we can ascertain, there have been no breaks in transmission due to generator problems since 7th May, so presumably the problems of the previous week have been sorted out.

There are several additions to last weeks log, due to both poor reception here, and callers not being able to reach us, and so we will list them as a normal log to give it better clarity. TAPE OFFERS. Due to several anniversaries occuring this week, we have decided to shelve the current tapes for once, and go back in the archives for all three recordings. First off, it is the turn of Nova from 1983, the great raids..... The station was first silenced on 18th May, mid morning, but returned the following day, naturally with reduced power, only for Tom Hardy to announce just after lunch that they would close officially at 18:00 on the following day, Friday 20th May. Tape SP8 features the final hour of Radio Nova, off FM, and includes so many well known voices, including that of Robbie Dale (whose Sunshine Radio had been raided on the Thursday). Needless to say the station returned, despite the wonderful closedown, the following day, Saturday 21st May and remained with us for a number of years. (Additionally, a C.90 documentary tape entitled The Great Irish Radio Experiment - The End?' covers this exciting period and is available from ourselves at a cost of £5.00). The following year, 1984, saw Nova open a new station, using the mighty 50 KW transmitter which in itself had been responsible for the raids the year earlier. Called EXIDY, the station, on 738kHz., lasted just short of five hours on the morning of 23rd May 1984, with Tony Allan playing some wonderful tracks and ID - ing the station live. Problems with bleedover into Nova caused the plan to be aborted. This is Tape SP9. Strangely enough, the next day, 24th May, saw the official start of another radio station, Laser 558 'All Europe Radio'. The opening and other snippets from the first day are included on this recording of Rick Harris, made one year later, on 24th May

1985, from 05:00 - 06:30, when the station celebrated its first birthday. This tape is SP10. All tapes cost £2.00, the former is a C.60 (off FM), and the latter two, C.90's. (both off AM).

GENERAL. Apologies for many late arriving WR's recently, particularly abroad, the latter was obviously as a result of the ferry strike. At home there is no excuse and we think the post office have a cheek suggesting a new 'super' service, whereby they would guarantee next day delivery of mail (for extra money, of course!). After all, what is first class for?

More apologies for the continued holding over of items to the following week. We keep getting more and more news and are attempting to solve the problem. The Nova S.L. operation is one being neglected and we fully intend to up-date everyone about what's going on there, this week.

We were pleased to see some "Sporadic 'E' " appear last Sunday evening (15th May), with an FM dial full of Europeans. We were far too busy to DX here, as we were busy assembling a rather large satellite dish, in order to report first hand in the WR, on that side of things. Harri Kujala in Finland says he heard some British stations via 'Aurora Reflection', on Friday 6th May, and positively identified Radio Viking on 96.9, and BBC Radio Norfolk on 104.4MHz., plus others which remained unidentified. He heard no Irish stations, however, but says he will report on 'Sporadic 'E' ' logs, expected any day. RADIO STATION NEWS...IRELAND.

Co. DUBLIN. As expected, we were bombarded with Bill Cunningham promos about the forthcoming 'Supersounds', on Q 102, in the early part of the week. It appeared that the emphasis could be on the presenter this time. Could personality radio be on its way back, we asked ourselves? Anyway, super-personality Jason Maine appeared shortly after we heard this one, but we think that it was more likely to be due to holidaying staff than the new schedule. On Tuesday, the latest promo, voiced by Scott Williams, promised the new Supersounds format 'within hours'. Subsequent live VO'd promos told us the same thing. On Wednesday, at 12:30, following the ad. breaks, a well spoken female Dublin voice started counting, 1,2, 3 etc., nice and slowly and clearly. When she reached 10, we were surprised when she went on, as we were, at 102, 1,000 and even 5,000! Of course, by this time, it was 17:00 and she was definitely 'flagging', although had taken numerous breaks, for refreshment, from time to time. She was joined by Mike Hogan, station manager, at this time, and they both proceeded to count to 5,500, whereupon, it ceased, and a voice counted down 10, 9, etc... 'welcome to Supersounds Q 102'. Normal programmes seemed thereafter, to resume. Yes, it was pretty boring, in fact as boring as when the same person was in charge at Sunshine 101, only that time, they played,

the same record, over and over again for hours on end, before introducing their new format. We wonder how many switched off. We did, but kept going back to check! What did other listeners think? At least they did break up the monotony with a few ad. breaks and a little merriment when the 'countess' (!) faultered. On Thursday morning, we were awoken with the voice of 'missing' Gareth O'Callaghan on the early show, in place of Scott Williams, a show he has seemingly held forever. Plenty of 'Supersounds' voiced promos continued, welcoming listeners to this new era. The regular identification seems to be 'Super Q, 102 FM'. Irregular news headlines were noted, at odd times, and the voice of Martin Block was heard here. The normal 'Star in the Sky' feature took place, with Dave Kelly in the air. At 10:00, Scott Williams was eventually noted, but saying rather little compared with recently, the breaks being filled with monotonous 'Supersounds' promos.

Now, all jingles seem to have gone, along with the Tony Allan on-hour ID's, which were excellent, and their place has been taken with mostly Bill Cunningham voice-overs. The line-up appears to be 06:00 Gareth O'Callaghan (the morning crew)... 10:00 Scott Williams... 14:00 Greg Gaughran.... 19:00 Dave Kelly... 00:00 Al Dunne.

We've hardly listened to any other stations this week, but we guess that was Q's idea, maybe it does work after all! Congratulations go out to Gareth O'Callaghan, who takes the plunge, and gets married this weekend. His place on the early show will be taken by, that's right, Scott Williams.

Jimmy Smith, owner of Treble T.R. Radio in Dublin, no doubt still upset at the loss of all his equipment in a recent raid on his London based operation, London Irish Community Radio, has introduced something completely new to Dublin city. The programme called 'Night-shades' is aired at midnight each night, and runs for one hour, and features 'contempory jazz and new age music'. Apparently, this is all the rage on the west coast of America. The show is hosted by Bob Gallico, although little chat is evident, we are told. In view of the fact that signals at this time of night are very poor, we have been promised a studio recording and we are tempted to offer this unique show as a future 'tape offer'.

Co. MONAGHAN. And once again, it is a pleasure to be able to sit and listen to such a good signal and hear a fresh sounding KISS FM, 'Ulster's newest music leader', on 103.7MHz. Of particular note is Nick Richards' morning oldies hour, from 09:00, with some very nice classic tunes heard. This programme is a must for all 'ageing hippies!' Edwin in Hampshire tells us that Kiss on 1008kHz. is almost like a local, around 23:00 daily, after the Dutch service has closed down.

LAND-BASED STATIONS...(U.K.).

BRISTOL. Radio For The People (Radio F.T.P.)(103.6 mono) are still the only weekeday representative of free radio on FM in Bristol and were transmitting every night except Thursday, from 9th - 13th May. The audio is now much better, although there have been a few breakthroughs from what sounded like aircraft transmissions. No transmissions were noted on Thursday, but Radio F.T.P. returned on Friday with a much stronger signal, programming through until the regular closedown just after midnight. Saturday saw the station on the air at 15:00, with the return of the 'Children's Hour'. This particular show features a much wider variety of music than is normally played on the station. Closedown was at modnight. Sunday (15th May) and Radio F.T.P. opened at 17:50, following which references were made to the previous night's party which was to raise money for the continuation of the station (Radio F.T.P. do not take advertising). Support was also asked from the listeners, BS99 1NX.

Sunday afternoon (15th), saw Emergency Radio (99.9 - mono) return to the air for the first time since their opening broadcast on 1st May. The transmission was marred by technical problems, and at 17:00, the deejay announced that they did not know what was wrong. By 20:00 'cutting out' problems had reached such a height that they were forced off the air for about 45 minutes. They then returned without the problems, and with a very clean and high quality signal, and programmed into the night.

There was no sign of B.A.D. Radio (105.2) last weekend.

NEWCASTLE-UPON-TYNE. This is one area where free radio activity has been virtually non-existant recently. However, perhaps this is all to change, as a station calling itself N.B.C. (Newcastle Broadcasting Company) was heard late last Friday night (20th May), and into early Saturday morning, on 102.2MHz. The format of the station appeared to be soul and disco, and the signal west of the city was weak. The station was advertised in a club, so presumably some of the deejays from this club operate the station.

LONDON WEEKEND SURVEY.

13th May till 17th May 1988.

FY1 4RE.

"If all the current operations had been on air this weekend, the FM band could have boasted 42 Privateers! Despite virtually non-stop frantic action from the DoTI men, the only no-shows from the regulars over the weekend were LICR, Faze 1, Kiss FM, PRS, Sangam and Hits FM. This dropped the total locked into from 42 to 36, of which 10 were in stereo.

The early part of Saturday evening found me forced into abandoning my car and the mobile band-scan as I got caught up in the chaotic traffic jams surrounding the Wimbledon Football Stadium. After a quick bop in the street, and a swift half, I managed to tear myself away from the lightly clad attractions who were there to waylay the unwary traveller. Duty must come first and it turned into another interesting Saturday night, despite the DoTI men having had a busy week and weekend overtime.

The foreign language stations had been hard hit during the week and on Friday, only LGR (88.35) and the Arab (89.80 st.) were to be heard. The Arab got hit on Sunday, but returned in the early hours of Tuesday. On Saturday, Swinging Radio India (90.80 - Sina Radio Int.) were finally back, as were GCR (104.45) and GCR/HRFL 96.15), although GCR went out again on Sunday. Brittania Radio, the previously unidentified Asian, was also back, but down slightly to 93.35. Brittania are now known to be on air from 10:00 until 22:00, with Asian music played live from the studio. What is believed to be Sangam (94.30) has not been heard for several weeks now. On Sunday, with Studio FM (92.70) down, it was possible to hear, mixed in with BBC R.4, an unidentified low power Asian station in the next slot on 92.75.

The DoTI men didn't give the Weekenders much time this weekend. Kiss FM (93.95) didn't make it at all, presumably as they lost two transmitters the previous weekend. Solar 93 (93.20), also hit last week, were back Friday, but only lasted until Saturday morning. CD - 93

Pirate station fights for survival

A PIRATE radio station is fighting to stay on air after being hit by four government raids in one week.

Southall's Sina radio has now launched a desperate appeal to listeners to send in money to replace seized transmitters.

In two days, the fund has raised more than £2,000 and station owner Mr Avtar Litt is consident he can keep the show on the air.

Mr Litt said: "We've had a great response to the appeal and we look to be in the clear as far as money is concerned. The people have shown we are not a pirate station — we are a valid community station."

Sina has more than 15,000 listeners aised and broadcasts Asian music and owner news seven days a week. The Department of Trade and Industry has raided the Southall studios more

than 20 times since it started four years ago.

But four raids in as many days nearly forced it to close until the urgent appeal on air whipped up community support.

Under new government plans to throw open the doors for radio licensing, Sina radio could apply to become legal when the bill in finally passed.

(93.20) didn't get much past their early Saturday morning setting up tests, which consisted of back to back music. It would be ironic if CD - 93, a channel dedicated to high quality broadcasting, are putting out tapes - albeit of high quality. Later Saturday, and northern soulsters, Studio FM (92.70) were also lost.

Sunday, and the list of those missing in action continued to grow, as TKO (102.45) were taken out, to return within a few hours, a couple of notches down on 102.25, in stereo. Deptford's Groove Weekend Radio (89.65) and the Arab (89.90), whose massive signal spreads from 89.50 to 89.95, were both lost. Northerners, City Radio (94.45 st.) went out after moving up to 94.6 and sitting on top of weekend deep southerners, Fame FM (94.6), in what was believed to be a pre-emptive move away from powerhouse Sunday all day rockers, Rock FM (94.25), who managed a full day. WNK (102.85) may have also been taken out Sunday, but they do tend to be a bit irregular. Surprisingly, neither popular DTI targets, RtR (90.35) or LWR (92.25 - noisy and toppy stereo with a spurious signal on 105.25) were touched.

Despite the activity, weekend Easterners, Sunrise (88.80) managed a full weekend and were joined by Saturday rockers, London Rock (88.80). Other short duration stations clocked, were weekend powerhouse soulsters, PCR (105.25), with a solid two days of funk, soul and jazz. Starpoint (93.25) came out to play all day Sunday with a Heinekin signal reaching parts of the south east that the others cannot.

Watford weekenders, Playback FM (93.15) were heard briefly Friday night, before the combined powerhouse transmitters of Solar 93, CD - 93 and Starpoint obliterated them. Popular Essex weekenders, Stomp FM (105.45) were only hearc on Sunday, but with a much enhanced signal, putting them well up in the powerhouse league. For the first time, their stereo signal was getting not only into the West End, but well out into the southern Home Counties, and was clearly heard in stereo at the top of Reigate Hill.

Of the other 7 - dayers, Tottenham's RJR (90.00) are still powered up. In Harlesden, Fresh FM (103.35) have still got a nasty loud mains hum, but Time Radio (103.80) are now getting a reasonable signal out again. Near neighbour, Traffic Jam (97.95) have a loud spreading signal, which must bring them some official attention soon, and in fact, they got there's on Monday. In the south, Brixton's Passion (90.70) continue unabated, as do Peckham's Sky Radio (91.85).

The hoary old matter of subliminal messages on rock records was raised on Sunday night in a programme devoted to religious affairs, on Harlesden's semi-legit JBC (104.30 st.). All the well worn cliches were dug out and paraded, including 'Smoke Marijuana', attributed to a Led Zeppelin track which can only be heard if played backwards!, 'God is dead' and 'The Devil returns', both attributed to Black Sabbath. Many more were related, along with a general condemnation of rock music being the 'devil's instrument'. On the other hand, Calypso, Soca, Soul and Reggae embodied all that was good. It must be said that the interviewer sounded somewhat hesitant and credulous of his questioner, while the man of religion sounded as though he was trying to control the stridancy of his voice. It is still amazing in this day and age that there are still naive people about, who are asinine enough to believe and promulgate this rubbish. 500 merits points to JBC who continue to put out many community orientated talk shows, with regular phone-ins on many diverse subjects, on both local and national issues. But 2,000,000

de-merit points for actually putting out views of a potentially racially devisive nature.

Clutter free South London Radio (103.20) are clear and solid from the deep south, but suffer from the side-splash of Fresh FM on 103.35), the closer one gets to the Thames. They also claimed to be simulcasting on 258m (11:00 am), but it was either off or on extremely low power, as nothing could be heard in this slot. Main programming seems to be extended back to back segues from the poppier end of the dance/funk spectrum. IRN are still contributing their top of hour news, for no charge.

It seems as though it was premature in ascribing the roots of SLR to the battered tape loop and subsequent blank carrier heard in the south around Easter, as Saturday saw 103.05 burst back into life with a much stronger signal, clean cassette deck and a new tape loop of Top 40 materialand a name. The station ID may cause some confusion as they are calling themselves Hits FM. At this stage, it is not known if there is any connection between this Hits FM and Saturday golden groovers, Hits FM (105.5). The format is about as tight as any format can be. No jocks, no talk, no climbers, no oldies, no newies, just the Top 40 recycled non-stop, every two hours, twenty four hours per day. Between every other track are short ads. for two of BT's special 'phone services. Presumably, these are just teasers to show how ads. would be placed, and sound. This is an interesting concept, with Top 40 radio stripped down to the absolute barest of essentials. Will they continue to use the name, Hits FM? Are theya re-incarnation of the Saturday golden groovers? How will we distinguish between the two if the latter return? Will this concept work? With SLR off, the signal is getting out, right across the south at least.

A tape loop has also been running on 96.95 in stereo, at least to begin with. No ID's as such, but an ad. for a Soca All-Dayer at the ubiquitous Tudor Rose Ballroom was heard at regular intervals. This slot has been used by Time Radio associates, Girls FM, off and on for the past year, and may be them tyesting for a comeback. To complicate matters further, Strong Island (96.95) also made an appearance on Sunday. Both must have been on the same frequency, as no mutual interference was noticed.

Finally, the low power soulsters on 90.95 have now been definitely ID'ed as East London's WLIB."

Our usual thanks to Sid for his latest offering. We might just add that of late, we have had a number of letters praising his excellent weekly articles.

MERSEYSIDE. First off here, some rather late news regarding Steven Bishop, formerly of Radio Atlantis (1197kHz.). He was recently in Huyton Magistrates Court following a raid on the station last year. The delay was apparently due to the DTI not being able to serve the summons as they couldn't find Steve for a long time. They did in the end, and he was fined £75 on two charges and had to pay costs. The total was £390. Steve has now left Radio Atlantis due to some disagreements over the direction the station was taking. We believe that most of the equipment was returned, including the records. Rick Dane is understood to be due in court on 9th June for similar charges.

As we went to print early last Sunday, we weren't able to report on Veronica 104 (104.7), however, they did begin broadcasts as usual at 15:00, until 22:10, with a slightly stronger signal than usual. This might have been due to unusually good FM conditions however, as on occasions some European stations were breaking through also. Veronica's

'Famous' listener's Top 104 is due in a couple of weeks, in time to celebrate their third birthday. They will broadcast all weekend and, if past birthdays are anything to go by, it will be well worth listening to. Advertisers were also requested to contact the station. Also last Sunday, we listened in a bit later in the afternoon, and found that the low modulation problems on North Coast Radio (1350kHz.) had been sorted out. The signal was also up in strength, and was in fact the strongest 'alternative' AM station from Merseyside to be heard in Blackpool that day. Mention of all the other local broadcasters was made at one stage, even for Phoenix AM, of whom we have not heard since the May Day holiday. Radio Merseywaves owner, Burt Williams, was also noted, although not listened to, to any extent, due to our involvement away from the radio.

On Monday, we noted the the regulars, Radio Atlantis on 1197kHz., Radio Merseywaves on 1242kHz. and Radio Julie on 104.85MHz., the latter two broadcasting until the early hours. With Steven Bishop now left, Rick Dane was once again, running Radio Atlantis alone, something he has managed on many occasions before (remember Radio Jackie

North?).

Radio Julie appeared at 18:00 on Tuesday, we are told, and again, ran into the small hours. This station also, was asking for advertisers, offering to undercut anyone, including local papers. It looks like competitive commercial radio is about to hit Merseyside!

In the temporary absence of our FM receiving apparatus, we are dependent on reports from Merseyside for FM logs. One such report tells us that Julie appeared again on Wednesday at 17:00, with Mark Kennedy opening up. So many phone-ins are featured, it is a wonder any time is left for music, our reporter, Craig, says. He also tells us the station identify as Radio Julie, RJ104, JFM, J104, Julie FM, Julie 104 and others.

Non stop music was heard early Thursday morning on 1242kHz., but this ceased shortly after we tuned in, and a blank carrier only was noted for the remainder of the morning and into the afternoon. 'Live' programmes from RMW commenced at around 13:00, and mention was made of DTI activity, although this was not clarified further. The station seemed to be having a little trouble with the audio, but perhaps this was due to a move of location. Everything seemed as normal later on in the evening, and again, extensive plugs were noted for the forthcoming RMW Night Out. Radio Julie once again appeared in the evening.

Friday saw a repeat of Monday, with the two stations noted there. We were unable to log any FM stations, but

were assured that Radio Julie was active.

Saturday saw Radio Merseywaves (1242kHz.) back to its usual quality. There were obviously problems, as a 'thank you' was heard given out in the morning to Burt, who had been working hard to get the station sounding well for the weekend. A reduction to a four day weekend was also announced for next week. For the past few weeks, Thursdays have also been in the schedule. A different mailing address has been heard announced... 126 Curlew Way, Moreton, Wirral, Merseyside L46. Also on air this day, Radio Atlantis and Radio Julie.

Sunday saw North Coast Radio appear with an excellent signal on 1350kHz., this was in addition to the three heard on Saturday. These were expected to be joined by Veronica 104 later in the afternoon.

Finally, reporter Neil tells us that last Sunday evening, he heard Concept Radio on 104.3MHz. and on Wednesday, he heard an unidentified station on 105.5MHz., relaying Radio City, also Slag-Off International, on 105.3MHz. The

latter was also active last night.

YORKSHIRE, HUMBERSIDE & DERBYSHIRE. In South Yorkshire, there was no sign of the regular Rebel Radio (105.4) last Monday night, however they were heard with continuous music on Thursday night (19th). Scooter Jones is understood to be testing a new aerial system out, as recent transmissions have not been heard too well. Ocean Sound (106.3) were conducting test transmissions last Saturday night (14th).

Music City Radio (90.3) and ABC FM (105.2) have both been heard in the past couple of days with the usual soul and reggae music. Peoples FM (91.8) appear to have possibly moved location, as some reports indicate a better signal, and others haven't heard the station for over a week. However they were on the air at least up until yesterday.

W.L.N.G. (104.95) are still off the air temporarily due

to loss of studio location. They hope to be back on as soon as possible.

NOTTINGHAM. HEATWAVE COMMUNITY RADIO (105.1) are still operating every day, although with a few technical problems this week. Their signal is solid, and the adverts are still rolling in. One which stands out is rather funny, and is for the 'peoples bakery'. This one has a Dallas flavour to it.

RADIO BOULOGNE LITTORAL. As mentioned last week, R.B.L. International made its final broadcast on Monday 16th May 1988, on 91.6MHz. The final broadcast went out between 19:00 and 21:30, with a line-up of 19:00 Mark Daniels & Pete Simester... 19:45 Tim Stewart... 20:30 Mark Allen & Martin Standen with the 'Final Hour'... 21:20 Closedown. The last hour was understood to have brought the 'anorak' out in everyone! We hope to have a recording available next week of this final broadcast. Confusion has arisen over the actual wording of the recently introduced French Radio legislation, and this could mean that the English voices of R.B.L. may well be heard back on the air, although on a different station.

SATELLITE LINK BROADCASTING....RADIO NOVA INT.



Do we report on this mode, as it is not pirate, or free radio? What do you think? It is certainly radio of the future, of that there is no doubt. As of 19:00 on Friday 20th May, we find ourselves in a position to report live on satellite action, as a result of the installation of the necessary equipment. Of course, we intend to initially report on just Nova, but later, may well expand our reports to other operators, of which there are quite a number, although Nova, at present, is the only U.K. one.

How does it work.... It takes only a split second for Radio Nova's programmes to travel thousands and thousands of miles from studio to receiver. The transmissions are microlinked from the studios in Surrey, England, to the Telecom Tower in London's West End. From there, they are beamed directly to Docklands, British Telecom's Teleport, where the signal is uplinked to the satellite, Intelsat VA F11, in geo-stationary orbit 26,000 miles above the earth. The satellite re-broadcasts Nova (and the others) back to earth. At this point satellite dish owners can tune in. The station can be found on Transponder 63 of the West Spot beam of Intelsat VA F11, using sub-carriers 7.38 and 7.56MHz. The down-link frequency is 11.175GHz. (horizontally polarized). Alternative ways of tuning in.... being lucky enough to be on the cable system. Being in the listening area of a radio station taking Nova for all or part of the day and re-broadcasting it on FM locally. It is thought that many Irish stations may invest in a satellite dish and relay Nova, inserting their own adverts in opt-out advert spaces, and leaving Nova's national adverts in. But, of course, all this is in the future, we are only just at the beginning.

The station commenced at the end of April, properly on 1st May, and with an official opening by the Minister of Broadcasting, Timothy Renton M.P., on 4th May. Many top names from the radio world have been hired and we shall be listening out for them. At 19:00 on Friday last, station owner, Chris Cary, was the first voice we heard, and he was followed a while later by Paul McKenna, ex Caroline, Chiltern and now Capital. Programming was brisk, fast, and completely computerised we were told. News was hourly, via IRN and adverts were noted, along with jingles, including many classic old ones. They gave out a mailing address of Radio Nova Int., P.O. Box 1065, London W.2. The format is targeted at 15 - 39 year olds and is best described as CHR (contemporary hit radio). The line-up is very impressive, but we would like to listen for a few days, before we print this, as some names may not materialise, others may vanish (Tim Kelly is one who has already left, we understand). More to follow, next

week.....

OFFSHORE STATIONS...THE VOICE OF PEACE. From a very hot Israel, the Kravitzki twins report that the station remained off air, in dry dock, in Haifa, until Friday 6th May, when she once again, sailed to her anchorage. The new 25kw FM transmitter was already on the air, when they tuned in at 22:00, but until 00:15 on the following day, it only played over and over again, the jingle 'all we are saying.....'. They then switched off until dawn. The Arabic show was presented as usual next day until 08:00, with the normal breakfast show following. As was stated last time, lan Hudson has now left, and Kenny Page has been visiting Scotland, for a ten day break. On Sunday 8th May, a new D.J. was heard presenting the 'Night-Beat' show, from 03:00 until 06:00. His name was Richard West. Also heard later the same day, was Steve Richards, making a welcome return to the station. On Wednesday 11th, the station broadcast the entire European Soccer Cup Final, from 21:00 until 23:00. Abie's phone-in programme has now been moved to 15:00 (till 17:00), in fact, an hour later. Two big events are forthcoming.... The VOP 15th anniversary and the re-opening of Abie's restaurant, 'California'. The original California was closed down in 1972, to enable Abie to buy the Peace ship. Now to celebrate 15 years on the air, the restaurant re-opens. Designed as a ship (the Peace ship?), the eating establishment is located in a new shopping centre near the City Hall in Tel Aviv. The celebrations for the anniversary began on Monday, 16th and last throughout the week. Current line-up, as of 15th May, reads.... 00:00 Steve Richards... 03:00 Richard West... 06:00 John McDonald... 09:00 Michael O'Sullivan... 13:00 Steve Cromby... 15:00 Abie Nathan... 17:00 John McDonald... 18:00 Steve Richards... 19:30 Michael O'Sullivan... 22:00 ?

CAROLINE 558 / WORLD MISSION RADIO. A trip out to the Ross Revenge last weekend created a few problems, it appears, with a vessel from the DTI awaiting its arrival in the South Falls. None of the visitors boarded the radio ship and thus no offences were committed. Despite this, the 'anorak' boat was followed back up the Thames Estuary, and on returning to port, all on board the sight-seeing vessel were questioned at length by the DTI, and Government inspectors were examining the ship very thoroughly, as the passengers eventually left. According to Radio Kent, offences under the Merchant Shipping Act may have been committed, whatever that may mean. Perhaps the DTI made a fool of themselves over the whole incident as no offences against the MEBO Act were committed, and in order to 'save face', they had to 'find' something wrong with the vessel.

The signal on 558kHz. continues quite good, and the week started with Keith Francis on breakfast, followed by Steve Conway, who handed over to Erwin van de Blieck at the earlier hour of 12 midday. In his programme, Steve was heard to say that traditionally, Monday is new music day, and he went on to play lots of new singles. In fact the line-up had been changed around quite a lot, with several different length shows, and a new programme being introduced in the evening. The 'new' show is called "Cuddle Up To Caroline". This gave a schedule of... 05:00 Keith Francis... 09:00 Steve Conway... 12:00 Erwin van der Blieck... 16:00 Steve Masters... 20:00 John Bibby... 21:00 Mick Williams... 01:00 Closedown. The one hour show at 20:00 was hosted by Steve Conway, on Wednesday only. On Thursday (19th), the station left the air at 11:00 and Steve Conway announced that they would be back in the early afternoon, and that the break was due to essential maintenence, only able to be carried out during daylight hours and in calm seas. The re-appeared sometime between 15:00 and 16:00. So, it looks like they may be trying to erect the 819kHz. mast. They were certainly working on it, a reporter on the visiting vessel told us, when they were there on Saturday. Collars were understood to be being fitted to the vertical mast, in order that it could be stayed properly. The base of this fibreglass structure which was damaged several weeks ago when it was first tested, was also in the process of being strengthened. So perhaps everything was ready on Thursday for it to have a 'structural' test.

A message left on our Sheerness answerline on Monday, by a Dutch reporter, told us that the proposed Dutch service could be called 'North Sea 819'. We have no confirmation from official sources on this one, but the report does tie in with rumours stating that the service will not be called Monique.

On Sunday morning at 00:20, our reporter in the immediate coastal listening area of Harwich, noted a relay of Caroline

558 on 819kHz. These transmissions ceased at 01:00 along with 558kHz., to return at 05:00 once again. At the time of printing, both services are running in parallel, with the 819 service less powerful but far superior in audio quality. At this stage, we are not sure at exactly what time transmissions commenced on 819kHz., as here in Blackpool the channel is home to Dublin's Super Q, preventing any serious logging.

World Mission Radio, can be heard most of the time on 6215kHz., shortwave conditions permitting. The tapes consist of contempory Christian music, with ID's in English, Spanish and German. Their address is WMR, Box 3416, Corona, Ca 91719, USA. At 11:00 and 21:00, there are transmissions by Dutch evangelist, Johann Maasbach. These are nothing to do with WMR.

SHORT WAVE STATIONS.

Amendments to last Sunday's log (15th May).... additionally noted an unidentified station on 6337kHz., at 10:33gmt., FMTR on 6305kHz., at 09:14gmt, Radio Waves/ Radio Limit on 6330kHz. and 'Born Free' on 7362kHz., at 08:05gmt.

The operator of Guernsey Sound informs us that the station will be taking a break for a few weeks from 6230kHz., whilst transmitter operator, Heady Eddie, in Ireland, takes his holidays (chasing Rainbows in the Canaries, no doubt!). The medium wave outlet is also off air at present, although this is due to re-siting. There will therefore be no programmes from GS, via Rainbow, until 19th June. They will be heard on the fourth Sunday of the month, as usual, on 7445kHz. We understand a similar break will occur with W.L.R., but we presume that they will still be heard via other transmitters.



Conditions today were rather good here, as can be seen by the logs in BOLD. The only ones we missed were Pamela, due to RECC being dominant, although we could just make them out, and the Rainbow relay plus Ridiculous ID (the latter relayed all 6315 stations), and this was due to lack of time more than anything, so, by and large, a quite good day for us. Other loggers kindly rang in and came from Cheshire, the Channel Islands, Hampshire and Surrey.

Radio East Coast Commercial and Radio Pamela were noted battling it out again, both on 6815kHz. Pogo 104 and SBC both announced that they were being relayed via Radio Mirage Int. * * * * * * * * * *

Surprise! Surprise! But not at all unexpected, was the very quiet way in which during a cabinet meeting a couple of weeks ago, it was apparently decided to drop the idea, for the time being at least, of the introduction of a large number of community radio stations. This latest in a series of 'cons' by successive governments, is due apparently, to other bills in the coming Parliament being classed as 'more important', and thus no Parliamentary time is available at present, for the radio bill. Whilst we hoped that such a bill would be passed, it seemed a rather grandiose plan to put on the air 300+ radio stations, considering the experiment of 21 stations promised 4 years ago, was also cancelled due to a host of other excuses. Pressure from ILR stations cannot have helped the proposed bill either, as they saw their monopolies being threatened. As with the previously cancelled 'experiment', there will be many bitter broadcasters, who once again have put a great deal of money, time, and effort into planning their own particular venture, only to be let down a further time. We wonder how many more times this will happen. Each time it does however, it will give these ventures more reasons why they should just go on the air anyway, as it seems breaking the oudated law is the only way to make the authorities know of their disgust.

As well as in the U.K, it seems as though it is swings and roundabouts also, with the Irish radio bill. After thinking that the stations had another year to go, following recent comments by the Communications Minister, the past week's papers in Eire have been filled with articles stating that this is definately the end. The regulation of the new stations will now be by an independent authority, and not by the minister himself. In a statement issued on 23rd May, Ray Burke was hopeful that the amended legislation, which now includes TV as well as radio, would become law before the summer recess. He stated that as soon as the new radio stations were ready, the 'pirates' would be put off the air. A bill to set up the 'watchdog committee' is due before the Dail this

coming week, and so we wait with baited breath, the outcome.

Finally in our opening this week, we were informed of a programme called 'Spotlight' which was to be aired on BBC 1 televison on Thursday 26th May. This was to feature the 'border blasters' KISS FM, Boyneside Radio etc. Unfortunately this was not aired in our area, nevertheless, we would love to see a copy of it. If anyone made a recording they could perhaps loan to us, or even

dub onto a VHS video-cassette, please let us know. We will refund all costs.

Recorded in excellent FM stereo on 17th May, the programme also includes some promotions for the forthcoming format change. Tapes 202 and 203 are both 90 minutes in length and cost £2.00 each. Finally this week, we offer a double C-90 pack featuring the final programmes broadcast by RBL International on 16th May. The last part of the recording, which is in FM mono, also has many of the adverts and promotions which were used on the station over its several years of broadcasting via the transmitters of R.B.L., in France. The last hour is one for the 'anoraks' and includes a telephone calls with many of the former presenters, including one with Caroline (and R.B.L.) deejay, Paul Graham, who couldn't be there for the final broadcast. RADIO STATION NEWS: IRELAND. As mentioned in our opening paragraph this week, another attempt at passing legislation in the Irish Republic, to outlaw the 'radio pirates' is currently occurring. We await further reports on a Dail sitting this coming week which will apparently pass a bill to bring in a 'regulating authority' to oversee the setting up and running of the stations. If this goes through, then things don't look too good for the summer months.

Co. DUBLIN. With Gareth O'Callaghan having two weeks holiday for his wedding and honeymoon, Scott Williams returned to host the breakfast show on the newly formatted Super Q-102 FM. Also back up in the helicopter was Mike Hogan, although last Friday was expected to be the final 'Star in the Sky', as the contract has not been renewed. Missing was Martin Block, who had been reading the news and other snippets during Gareth's final programmes as a single man, last week. Actually, the wedding was last Wednesday afternoon, and not the previous weekend as we had thought, still, either way, we send the lucky pair everyone's best wishes. It was nice to hear Jason Maine back in a daytime slot (10:00), even if it is only for two . weeks. Both Scott and Jason sounded very well by Tuesday, with lots of chat in a high speed, non stop music format. Sadly missing were the jingles, of course, and the on hour

ID's. The latter were replaced by spoken ID's at about 4/6 minutes past each hour, occasionally nearer, which seems an extremely strange thing to do, but not for the first time, we might add. The same P.D., whilst at Sunshine 101, last year, put their on-hour news back to about six minutes past each hour, something they still adhere to today, although the news service there now, is much curtailed from what it was then. The 'Star in the Sky' on Friday morning, rumoured to be the last one (in the present series?) was manned by Mark Lawler, and on the last 'link' we heard, Mark said he wouldn't be doing it again.

891 & 945 KHz AM 99.1 & 99.5 FM - STEREO

Superb AM conditions have prevailed on some days this week, which is just as well, as we are still without our FM aerial, due to bad weather holding us up with our modifications. Most Dublin stations have been loud and clear, and Treble T.R. Radio was one we tuned into, from time to time. The signal on 891kHz. was excellent for the low power put out, despite strong neighbours locally to us. The same cannot be said for 945kHz., however, which was virtually inaudible and being swamped here by the Yorkshire ILR station on the same channel. Late afternoon listening was most pleasant and a good selection of Irish and country music was noted, along with one or two classic oldies (Nights in White Satin, being one such example). Adverts were plentiful as is normal on TTTR, mostly of a local nature. News bulletins were read by ex Nova and Kiss FM (Dublin) news-reader, Irish American, Siobhan Purcell and were noted at odd times here also. Twenty to and twenty past the hour, although the morning ones, read by American colleague, Bob Gallico, are read conventionally on the hour and half hour. Requests were asked for on Dublin (01) 966484. Treble T.R. Radio, 6 Harold's Cross Road, Dublin 6.

Co. LOUTH. Telstar Community Radio have re-introduced their 1170kHz. transmitter to serve an area south of Dundalk. The site is believed to be around Castlebellingham, about half way to Drogheda. The signal here in Blackpool is not too good due to local ILR activity on the same frequency. Telstar made on outside broadcast in the town on Saturday, the same day as RTE were also coming from Dundalk. Severe problems were noted in the town, on the FM band, with nothing audible but RTE in certain places close to the RTE transmitter.

Co. KILDARE. Reports tell us that K.C.R. (Kildare Community Radio) have finally called it a day and all transmissions on 1413kHz. have now ceased. Lack of presenters and general enthusiasm were the main reasons, we understand. Things aren't much better at K.L.B. (1224kHz. and 103.5MHz.FM) in Newbridge, where the merger between themselves and Zee 100 fell through, leaving KLB just carrying on as before. The station (KLB) is still on the market, we understand and as far as we know, no buyers have yet been found.

Co, WESTMEATH. It appears that, following indications from station owner, Sean Coyne, the free radio show each Sunday morning on Radio West is no more. Pressure of business by Sean is reported to be the main reason for its disappearance, with lack of assistance being offered by other interested parties locally being another. The programme which was very popular and had been running for two years, was started initially by Philip Hilton.

LAND-BASED STATIONS: U.K.

LONDON WEEKEND SURVEY. 20th - 23rd May 1988.

This weekend, touched down on 34 stations, 6 in stereo.

Missing / not heard :- Faze 1, City Radio, T.K.O., W.N.K.,

Stomp FM, Hits FM (new), Hits FM (old) and London Irish

Community Radio.

Soul FM, last heard on 91'ish, a week or two back, have re-emerged on 96.85MHz., with a signal that at last does them justice. WLIB (91.0) now have the spot to themselves, albeit shipping a lot of sidesplash from Southall's wandering SRI (now up to 90.95). Soul have moved up to what is fast becoming yet another crowded sector. On 95.5 are recently resurfaced Strong Island, and splashing over both, is the recently arrived funk and soul station simply ID'ing as 96.9, although a whispered drop-in did sound as though they were saying Quest FM. We shall have to wait and see, as they went out Sunday after being on for just over a week. Also going out Sunday were Studio FM (92.7) and KISS FM (93.95 - stereo). TKO (102.3 - stereo) went out Friday, and it isn't known when City Radio (94.45 - stereo) got theirs. KISS FM (93.95 - stereo) missed their usual early start, and were not heard until well into Saturday, only to go missing again on Sunday. Neither of the Hits FM (old 105.5 or new 103.05) were heard, and in fact the silence in the sector over 105 was only broken by soul weekenders PCR (105.25 - stereo)

Also getting mighty crowded, is the 88.7 sector, where another daytime Asian has settled, on 88.65, featuring mainly Bhangra disco music, as opposed to the normally heard traditional and film music. Powerful Saturday rockers London Rock are on 88.70, with a strong clean signal, taking them clear across London. And, East London soulsters Sunrise FM are on 88.80. The unidentified Asian on 92.75 was heard again on Friday, barely breaking in the side of North London long weekenders Studio FM (92.75). SRI (90.95) have upped their power this week, and wandered up band slightly from 90.85. This means they now obliterate low power WLIB (91.00) who can only be heard when SRI are closed down for the night. Dayime Asian Brittania Radio (95.4) were missing Friday, but made it back with full power for Saturday.

Yet another Asian signal was detected behind R-t-R (90.35) on 90.45 on Friday, but not heard since.

After living in the washover from London Irish Community Radio (89.5'ish - will they come back?), Deptford's Groove Weekend Radio (89.65) are now being submerged in the quite considerable stereo splashover from the Arab (89.7 - stereo). They aim to cover only SE London, so they are not greatly inconvenienced. But when the sector is clear, they can be heard loud and clear across most of London.

The Arabs (89.7 - stereo) are evidently getting advertising of a better class than normally heard on 'Privateer Radio', as amongst all the verbiage, which was presumed to be advertising, a number of Mayfair addresses were deciphered.

Solar 93 (93.00 - stereo) made the weekend, but were off-air overnight Saturday. Watford weekenders Playback FM (93.25) could be heard Friday and Saturday, but were obliterated by Sunday's Starpoint (93.25 - stereo). It may have been Starpoint testing on Saturday evening when a very poor quality signal of the Doors greatest hits was heard on 93.30MHz. This abruptly cut off just after 8:15pm. Transmissions resumed in this slot in the early hours of the following morning, with a powerful but distorted signal containing a very loud hum on the left channel. Things had been sorted out by the evening, to give a relatively clean signal.

LWR (92.05) had a tx back on line by Friday, but presumably no studio, as they carried a relay of Solar 93's output, until Solar went off-air on Saturday night, to leave just a blank and noisy carrier on 92.05. LWR then got their act together and by just after 8pm on Sunday evening, the familiar sounds of a studio being put together live on air, were heard. An

hour or two later, programming had begun in earnest.

In the stereo stakes, the only current 7 dayers are JBC (104.3), and the Arab (89.7). LIC-R, City Radio, and TKO are off the air for the moment, and LWR have just lost a stereo rig and have returned in mono. That leaves weekenders Solar 93 (93.00 - stereo), Starpoint (93.25 - stereo), KISS FM (93.95 - stereo) and Peoples Choice Radio (105.25 - stereo) as the remaining stereo contenders. Sky (91.7), Super Fresh (103.35), and Time Radio (103.75) seem to have abandonned any stereo pretensions entirely.

More from Sid next week, about the ever expanding radio scene in the capital. Now that the proposed 'radio bill' has been cancelled for the time being, we will no doubt see even more stations attempting to gain access to the airwaves in sheer desperation at the ludicrous situation. It would seem that organisations might as well transmit, as they have nothing to lose as far as obtaining a license to broadcast is concerned. At the rate things are going we will be into the next century before the radio bands reach their full potential. We wonder when the next episode in the farcical story of the introduction of 'community radio' to Britain, will be announced! Watch this section next week, for a newspaper editorial summing up the knowledge of broadcasting of our Home Secretary. This follows an amusing incident in the House of Commons recently.

BRISTOL. A very quiet week in this area, with neither Emergency Radio, nor B.A.D. Radio being monitored. Radio F.T.P. (103.6) however were on the air each day, from 17:00, although they now appear to sometimes extend their schedule and begin broadcasts at lunchtime, if deejays are available. Last time we mentioned that Radio For The People did not take advertising. However this week a commercial has indeed been heard for a video shop, sports shop and a gym all under one roof. On 21st May the station had a trip to Barry Island pleasure park, with the Playboy and Enterprise

Crews expected to have been present.

THE MIDLANDS. We missed out this area last week, so here is a summary of the stations monitored over the past two weeks. Midland Asian Community Radio were heard every night from 13th to 16th May on 106MHz. These transmissions were not regular, and so were possibly just tests once more. An address of P.O. Box 1144, Camphill, Birmingham B11 4NA was announced. They were again monitored each night on 18th, 19th and 20th May. Another unidentified Asian station, possible A.C.R. was logged on 21st May on 106.35MHz. Powerhouse Radio (105.0) was heard every evening with comedy sketches as well as the regular programmes of music. Two stations are currently operating on 95.0MHz. These are Electro Radio who have been on regularly each evening for the past few months, and who were recently joined by Fresh 95 FM with a format of hiphop. The new station, Fresh FM, appear to be running a



full weekend schedule, although had disappeared by Sunday evening (22nd). When both stations are operating, reception is competiment difficult in contain areas of the city.

is sometimes difficult in certain areas of the city.

Solar Rock (90.9) was not heard over the weekend of 13th - 15th May, and in fact nothing had been been heard on this channel since 12th May. When the station did reappear on Friday 20th May, it was opened by Mikey B of Enterprise FM, who stated that Solar Rock was not on the previous weekend due to technical problems. By 22:50 that evening, Solar Rock had again disappeared, but Enterprise FM were broadcasting as normal on 91.9MHz. The West Midlands Music Network consisting of Enterprise and Solar Rock, were recently advertising for a 'sales person' to sell airtime on the two stations. Generous commission was said to be given, as well as a car provided for travelling between prospective businesses.

One of the longest running stations outside London celebrated its 3rd Birthday on 24th May. Radio P.C.R.L. (103.75) has manged to continue a 7 day schedule throughout most of this period, despite dozens of raids by the DTI, and bad publicity by the authorities. The station currently is reported to have very good audio, with non of the distortion which sometimes plagued the broadcasts in the past. Plenty of adverts for the birthday party were aired on P.C.R.L., as well as 'flyposters' being seen in Birmingham advertising the event. The party at the Hummingbird was very successful, and was packed with people. There were several big names there, including Smiley Culture and Total Contrast. At 02:30 the party was closed earlier than expected as the manager of the club announded that the police were waiting outside.




YORKSHIRE, HUMBERSIDE & DERBYSHIRE. As we were printing last Sunday evening, Thunder Radio (104.8) were heard with their regular Sunday evening broadcast just South of Leeds. Later on in their broadcast, another transmitter was switched on the slightly higher frequency on 104.9MHz., and relayed BBC Radio 1 as well as other stations, as the operator tuned up and down the band. No formal identification was heard. The regular three reggae/soul music stations, Music City Radio (90.3), Peoples FM (91.8) and ABC FM (105.2) may soon be joined by a fourth one on 105.8MHz.,

if rumours we hear are true. If this new station begins operation at the weekend, then it could cause problems for Radio Radar who were expected to broadcast another Bank Holiday Monday special, on 105.5MHz. Radio Radar would then be jammed between ABC and the newcomer. ABC FM (105.2) have been running a seven day schedule this week, although blank carriers have been heard at times. Peoples FM (91.8) were monitored during weekday evenings, and are expected on with a full weekend schedule. Information received from Music City Radio (90.3) tells us that the station were raided approximately five weeks ago, after which they were off the air briefly. Since then, they have successfully broadcast each Friday to Monday with reggae, soul and community news, to the city of Leeds. Their strong signal can regularly be heard as far south as Rotherham. This week, due to the Bank Holiday weekend, they are extending the schedule to include all day Monday and Tuesday.

Across in Hull, we hear that Radio Takoradi (105.0) are once again on the air, and apparently taking a few more precautions with their location this time around. They are attempting to gain advertisers, and the front page of their leaflet is printed below. Broadcasts are from 10:00 on Saturday mornings, through until late in the evenings. As yet we have no reports as to the programme content of

the relaunched station.



Listening to North Coast Radio (1350kHz.) MERSEYSIDE. last Sunday afternoon, Mark Wright gave mention of broadcasting from a boat in the Mersey! We think that this was probably a little 'tongue in cheek', as different studios on the 'port' and 'starboard' side were said to be in use. It certainly made interesting listening though. One listener heard them say they were broadcasting from the bar, but on checking with us, we pointed out that we thought it may have been meant to mean an area of the bay called the Barr? Their signal continued to be very good throughout that afternoon, and was even audible here in the evening, despite the powerful French station on the same channel. There was a low frequency hum however as darkness approached. North Coast Radio is understood to be owned by Bob Kimusavi (correct spelling?), and engineered by Martin C. of Phoenix Radio, who made test transmissions a few weeks ago, and are understood to be possibly going to merge with N.C.R. to form one big station. The signal strength

from N.C.R., just has the edge on Radio Merseywaves at this present time, but both are very powerful for this type of operation.

Although not heard by us due to lack of aerials, Veronica 104 (104.7) were on the air on Sunday (22nd), with a strong signal heard as far away as Manchester. They were announcing an extended weekend broadcast in two weeks, and programmes would run on Friday, Saturday and Sunday. Whether this meant the Bank Holiday weekend we are not quite sure. Monday (23rd), saw Radio Merseywaves (1242kHz.) on the air as usual, and heavily advertising (as they had all weekend), the big night out that evening, at Birkenhead Pleasuredome. All the Merseywayes deejays were expected to be attending and according to announcements, each will do a short spot live. The deejays and all the 'behind the scenes' staff will all be introduced to the audience at one stage during the evening. The station left the air at around 19:00, and although we just missed it going off, we presume it was so that all the staff could get themselves down to the Pleasuredome for a good night out.

Radio Atlantis (1197kHz.) was also on the air all day Monday, and Rick Dane now seems to be manning the station by himself, as he was heard both in the morning and at closedown time of 18:00. There are still plenty of adverts being broadcast by Atlantis, which we believe is unique for stations on Merseyside.

Thursday (26th) saw Radio Merseywaves back on for their regular weekend schedule. There had been a few announcements last week mentioning that they might drop this day, but obviously enough staff are still available to keep Thursday's going. The station has been monitored regularly since this time, and they gave plenty of mentions to the night out at the Pleasuredrome. Occasional breaks in programming were noted on Saturday.

Rick Dane was again heard manning Radio Atlantis (1197) beginning on Friday morning. Transmissions were also noted on Saturday and this morning up until time of writing.

North Coast Radio (1350) were not monitored this morning at time of writing, but perhaps they are intending to operate on Bank Holiday Monday instead. As mentioned earlier, we have not been able to monitor FM this week, but we believe that Radio Julie (104.8) have been on the air as normal. When on high power they could be received here in Blackpool without an external aerial, but at present, we can note a station there, but it is not strong enough to identify.

Chester Community Radio were expected on the air this evening on 105.00MHz. We hope to confirm the FM logs in next week's report.

NEWCASTLE-UPON-TYNE. Newcastle Broadcasting Company (N.B.C.) were on the air again last Saturday (21st May) on 102.2MHz., but with a very distorted signal by all accounts. They continued broadcasting until early on Sunday morning. The distortion had reduced somewhat by Sunday. An address has been mentioned, but only occasionally, of P.O. Box 1XN, Newcastle NE99 1XN.

MANCHESTER. The two main stations in the city have operated as normal this week. WBLS (102.4) and Laser 10-35 (103.5) both serve the black community with reggae and soul music along with community news. The Illegal Broadcasting Company (104.4) was monitored last Sunday afternoon on the usual frequency of 104.4MHz.

A little further south, Outlook 96.3 (96.35MHz.) made its regular Sunday evening transmissions on 22nd May, but was not monitored on Monday night. The usual switch on time for this religious broadcaster is around 20:00 on Saturday, Sunday and Monday.

ESSEX. Stomp FM (105.4) were noted back on the air last weekend, but only with a Saturday schedule. They were putting out a strong signal with the usual disco and soul music.

SATELLITE LINK BROADCASTING.

RADIO NOVA INTERNATIONAL.

This station is hypnotic, get a satellite dish at once! The programmes, listened to extensively on Tuesday, were excellent, well produced and fast moving. The line-up on this day could best be described as 'interesting'.... 07:00 Paul Burnett... 10:00 Chris Cary... 13:00 Declan Meehan... 15:00 Tony Blackburn... 16:00 Greg Edwards...19:00 Liam Quigley... 22:00 Mark Walker... 02:00 Pete Simester. Requests and calls were invited to be made on (0276) 692040. Independent Radio News is relayed on the hour and is, on all occasions, superbly slotted in, making it hard for people outside the LBC area, to determine whether it is Nova or

Teledisc, Premier Film Channel and Sunday World, in addition to Comp Shop and Hi-Tech (subsidiary companies) and in-house ones. Jingles and promos feature strongly, the former incorporating many of the original ones adapted for satellite use, plus scores of new ones also. Bill Mitchell features strongly and his 'Nova, playing all over Europe now' could only have been bettered by Tony Allan. Mention was made by Chris Cary that Declan's appearance at 13:00 was his first on Radio Nova for three years. Chris also mentioned that the reason he was on air was because Paul Burnett was off making that pirate radio film we mentioned a couple of weeks ago. On Wednesday evening, we tuned in fairly late to hear Howard Pearce with the new 'Nova Night Network' and an excellent show featuring so many classics, it prevented 'an early night'! The only trouble with the station is the fact that the satellite thing ties you to the room housing the receiver, for example you cannot go out in the car and listen to it, or even go into another room (or even to bed with headphones!). Of course, you can always record it and listen to the tapes in the car! The line-up for Wednesday featured Brian McKenzie, although it was not the ex RNI and Dublin-based Brian of Bay City Studios fame, but an American called Hank McKenzie. (The 'Brian' jingles were obviously at hand!) Tony Blackburn was only listed for one afternoon, but did in fact do one hour shows on several afternoons, which will no doubt increase, now that he has been told to go' by the BBC. Tony sounds fresh and bright and the change of environment/ scenery has obviously been a good move for this veteran broadcaster. Half the excitement of the station comes from wondering who is going to appear next. We are told to expect Pat Sharp and Timmy Mallett in a few days and last night, we had the pleasure to listen to the talents of the up and coming Cassidy Jones. The latter was last heard of at ILR station in Hereford and Worcester and may possibly still be there(?), doing weekends only, at Nova. A settled line-up is expected, once different people have been tried out at different times, we are told. On the subject of the hourly IRN news relay, there is a reciprocal deal here, whereby Nova gets IRN news via land-line, and in return, IRN news is heard hourly throughout Europe. Regarding 'oldies', we understand the station has purchased a complete library on CD, from 21st Century in America and these are expected to air shortly.

OFFSHORE STATIONS. RADIO CAROLINE. The station continued on Monday, with the lineup as we left it last week. We were expecting it to change at any time, as Erwin would obviously be required to help with the start of the Dutch service on the then testing 819kHz. However it was not Erwin's programmes which were to disappear, as we found on Thursday. The line-up until Tuesday was... 05:00 Keith Francis... 09:00 Steve Conway... 12:00 Erwin van der Blieck... 16:00 Steve Masters... 20:00 John Bibby... 21:00 'Cuddle up with Caroline' with Mike Williams... 01:00 Closedown. On Wednesday night we found that the one hour slot between 20:00 and 21:00 hosted by Steve Conway, as it had the same evening last week. Steve mentioned that this would be his last show for some days and he would be concentrating on the news side of the station. 24 hour operation was also being announced once more, suggesting that a crew change had taken place. Indeed, at 01:00 on Thursday morning, Dave Asher took to the airwaves, and programmed through until 05:00. We presumed that this Dave Asher was the same one as has been on the Voice of Peace for some time, but as we have yet to hear a programme ourselves, we cannot be sure. At 05:00 Keith Francis hosted the breakfast show as before, with Steve Conway on news. 09:00 brought a new name to the station, that of Rob Harrison, although his voice sounded very much like Robbie Jay who was on several months ago. Erwin was still on at 12:00, and Mike Williams at 16:00. The line-up on Friday was...01:00 Dave Asher... 05:00 Keith Francis... 09:00 Rob Harrison... 12:00 Erwin van der Blieck... 16:00 Mike Williams... 20:00 Rob

Harrison... 21:00 Mike Williams.

on Monday morning. The first reports we have of 819 being active, are on Saturday night at about 22:15, when Geoffrey from Essex checked the channel, only to find it silent. Tuning down to 558, he found that silent too, but seconds later, a voice, he thought was John Bibby, said something about a 50p in the meter. Both channels then continued in parallel. Whether 819 was active before this, is at present unknown. The signal was reported to have gradually increased from its weak start, throughout Sunday, although the transmitter was never actually switched off at any time. By Monday, it was almost as strong as 558kHz., but was preferred by most listeners due to the excellent audio quality. An announcement heard on Sunday mentioned that Radio Caroline would only be relayed on 819kHz. for a couple of days. On Tuesday morning (24th), the 819kHz. transmitter was not heard and only 558kHz. carried Radio Caroline programmes. Around lunchtime 558kHz. also went off the air for a short period. Erwin van der Blieck came on at 12:00 as usual but went off at 12:20 after his turntables played at erratic speeds, then slowed down and finally stopped. There was then silence, apart from a jingle at 12:27 and another at 12:37, until the station returned with the 13:00 news. In all, a 40 minute break during which time, the transmitter remained switched on. Erwin apologised for the break in transmissions at 13:05, but gave no reason for it. (Thanks to Simon for the details on this one). 819kHz. was not heard again until Saturday morning (28th), when it once again was quite strong, and had excellent audio quality. Apparently the off-air period in the week was due to problems with the system, after the power was upped significantly. The Erwin van der Blieck programme on Friday was announced as his last. Just before he left the air at 16:00, he said to the listeners that he would see them on 819. So keep tuned! The transmissions on 819kHz did not last too long however, as it left the air at 20:34 that evening. It has not been heard since.

As regards World Mission Radio, this outlet on 6215kHz. is on the air for 20 hours per day, from 05:00 till 01:00 British Summer Time, with ten hours of non-stop gospel music, plus the programmes of Johann Maasbach. These detail as follows.... 07:00 07:30, in Dutch... 11:00 - 11:30, in English... 16:00 - 16:30, in Dutch... 21:00 - 21:30, in English. In the Dutch programmes, the old times of his appearances on Viewpoint and Monique are mentioned, which means that some are old tapes. Johann Maasbach is heard on all programmes. The female voice we have noted belongs to an employee who reads information on the churches, broadcasting times and other things only. Some 'dead air' has been noted and also some slow running tapes, obviously on reel to reel and playing at the wrong speed. Something else, in the English address read out, the American P.O. Box is number 3416, yet in the Spanish, German and French promo, it is 346! We think the former is correct, however. Also, ten hours of music and two hours-of Johann only add up to 12 hours, the rest being filled in with other religious programming. Our thanks to Rudi from the Netherlands, for pointing out these things. With reference to our recent comments about HCJB, Edwin in Hampshire says.... 'the transmissions from HCJB on 6230kHz. in the early morning has nothing to do with Caroline causing interference on 6205kHz., which they used for a few weeks. 6230kHz. is a long used frequency, beamed to Central and North America between 02:00 and 07:00. HCJB seem to have vacated 6205kHz. as they have not been heard for some weeks now. They usually vacate this channel to Europe at this time of year'-

The 'mess' of the week was oround 6240kHz., where two stations were operating about 2kHz. apart giving a rather nasty heterodyne. We identified one as Skyline, but the other seemed to be just playing continuous music.

It has been a long time since Empire Radio has been on the air, but today's broadcast was to celebrate their tenth anniversay.

The station on 6870kHz. was playing continuous music also, but then just cut off abruptly.

The two German stations on 7310kHz. were relayed via the same transmitter, which has its own 'interval signal tune' in between the programme tapes.

7375kHz. was also a bit of a mess, as it has been for several weeks. There seems to be at least two stations operating on this channel. In addition, at 10:00, the powerful 'spy numbers' station comes on the air and obliterates everything.

Amendments to last Sunday's log, from Podney R. Sixe.... additionally, Radio Rainbow Int., on 6231kHz., at 09:46gmt.

A press release from Radio East Coast Commercial, received this week, confirms that, as we thought, they are cross about Radio Pamela broadcasting bang on top of them, on 6815kHz. They (RECC) checked this area of the band, to ensure it was clear, and, convinced it was, carried out satisfactory tests. Once on the air, Pamela opened up on the same frequency. Not only can RECC not be heard satisfactorily, neither can Radio Pamela, making the whole exercise futile.

Finally this week, on the subject of QSO-ing, several correspondents this week have expressed their distaste at some of the unsavoury language used by some QSO operators. Whilst free radio means just this, it does seem rather a shame that other stations attempting to entertain, are tarred with the same brush, should any of this come to light as a result of the authorities monitoring said transmissions.
